Chaplaincies

Saint Meinrad Seminary and School of Theology offers initial and continuing education for priests, permanent deacons, and lay ministers. For priesthood students who have not attended a college seminary, a two-year pretheology program allows them to earn a Master of Arts (Catholic Philosophical Studies) degree. The four-year theology program leads to a Master of Divinity degree. Seminarians can also earn a Baccalaureate in Sacred Theology degree.

For lay students, the Master of Arts (Catholic Philosophical Studies) is offered, as well as a Master of Arts (Theology).

The Permanent Deacon Formation Program offers academic, spiritual, and professional formation to permanent deacon candidates and continuing education for deacons, in partnership with dioceses around the country.

Saint Meinrad also offers the Institute for Priests and Presbyterates for ongoing formation of priests and their presbyterates and the "One Bread, One Cup" summer youth conferences and College Ministerial Internship Program.
