How to Use 52 Sundays

At different moments in the Church's history, the family has been called the "domestic Church," a term that describes the character and mission of the Christian Family. This section shows how 52 Sundays can help parents build and strengthen the domestic Church.

WHAT EXACTLY IS THE DOMESTIC CHURCH?

The domestic Church is more than just enduring the secular culture and hoping to raise kids who will go to Mass when they grow up. The domestic Church does on a small scale, what the Church universal does on a large scale; it makes disciples. Therefore, the domestic Church is a home where family life is completely centered on the lordship of Jesus Christ, where parents who are disciples of Jesus, embrace their role as leaders to make disciples of their children. The domestic Church is not so much about what family members do; it is a shared way of life that is marked by a lived relationship with Jesus, a quest for holiness, and a missionary focus.

No human community is better equipped to do this than the family. Parents are the first to exhibit behaviors in their home that reflect Gospel values by the way they love and forgive one another, by the way they witness and stand up for what is true and good, by the way they care for aging family members and the natural world around them, and by the way they show mercy to others and model social teaching. As opposed to parish programs that are geared more toward large groups of people, families naturally focus on the particular needs of each individual member. Families also have natural structures of accountability because of how well family members know each other, and because of how much time they spend together. Parents, in their divinely appointed role as spiritual guides, have a level of intimacy and trust with their children, unlike that of a parish volunteer. The family is the perfect "small group" where faith is lived out in real and tangible ways.

Parents can build the domestic Church by weaving a Catholic world around their children and by creating a culture in the home that reinforces the baptismal identity of its members. Parents have control over the religious content, activities, and experiences in the home, and they make decisions on how the family spends its time. Parents help



children see that faith is a lens through which one engages the world. 52 Sundays helps parents build the domestic Church by providing weekly religious content, activities and experiences in the home that are anchored to the Sunday Gospel. These activities help cultivate habits of discipleship that extend beyond Sunday and into the rest of the week. The following are some tips on how to use the content.



Sacred Scripture is the living Word of God; it communicates to us the deepest truths of God and man. It is one of the primary ways that we encounter Jesus, grow deeper in our faith, and discover the graces needed to face life's challenges. Reflection on Sacred Scripture allows God to speak into the concrete circumstances of our lives. Familiarity with Scripture and a biblical worldview are among the greatest gifts parents can give to their children which will have an eternal impact on their life.

52 Sundays contains the Sunday Gospel for each Sunday in 2021 as well as the biblical citations for all the readings of the day. Here are some ways that you can explore the Gospel each week:

- Read the upcoming Sunday Gospel a few days before the weekend for your personal reflection. Listen to what God is saying to you personally and consider how the Gospel story relates to your life.
- × Select a part of the story ahead of time and share it with your children before Mass. Have the children listen for this part when the Gospel is proclaimed.
- Discuss the Gospel as a family after Mass and compare your insights with the homily.
- Parents, read the Gospel as a bedtime story to your children. If a child is very young, tell the story in your own words or use a children's Bible making a connection with God, the people in the story and your child's life. Help your children encounter God through the stories.
- Consider reading and discussing the First and Second Readings or the Psalm. Discover how they relate to one another and how they relate to the Sunday Gospel. All the Sunday readings can be found on the USCCB website under Daily Readings. (https://www.usccb.org/)



MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY

The saints are members of the Church who are with Christ in heaven praying for those in the Church who are still on their pilgrimage of faith. The saints in this year's edition of 52 Sundays all share one thing in common: they are martyrs of the Church. (See the section titled, Featuring the Martyrs: Heroes of the Church, for more information on martyrdom and the unique way they can inspire families.)

Saints help us see how our ordinary lives can be lived out in extraordinary ways. Were these people perfect? Of course not! They knew that they were sinners, but they loved God and they knew how much God loved them. While many of us have heroes in the world of sports or music, the saints are our real heroes; they are the ones who serve as models for our lives. They are our companions, mentors, guides, and trusted friends, who, like us, through sorrows and joys, configured their lives to Christ and are an example for us so that we can do it too! These

are real people, alive in heaven, and only a prayer away! We can call on them with our needs and concerns as we would our own family.

