The Senate measure would allow any taxpayer on First Amendment grounds, to initiate court tests of nine specific federal acts passed since January 1, 1965. All contain provisions for aid to church-related schools and health programs.

If passed into law, this bill would override a 1923 U.S. Supreme Court ruling denying that payment of federal taxes gives an individual a "standing to sue" against the constitutionality of federal laws.

Oddly, however, the Senate measure would overrule the court only in the case of nine laws, all recent ones dealing with church-related enterprises, and under only one of the 24 Amendments to the Constitution.

If you are beginning to think this bill is the product of super-enthusiasts for radical absolutism in church-state separation, you are right.

The Senate passed the measure over the strong opposition of the U.S. Justice Department, the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and the U.S. Office of Education.

Spokesmen for those agencies warned that such a law would produce a flood of lawsuits to block the execution of federal education and health legislation, and would critically interrupt participation of non-governmental agencies in such programs.

"It would be a disaster," one top HEW official admonished. "There simply are not enough public institutions in existence to take up the slack."

We already have seen portents of things to come if s Senate bill were to become law.

This summer the Maryland Supreme Court declared unconstitutional an ancient program of state grants to certain religious-operated colleges and universities.

More recently the New York Supreme Court struck down a state law—intended to have gone into effect September 1—requiring public schools to lend textbooks to parochial school puplis. This particular decision rightly has been labeled a product of Know-Nothingism. It is based on New York's so-called Baine Amendment of 1875, an anachronistic outgrowth of the anti-Catholic bigotry of that period. bigotry of that period.

The Senate bill (S. 2097) now is in the House Judiciary Committee and, in the national well-being, should be permitted to die there.


