



## <u>Discerning the Future with Open Doors, Open Arms, and Open Hearts</u>

#### Dear Friends.

Our Archdiocese was greatly blessed with the leadership of Cardinal Tobin during the past four years, and we know that you will join us in prayers of thanksgiving for his ministry, in prayers of support for his transition, and in prayers of anticipation for the next Archbishop of Indianapolis.

Cardinal Tobin wrote the following in last year's Office of Catholic Schools Special Publication:

> "Catholic schools are formational and transformational ministries that are integral to the life of the Church and to the mission of the Archdiocese of Indianapolis ... With open doors, open arms, and open hearts, let us ever more deeply embrace this great mission that we share."

In response to this invitation, the Office of Catholic Schools has embarked upon a strategic planning process. Our hope is that, by providing a clear focus on identified priorities, all archdiocesan Catholic schools will be more effective and efficient in fulfilling our shared mission of forming strong Catholic youth through holistic, engaging, and academically excellent programming that integrates faith, culture, and life as modeled by our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

#### Background

More than one year ago, Archbishop Tobin approved the reorganization of the Secretariat for Education and Faith Formation, which included Youth Ministry, Young Adult/College Campus Ministry, Catechesis, and Catholic Schools, into three new Secretariats: Catholic Schools, Worship and Evangelization, and Pastoral Ministries.

In the fall of 2015, the newly formed Office of Catholic Schools (OCS) prepared for and hosted an external accreditation visit through AdvancED. With the support of all of our schools, and informed by our self-study and accreditation review, OCS engaged in the important task of charting a course forward through strategic planning.



#### Process

Dedicated to mission-centric continuous improvement, the Office of Catholic Schools (OCS) first drafted mission, vision, and values statements and then embarked upon an intensive strategic planning process. Thus far, several consultations have taken place with high school presidents, principals, Archdiocesan Catholic Schools Commission members, and department chairs of various secretariats at the Catholic Center. Assisted by consultant Sue Weber, OCS looks forward to gathering additional input from pastors and the chancery leadership team before finalizing action steps, benchmarks, and timelines. Our intent is to begin plan implementation early in 2017.

#### Visioning the Future

The current OCS strategic plan draft is organized into four major areas:

- Deepening the understanding and total integration of mission and Catholic identity in all Catholic schools
- ◆ Inspiring and supporting excellence in Catholic school leadership and governance
- Enriching the academic/formational quality of Catholic schools
- Deepening the culture of collaboration, coordination, and partnership across the archdiocesan community in support of the mission of Catholic schools

### Artful Service: Being the Face of God for Those in Need

Each year, PHS's Intro 3D Art students participate in service-learning through *Empty Bowls*. Students research numerous hunger and poverty related issues through a variety of a s s i g n m e n t s culminating in the creation of a ceramic bowl for

the event. The students run the entire event and are a vital part of its success. Participants keep their bowls as a reminder that every day there are bowls that remain empty, and hunger persists. All profits go toward local hunger coalitions in Southern Indiana.



The goal of this special project is to instill a sense of advocacy within students, helping them better serve their communities through "Artful Service" (God-given art talents). We discuss how our Catholic faith calls us to serve. We talk about how many people are forced to live without the basic necessities of life and how we are called to respond by being the face of God for those in need.

Most of my students will not "grow up" to be professional artists. However, ALL will "grow up" to be members of their communities! It is vital that we, as educators, instill a sense of urgency toward service and plant in them the seeds of desire to help their fellow man.