52 Sundays makes it easy to get to know our extended spiritual family by featuring one saint each week. Introducing this saint to your family can be done in a number of ways:

- × Talk about the saint throughout the week.
- Take time to get to know the saint of the week by reading their story at bedtime. Consider getting a book of Catholic saints for children and reading more about the saint of the week. There are many such books available through numerous Catholic publishers.
- * Read, watch movies, or listen to stories about the saint of the week or other saints that inspire you. Take time to understand their life and journey of faith.
- Parents are invited to preview these stories and adapt them to the developmental level of their children.



TAKE TIME TO CHAT

Modern families are mobile and busy! As a result, many families feel they don't have enough time to talk, bond or firmly connect with each other. Having time to talk has many benefits. It is an opportunity to really get to know what is going on in each other's lives; it provides an opportunity to solve problems or disagreements, and it is an opportunity to hand on family values. In addition, listening to one another strengthens relationships. Children, in particular, need to be listened to. Young children can often be dismissed, especially in a busy household. Listening without judgment or agenda and with openness gives them the opportunity to share that which is most important to them.

52 Sundays provides discussion questions on the Gospel passage of the day and questions about the featured saint in order to foster discussion in your family. Discuss these questions at a time that works best for you. Here are some suggestions:

- × In the car on the way home from Mass
- Over breakfast or lunch
- × During your family dinner
- At bedtime when you read the Gospel to your children

The discussion questions in 52 Sundays may stimulate curiosity and lead to more questions. This is a good thing! Sometimes parents get anxious when children ask questions on topics they don't know or understand. It is easy to think that these answers are better left to experts; however, those who don't have all the answers often tend to be better listeners, giving the child the opportunity to explore and ask questions. The curiosity of children is quite possibly the greatest player in their drive to learn. Here are a few pointers that might be helpful in navigating faith conversations:

- * Be docile to the Holy Spirit; the Spirit will prompt you with the right thing to say!
- * If you don't know something, be honest.
 Tell your child that you will research it and get back with him or her. Feel free to contact your pastor or parish staff to help you find the answer. They can even help you know how best to share the information given the age of your child.
- Don't think that questions lead to disbelief.
 Rather, great questions lead to deeper belief.
- * Don't respond to questions with trite answers such as "because that's what the Church teaches" or "because it's true." This is not helpful. Take the time to research and formulate a good response to your child's question.



- × Don't over-answer the question or answer a question they don't have. Be mindful not to firehose them with too much information. Wait for a prompt to offer more information.
- * While it is important to answer your child's question, it is also important to ask them questions. This will help you get at the root of what lies beneath the surface-level questions and what they really want to know.



Family fun is an important part of building a strong family identity. When families have fun together with Christ at the center, it builds a holy bond that can last a lifetime. Traditions are often developed in times of fun. Those traditions help define and individualize each family. In the hustle and bustle of daily life, it can be hard to find time to be together. Therefore, a family activity has been included for each week to help you carve out some intentional time to have family fun! Here are a few things to keep in mind:

- × Plan activities ahead of time, especially if it is an excursion. Check hours of operation, ticket prices, etc.
- × Collect supplies needed for craft projects ahead of time.
- × Consider doing activities with other families from your parish or neighborhood.
- * Do the activity suggested in the book or brainstorm other alternatives as a family.
- × Always keep Jesus at the center of all family activity. Take time to pray together and give thanks.



RECIPE OF THE WEEK

The New Testament attests to the fact that Jesus often used meals to engage with people and teach important lessons. There are so many benefits to families who share a meal together.



Here are just a few:

- Children develop a sense of connection, belonging, and self-esteem when they are with a parent who is present and engaged.
 This relationship is critical during the tween years since youth will turn to the ones they are connected to when things get tough.
- When families eat together, children get the message that family is important, and that they are important to the family.
- × Being with family can alleviate feelings of stress, anxiety, and isolation children may experience at school or in other social settings.

- Your Just by being in their presence each day, parents can pick up on the things kids aren't saying: the verbal and non-verbal cues they're giving, their moods, their habits, and any warning signs of potential problems.
- There is an intimate connection between the celebration of the Eucharist and a meal at home: prayer, listening to important news of the day (Readings and Gospel), talking about issues that are important to the family as a whole (Homily), bringing the food to the table (Presentation of the Gifts), giving thanks, and partaking of the meal (Eucharist).

