athy was a Perry County neighbor who often felt alone and had difficulty making friends. She is a woman of color, and that can sometimes be a challenge, particularly in our area.

Kathy came to Catholic Charities looking for a winter coat during our annual Holiday Helpers coat drive and giveaway. She kept coming back for companionship. She was in a bad relationship and had no one to turn to for

support.

Catholic Charities became her shoulder to lean upon and share her troubles. She was treated with respect and compassion at all times, but she was never lied to and often did not like what she heard. She thought she wanted someone to solve all her problems. However she ended up solving her own problems once she understood that she had the strength to take care of herself.

Kathy had trouble finding a job. She had been in trouble with the legal system before and that made her unemployable in some instances. But she really wanted to work.

Kathy also needed to get out of her current relationship. We put her in touch with Crisis Connection and they helped her work through many of her issues. Kathy moved into her own place when she found a job. Even though the job was temporary it helped provide some stability. She was now safe and providing for herself,

a major boost for self esteem.

What Kathy needed and wanted most was to be around others from her own culture. She not only felt like she didn't fit in, she experienced instances of bigotry. Kathy realized that she was looking for something she would not find in our area, and made the decision to move to Evansville. Catholic Charities put her in touch with services in the Evansville-area and helped her move. She now has a job that she really loves and has found a place to live. Life is looking up for Kathy.

Kathy's story reminds each of us of the need to be accepting of and to be accepted by all of our neighbors. A friendly smile, a welcoming hello, an encouraging word would have gone so far to help this young woman feel accepted in our community. Another "Kathy" may be living next door to you. By your gentle actions, you too can embrace the mission of Catholic Charities: providing help and creating hope.

Partnership Profile: 4C2

atholic Charities continues to be a pivotal member of the 4C2 community partners group working toward helping the poor and vulnerable in our community. We are moving forward in our quest to establish a Community Resource Center for our area.

One of our short term goals is to educate and communicate with other service providers, government officials, school administrations, counseling services, clergy, and interested members of the public.

To this end, our collaboration brought the "Bridges Out of Poverty" program to our area. We quickly registered 80 people for this poverty simulation program, the maximum attendance, as attendees came from several counties, including Perry, Spencer, Crawford, Dubois, Harrison, and Orange.

In the morning, attendees were immersed in the lifestyle of those living in poverty through a simulated month in the life of those struggling to pay bills and feed their families. They dealt with school, day care, hospitals, utilities, pawn shops, community services, among others. They learned hard lessons about transportation, waiting in long lines to get health care, selling their possessions at a low price, and trying to pay bills before the utility office

closed. It was truly an educational and eyeopening experience for those in attendance.

The afternoon was a more in-depth look at the teachings of Dr. Ruby Payne, the founder of the "Bridges Out of Poverty" curriculum and movement. There are two major categories of poverty: generational and situational. This curriculum highlights the reality of generational poverty, and helps others understand this segment of the population and the ways in which we can engage these neighbors to help them be more self sufficient.

Because this program was so well received, we hope to bring more of these presentations and educational opportunities to our area. The members of the 4C2 community partners are Catholic Charities, United Way of Perry County, Lincoln Hills Development Corp., Perry County Community Foundation, and SIRS.