### Support Provided by the Office of Catholic Schools

- Coordinate and lead archdiocesan-wide and local school accreditation
- Provide legal and personnel support and consultation
- Assist in the hiring and evaluation/development processes of Catholic school leaders
- Foster the development of future leaders for our Catholic schools
- Provide educator induction and formation through *History and Mission* and other courses and initiatives
- Supervise the Notre Dame ACE Academies (formerly MTCA) in coordination with the University of Notre Dame
- Support the Catholic Youth Organization and St. Mary's Child Center
- Assist in the administration of TCE Grants/Loans for educator formation
- Participate in the vetting of Archdiocesan Grants to school ministries
- Advise and consult on capital campaigns involving Catholic schools
- Support local efforts to recruit and retain students and families
- Support local advancement/development efforts to ensure the viability and vitality of school ministries
- Engage in legislative advocacy to support students and families



### Notre Dame ACE Academies (Formerly MTCA)



In 2010, the Notre Dame ACE Academies were founded by the Alliance for Catholic Education (ACE) in response to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' call for a "new model of sponsorship and collaboration" between Catholic institutions of higher education and parish schools. The

network has heeded this call and continues to expand while experiencing both academic and enrollment gains in its schools. First serving in the Dioceses of Tucson, Orlando, and Tampa, the Notre Dame ACE Academies expanded their network this school year, adding one school in Palm Beach and five in the Archdiocese of Indianapolis – Central Catholic, Holy Angels, Holy Cross, St. Anthony, and St. Philip Neri.

"The Archdiocese of Indianapolis has long been a leader in finding innovative ways to serve the educational and spiritual needs of children from some of the lowest income areas in Indianapolis," said Cardinal Tobin. "Partnering with



the Notre Dame ACE Academies will strengthen these five schools by providing students even more resources and opportunities. I'm committed to seeing that these children have the same chance I had to grow up in a community of faith and to receive an excellent Catholic education."

The mission of the Notre Dame ACE Academies is to provide a Catholic education of the highest quality to as many children as possible by mobilizing the resources of the University, the archdiocese, statewide parental choice programs, and local communities. ACE faculty and staff will work closely with school and archdiocesan leaders in Indianapolis to increase academic achievement, boost enrollment, and strengthen schools' Catholic identity by enhancing school leadership, curriculum, instruction, professional development, financial management, and marketing.

Forming New Teachers through University Partnerships

The Archdiocese of Indianapolis is blessed with the opportunity to partner with four outstanding teacher preparation programs through the University of Dayton, the University of Notre Dame, and Marian University. These partnerships allow the archdiocese to help form young, talented, and committed professionals who are excited about forming young people and supporting families in the faith.

The Lalanne Program at the University of Dayton is a post-graduate teacher service program that specializes in supporting aspiring Catholic school educators by combining service and teaching. Teachers make a two-year commitment to teach in an under-resourced



Catholic school, live in a faith-based community, and pursue professional and spiritual/personal development.



The University of Notre Dame's Alliance for Catholic Education (ACE) Teaching Fellows prepares college graduates for service as faith-filled teachers in Catholic schools. ACE provides an intensive

two-year service experience encompassing professional development, community life, and spiritual growth.

**Echo Teaching Theology** offers a pathway for recent college graduates to serve the Church as theology teachers in Catholic middle schools and high schools. In addition to preparation for service as teachers, these professionals

pursue coursework at Notre Dame in biblical studies, the history of Christianity, liturgical studies, moral theology, systematic theology, spirituality, and catechesis.

The Archdiocese of Indianapolis is also blessed to partner with the Educator College at Marian University. Archdiocesan Superintendent Gina Fleming serves on the university's Board of Visitors and says, "Marian University has been critical in helping us build a pipeline in our Catholic schools toward both leadership and classroom teaching positions.

They continue to work with us to see what our needs are and to help bring their teachers into our classrooms in new and different ways."



### A Teacher's Story

My story began long ago, when I was just a young, newly married college student who had recently moved to Indianapolis from Cincinnati. While walking through the halls of the Education Building on the IUPUI campus, I noticed a part-time afterschool job opening on a message board for elementary education students. The job duties included playing with children and helping with homework each day. This was right up my alley! My only concern was that I was not Catholic and that the posting was for a small

Catholic elementary school. That small moment changed my life forever in so many positive ways. I was hired and welcomed unconditionally into the St. Christopher Catholic Schools' After Care Program. I immediately felt a sense of closeness and family working there. In the two years that I worked part-time in the program, I felt like I belonged and just knew that this was a special place that kept drawing me in and keeping me near.