As your family reclaims the Lord's Day, make Sunday meals a sacred time to connect with each other and with the Lord. Mealtime also provides the perfect opportunity for observing different seasons and feasts of the Catholic Church in our homes, and this book provides some new and exciting recipes to help you do just that. Some of the recipes have a connection to the Gospel, the featured saint, holiday, or season. Others were selected simply because they are super easy or fun to make. Either way, the recipes will add some variety to your meal rotation and provide an opportunity for the whole family to pitch in and help. Here are some things you may want to consider:

- × Plan ahead! Be sure to have all your ingredients ahead of time so that you don't have to run to the store at the last minute.
- × Involve the whole family. Subdivide tasks so that everyone can take part in preparing the meal.
- Create a festive atmosphere by playing music during meal preparation.
- * Make Sunday dinner special by setting a nice table. Flowers and cloth napkins can really dress up the table.
- Pray before your meal using the family prayer provided or your own prayer.
- Make clean-up a family affair! Many hands make light work.





Prayer has the power to dramatically shift the spiritual atmosphere in your home. It's also one of the best ways to help your family thrive. When you pray together, each member of the family learns what it means to be intimate with God. When you see answers to prayer, you experience God's love and his presence in your daily lives. Home life can sometimes be filled with chaos, tension, and stress. Praying helps to restore peace and change perspectives.

Families that pray together, stay together. 52 Sundays provides a Family Prayer each week. These prayers will help your family learn new ways to pray. Families are encouraged to set aside some time each Sunday for the family prayer. It may be helpful to create a dedicated prayer space and/or to light a candle to create an atmosphere of reverence. Choose a time that works best for your family such as:

- × In the morning, before Mass.
- × Before your family dinner.
- × Before bedtime.

Each week's liturgy link is a way for kids (and adults) to better engage at Mass and become more aware of the church environment. Parents are invited to ask the liturgy link questions immediately before or after Mass. If you can't easily find the answer, don't hesitate to ask your pastor or another parish staff member.

Each week, families will be challenged to put the Gospel into action by extending radical hospitality, performing works of mercy, practicing virtues, or doing random acts of kindness.

Featuring the Martyrs: Heroes of the Church

Since the beginning of Christianity, men, women, and children have been tempted to betray their friendship with Christ in big and small ways. For the first three hundred years of Christianity, it was illegal to be a Christian. Every person in the Roman Empire, no matter what their religion, was to honor the Roman emperor as a god. Of course, Christians refused to do this and as a result, were severely tortured; many were put to death. The Roman government did this because they wanted to discourage others from following Christianity. However, the opposite happened. The early Church thrived and grew out of such persecutions!

There are many stories of the deaths of Christians that have passed down to us over the centuries. These Christians who died for their faith are called martyrs. The word "martyr" comes from the Greek word for witness. They are called witnesses because that's exactly what they were doing through their deaths: witnessing to their love for God and their fidelity to him. The stories of these young men and women are incredibly inspiring. Perhaps it's their heroic confidence in the promises of God, their steadfast courage in the face of death, or the drastic nature of their personal sacrifice. While it may seem peculiar

and counterintuitive to celebrate martyrdom, it should be viewed as a triumph. The martyrs remind us that the faithful are conquerors in the battle between good and evil, and that there is no neutral ground between the kingdom of God and the domain of darkness – one must choose one or the other. They show us that endurance for the journey of faith only comes from Christ who gives us supernatural power in the face of adversity. They also remind us that those who sacrifice for the faith will be vindicated and rewarded in the end.

This year's edition of 52 Sundays introduces families to some of the martyrs of the Church. The weekly stories span every age of Christianity and touch on all continents of the world. Some of the stories are well-known and others are not, but each leaves a powerful legacy of faith and fortitude. These stories are recommended for upper elementary-aged children and older, as the act of martyrdom is included in each story. Parents are invited to preview these stories and adapt them to the developmental level of their children.

The history of our Catholic faith can be intense and frightening at times, but it is important not



to shy away from these parts of the story, lest we get an inaccurate picture of the world. It is important to help disciples of every age to understand that bad things do happen in this world, but God has a plan that extends beyond all the bad -- a plan to restore his Kingdom to the way it was intended to be in the beginning, with no more sadness and no more tears. The thousands of men and woman who approached their death filled with the joy and love of God in the power of the Holy Spirit, tells us something huge about life with God. It tells us that his promises are real, and in the end, even death cannot separate us from his love.

