VATICAN CITY-Pope Paul VI has reversed a decision of the Doctrinal Congregation which had forbid-den Catholic participation in an ecumenical prayer service in a Protestant church here.

The decision came too late, however, to organize such a service for this year's Week of Prayer for Christian Unity Jan. 18-25







# The Vatican Council—one year later: a Methodist theologian's appraisal

Bishop Sheen said he is estab-lishing the council "so that the materialities will pass out of the hands of the clergy and into the hands of the laity who have special competency in this mat-ter."

"IN ORDER that I might be free for pastoral activities such as teaching, preaching, visiting the poor and organizing the various organizations of the diocese into an organism." he said, "I am transferring the secular and pusiness side of the diocesan





Walter Reuther might well take enough time off from joining protest marches this year and George Meany from making windy speeches to break up this policy of exclusion by the building-trades unions.




