I have read a few books and several articles about finding God in and throughout the moments of the day....not just in prayer, when you really concentrate, but also in those less focused times. We often look to, or look for God when we or someone we know has a struggle, or a cross to bear. We usually recognize God in those joyful times of marriage, birth, and great accomplishments, but are we open to seeing God in all moments of our lives?

For many years I drove about 30 minutes to and from work each day. I took the most scenic route each morning and used the time and the beauty to reflect and talk to God. This time was special to me and a very calming time. After a hectic beginning of preparing my son for his day, and taking him to a babysitter, or to school in the later years, and pulling myself together for work, I enjoyed the solitude of my drive. This time helped me begin my day at work with a more open and accepting attitude. My work place consisted of many unhappy people, with less than positive attitudes. When employees experienced problems with any portion of his or her job, they normally brought those issues to my office. The aura I brought with me at 7:30 AM was diminished by noon! I can admit that my drive home was

not near as pleasant as my drive in each day! This is similar to what some people experience after attending a retreat. They are so pumped up with grace and enthusiasm as they leave, but much of this wears away as they re-enter the ordinary aspects of their life.

For the past six and a half years I have worked here at Fatima Retreat House. My mornings aren't as hectic because my son is older and can take care of himself. My drive to work is much shorter and also less scenic. I still encounter problems but the attitudes are better. There is still an aura but it isn't mine. The aura belongs to the place, the employees, and the volunteers and guests who enter and exit our doors. I find my

peace, my passions, and my God inside this place and its people. I look out my window and see God's creations and I walk through the building and encounter God's blessings. I am surrounded by love, respect, compassion, peace and nature. I am now even more aware of God in all the moments of my day.

Many people who come to Fatima on retreat are able to replenish their spiritual resources and experience God in the moments. This is easier to do in a "holy" place such as Fatima, yet the greater goal is to take the experience, the feeling of peace, with them as they leave so they can share God's gifts and be God's beauty for others.

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A New Moment of Grace

In May 2003, a review of capital assets prompted the Archdiocese of Indianapolis to explore the possibility of turning ownership of Fatima Retreat House over to a religious order who would continue to offer spiritual retreats.

After nearly six months of consultation, analysis, discussion and prayer, Most Rev. Daniel M. Buechlein, O.S.B., Archbishop of Indianapolis, announced October 21 that the Archdiocese will retain ownership of Fatima. In a meeting with Fatima's Board of Directors, Archbishop Daniel said, "Support for keeping Fatima is extraordinarily strong." The news was received with joy by the many friends, volunteers, donors and guests of Fatima Retreat House.

Although some fundraising challenges lie ahead, the Archbishop said he envisions the best possible facility, recognizing that some improvements will need to take place right away while others will have to wait.

When asked about the future for Fatima Retreat House, Archbishop Daniel said he is committed to the mission and ministry of Fatima for the archdiocese and has had wonderful retreat experiences there himself. In response to the financial challenges ahead, he stated, "I will do my best, and added, "I have a personal connection here; there are stained glass windows in the chapel dedicated to my mother and father." Archbishop concluded by saying he did a lot of praying to St. Joseph, and sees Fatima as sharing in a "new moment of grace."