Today, many people have rejected faith in God because it is, in their opinion, too restrictive, too hard to understand, or too boring. The lives of the saints attest to the fact that the Christian life is certainly not boring, especially those who are featured in this year's edition of *52 Sundays*. Their lives were filled with adventure, drama, and heroism. We live in a culture that is often hostile to Christian principles and ideals. As disciples of Christ, we are called to stand up for our faith and live in imitation of our Savior. While it is unlikely that any of us will be called to give our lives for the faith, every disciple is called to a daily dying to self and witness to the Gospel. It is our hope that the stories of the martyrs will inspire virtue and a more fervent desire to put ourselves under the Lordship of Jesus Christ and live as his witnesses in the world.

Using 52 Sundays in a Family Small Group Setting

Family small groups are a way that families can grow in their faith together. Family small groups have many benefits. The influence of other faith-filled families will help to reinforce the beliefs and culture you are trying to cultivate in your home. In addition, it serves as an invaluable source of support on the journey of faith. As members of small groups grow closer to Jesus and to each other, they tend to support and minister to one another through life's ups and downs. Conversations with peers tap into shared challenges and experiences in life. Families who participate in small groups testify to the many blessings that come from walking the journey of faith with their peers.



52 Sundays can easily be used in a small group setting. Here are some basic instructions to help you get started:

- Pray about who to invite into your family small group. Invite 2 - 4 families who have an interest in sharing faith and growing in a life of discipleship.
- Select a meeting place. The group may choose to meet at the same home or rotate to a different home each week. When selecting a location, consider available space for both adults and children, pet allergies, and driving distance.
- Choose a start date and a schedule that works for all participants. Families may choose to meet weekly, once per month, or twice per month.
- For each week, preview content and gather supplies ahead of time as needed.
- For each week, select a prayer leader and discussion leader ahead of time. Leaders are encouraged to preview the material and prepare as appropriate.

SAMPLE SESSION OUTLINE (90 MINUTES)

Gather, Socialize, Share a Meal or Snack (20 minutes without a meal)

- Consider using the Recipe of the Week for the meal or snack.
- × Add at least 30 minutes if sharing a meal.

2. Opening Prayer (5 minutes)

- × Gather adults and children together.
- Choose a prayer leader (adult or child) for the opening and closing prayers. Select a different prayer leader for each meeting.
- Prayer leader leads a brief prayer in his or her own words. Alternatively, the prayer leader can use the prayer below:

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Heavenly Father, we thank you for bringing our families together today. Thank you for your love and for knowing each of us by name. Help us come to know Jesus more deeply as we pray and reflect on the Sunday Gospel. Send your Holy Spirit to be with us in the time we spend together. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

3. Discussion and Activities (60 minutes)

Sunday Gospel and Take Time to Chat

* The discussion leader reads the Sunday Gospel out loud.



- * After the Gospel is read, the discussion leader moderates the first three questions under the Take Time to Chat section. The discussion leader may ask all adults and children to answer each question or divide the questions between adults and children. The leader is encouraged to ask open-ended follow-up questions to facilitate more conversation. See Tips for Discussion Leaders below.
- Meet Our Extended Family
- * After reflecting on the Sunday Gospel, the discussion leader shares the saint story. Depending on the age of the children, the discussion leader may read the story as written or summarize the story in an ageappropriate way. The discussion leader

- is encouraged to extend the saint story by sharing any personal insights or research that he or she may have done ahead of time.
- The discussion leader reads the last discussion question under Take Time to Chat and invites the adults and children to share their answers.

Liturgy Link, Family Fun, and Family Challenge

- * Families are invited to share what they discovered through the Liturgy Link.
- Families are also invited to share how they will tackle this week's Family Challenge.
- Families are invited to do the Family Fun activity together. If the activity is an outdoor activity, families may do the closing prayer before proceeding outdoors.

4. Closing Prayer with Intentions (5 minutes)

× Families can pray the Family Prayer together as a closing prayer. Alternatively, the prayer leader may lead the group in a brief closing prayer with time for intentions. Leader can pray using his or her own words or use the prayer below:

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Lord Jesus, thank you for being with us today and for helping us understand the words of the Gospel. Help us to grow as joyful missionary disciples and to support one another on the journey of faith. Give us your grace for all that we need today and throughout the rest of the week.