I had also been looking for a church to attend since moving to Indianapolis. I had visited a few, but none felt right until I began going to Mass at St. Christopher. I once again felt a welcoming sense of community. I just knew



somehow that I was meant to be there. Soon, I found myself with a teaching license and was hired at St. Christopher Catholic School. Through incredible examples of faith filled lives shown to me by my coworkers, I continued to be drawn to the Catholic faith. Approximately two years after becoming a teacher at St. Christopher, I decided to join the Church and became Catholic.












2016-2017 Students who Participate in English as a New Language Programming







### Let's Move! Active Schools National Award



St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School (Indianapolis) was one of only three Catholic schools in the nation to be recognized as a *Let's Move! Active School* in 2016. This national distinction is awarded to schools for outstanding efforts to create active school environments that promote learning and wellness for all students. "At St. Thomas Aquinas, educating the whole child and living an integrated, well-balanced life are central to our mission," says Cara Swinefurth, principal of St. Thomas Aquinas.

The *Let's Move! National Award* recognizes outstanding efforts in the areas of physical education, physical activity before and after school, physical activity during school, staff involvement,



and family and community engagement. Research demonstrates that active kids do better. Regular physical activity not only helps kids stay healthy and strong, but it can also lead to higher test scores, improved attendance, increased focus, better behavior in class, enhanced leadership skills, and a lifetime of healthy habits.

The *Let's Move! National Award* is the most recent significant achievement for the school. In 2014, St. Thomas Aquinas earned distinction as a National Green Ribbon School (<u>http://www2.ed.gov/programs/green-ribbon-schools</u>) for its



commitment to environmentally friendly programs, and just this past April, the school's robotics team advanced to the Vex World Championships (<u>http://www.archindy.org/</u> <u>criterion/local/2016/03-25/robotics.html</u>).

### Faith, Love, and Service Guide Teacher Who Receives Archdiocese's Top Educator Honor

Doug Bauman, a proud husband, father of three, and 1995 graduate of Roncalli High School, adds real-life applications to the math classes he teaches at St. Barnabas Catholic School in Indianapolis. Much more importantly, he multiplies the influence he has on his students by sharing his faith and emphasizing service,



qualities that led him to be selected as the 2015-2016 recipient of the *Saint Theodora Guérin Excellence in Education Award*. This is the highest honor for a Catholic educator in the Archdiocese of Indianapolis.

Demonstrating his commitment to continuous professional development, Bauman serves on a team of four teachers at St. Barnabas Catholic School chosen for a special three-year program at the University of Notre Dame. The program focuses on helping teachers inspire student learning in the areas of science,

technology, engineering, and math.

Bauman says that integrating our Catholic faith into teaching and learning is his most important responsibility. At the beginning of every class, a student volunteer leads prayer, shares one of the Mass readings for the day, and Bauman leads the



students in a short reflection focusing on how the message from Sacred Scripture applies to their lives. "Every day, when I walk into my classroom, I'm given an

amazing opportunity and responsibility to teach a group of middle-school students a little bit about the world of math and a whole lot about the incredible sacrificial love that God has for all of us."

Indiana's Tax Credit Scholarship program was created in 2009 as a way to give families who meet income guidelines an opportunity to send their child to a participating private school. Through the generosity of Hoosiers like you, private donations are given as scholarships so students may attend a private school that may not have been an option to them otherwise.

## Why donate?

Donors can help families facing financial barriers to enrollment choose a Catholic education for their children and can also receive a State of Indiana tax credit of 50% of the amount of their donations. Donations also qualify as charitable deductions on federal tax returns.

### Frequently Asked Questions

Is there a limit to how much I can give and still receive a tax credit? No, provided the donation does not exceed the amount of credits made available by the State of Indiana. (The state has allocated \$9.5 million in credits for fiscal year 2017, and the cap resets annually on July 1.)


#### Who receives these scholarships?

Indiana K-12 students who meet income eligibility guidelines and who enroll in participating schools.

### Can I designate a school or student to receive my gift? You may designate your gift to a specific school but not to a specific student.