Jesus, hear the prayers that we bring before you now...
[invite people to state their prayer intentions]

After each intention:

Leader: We pray to the Lord **All:** Lord, hear our prayer

Lord, we gather these prayers and those that remain in our hearts and offer them through the intercession of our Blessed Mother as we pray, Hail Mary. . .

Bless us and be with us until we meet again. We ask this through Christ Our Lord. Amen.

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

× Set up your home to be welcoming, organized, comfortable, and clean.

Tips for Families Who are Hosting Family Small Groups

- Confirm the date of the next meeting and select a prayer leader and a discussion leader for the next session.
- Make sure your participants know where the bathrooms are located, and that they are clean.
- Have snacks and water or other drinks available. Consider having group members rotate providing snacks.
- × Consider sharing a meal together each time you meet, having members contribute to each meal or rotate meal preparation responsibilities.
- × Be mindful of allergies (food, pets, etc.) and other health concerns.
- Consider hiring a babysitter for children who are too young to participate in conversation and providing age-appropriate faith-based activities for them.



Expectations for Small Group Members

- Members are encouraged to make the small group a priority in their schedule and to be on time for meetings.
- * All members have a responsibility to set a tone and group culture that is respectful, humble, open, honest, non-judgmental, and loving.
- Members are encouraged to share while maintaining a balance of participating without dominating.
- × Members listen respectfully and do not interrupt one another.
- * All members agree to keep confidential anything personal shared in the group, unless there is a risk of someone harming themselves or someone else.
- × Members are encouraged to pray for one another in between meetings.





Tips for Discussion Leaders

- × Review and pray with discussion material in advance.
- × You are not a teacher, but a facilitator of discussion.
- × Listen carefully; do not interrupt.
- × Give positive and genuine affirmation for everyone's contributions.
- × Avoid unhelpful tangents.
- × Encourage participation from everyone.
- × Ask additional open-ended questions. For example,
- × Launching Questions What came to mind when you heard the Gospel story? What stands out to you?
- × Observation Questions What effect did the story have on the people who were there? What does this passage reveal to you?
- * Understanding Questions Why is this passage important? Do you understand what it means?
- * Application Questions How does this story apply to you? What will you do now?



- × Do not dominate the conversation.
- × Prevent others from dominating.
- $\boldsymbol{\times}$ Re-phrase comments for clarity. For example, "What I hear you saying is . . ."
- × Allow for periods of silence as a normal part of small group discussion.
- Maintain healthy boundaries in group sharing.
- Pace the conversation, and keep it pleasing to the Holy Spirit (avoid gossip, excessive complaining, etc.).
- × Start and end on time.

The Visit of the Magi

Mt 2:1-12

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saying, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. Assembling all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, He inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. They said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for thus it has been written through the prophet: And you, Bethlehem, land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; since from you shall come a ruler,

who is to shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod called the magi secretly and ascertained from them the time of the star's appearance. He sent them to Bethlehem and said. "Go and search diligently for the child. When you have found him, bring me word, that I too may go and do him homage." After their audience with the king they set out. And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was. They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed for their country by another way.

(Feast Day August 11) January 10, 291 - August 10, 304

It is said that St. Philomena revealed her story to three people who did not know one another and who resided in different parts of the world. These private revelations unveiled the story of St. Philomena's life in great detail and were amazingly identical accounts. One of the revelations came to Sister Maria Luisa di Gesu. St. Philomena came to her and told her she was the daughter of a Greek king who converted to Christianity. When Philomena was 13 years old, she took a vow of consecrated virginity. After her father took his family to Rome to make peace, Emperor Diocletian fell in love with Philomena. When she refused to marry him, she was repeatedly subjected to torture. Yet, in the midst of this torture, God continued to miraculously comfort her and heal her. This infuriated the Emperor

who finally had her beheaded. St. Philomena said to Sister Maria Luisa di Gesu, "My soul took flight towards my heavenly Spouse, who placed me, with the crown of virginity and the palm of martyrdom, in a distinguished place among the elect. That day was so happy for me. . ."

The young virgin willingly traded her earthly life for heavenly salvation and continues her work today promoting the virtues of purity and sanctity among the world's youth and bringing the faithful closer to our Blessed Mother and Jesus Christ. Her name means "daughter of light" (Latin: fila luminis), and she is credited with countless miracles and intercessions since discovery of her tomb in the most ancient catacombs of St. Priscilla in Rome in 1802.



TAKE TIME

Paper Crowns



Make paper crowns for the whole family and wear them at dinner to celebrate the feast of the Epiphany!

Materials:

- thin cardboard (poster board or old cereal boxes work well)
- × foil gift wrap or construction paper
- × scissors
- × paint, crayons, or felt-tip pens
- × glue
- × stapler
- optional: stickers, markers, glitter,
 shapes cut from construction paper

Instructions: Cut a strip of cardboard 3 or 4 inches wide and long enough to go around each person's head and overlap slightly. Cut a piece of construction paper or foil gift wrap the same length but slightly wider (2 inches wider). Glue the construction paper to the cardboard so the bottom edge lines up. Cut a zigzag in the top edge of the construction paper. Note: The construction paper is wider to make it easier to cut the zigzag; it is difficult to cut the zigzag from the cardboard. Decorate using markers, glitter or stickers. Make a ring with the cardboard facing in (toward the head) and the paper facing out and staple to make a crown.





Epiphany is celebrated in different ways all over the world. In England, there is a custom of blessing apple trees. Enjoy this apple dessert on this holy day.

- × 8 large apples, peeled and sliced
- × 1 tsp. cinnamon
- × 1 cup brown sugar
- × 1 cup granulated sugar
- × 1 cup flour
- × 1 egg
- × 1/2 tsp. salt
- × 1 tsp. baking powder
- × 1/2 cup melted butter (optional)

Preheat oven to 350 F. Place sliced apples in greased 9x13 baking dish. Combine cinnamon and brown sugar. Sprinkle ½ of mixture over apples. Combine granulated sugar, flour, egg, salt, and baking powder. Spread this mixture over apples, which will

act as a crust. Sprinkle remaining cinnamon/brown sugar mixture over top. Optional: pour butter over everything. Bake for 40 minutes or until golden brown and bubbly.

Epiphany House Blessing

This ceremony of the blessing of the home and the inscription of the initials of the three Magi above each door can be performed by the head of the family or another designated family member. Have some chalk on hand in preparation for the prayer.

Leader: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. **All:** Amen.

Leader: From the east came the Magi to Bethlehem to adore the Lord; and opening their treasures they offered precious gifts: gold for the great King, incense for the true God, and myrrh in symbol of His burial. The star burned like a flame, pointing the way to God, the King of kings. The wise men saw the sign and brought their gifts in homage to their great King.

Lord, bless this chalk, and let it be a help to our family. Let us use it with faith in your most holy name, and with it inscribe on the doors of their homes the names of your saints, Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar, may through their merits and intercession enjoy health in body and protection of soul; through Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.

Leader: O Lord, Almighty God, bless our home that it may become a shelter of health, chastity, humility, goodness, mercy, obedience to the commandments, and thanksgiving to God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. May your blessing come upon this house, those who live here, and those who visit, through Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.

After the prayers of the blessing are recited, inscribe the initials of the Magi upon the main entrance of your home as indicated below:

$$20 + C + M + B + 21$$

The initials, C, M, B, can also be interpreted as the Latin phrase Christus mansionem benedicat - which means "Christ bless this house."
The plus signs represent the cross, and the numbers in the beginning and end mark the year.

Leader: Let us pray together the prayer that Jesus taught us. Our Father . . . **All:** Amen.

St. Justin Martyr

(Feast Day June 1) 100 – 165

St. Justin Martyr was born in Flavia Neapolis (present day Nablus, about 30 miles north of Jerusalem) around the year 100. He was born a pagan and educated in philosophy. At the age of 30, he happened to cross paths with an old man walking along the beach who questioned him about his beliefs and especially about the sufficiency of philosophy as a means of attaining truth. Over time, Justin had been persuaded of the superiority of the Christian creed over all other beliefs and philosophies, and seen this belief made manifest in the witness of Christians.

Martyrdom was for him the highest proof of the truth of Christianity. Nobody, he said, died for the teaching of Socrates. Justin's heart burned within him as he realized that he had finally found the Truth he had searched for all his life.

Much like St. John the Baptist, Justin was a great apologist (defender of the faith), engaging in debates with scholars. He wrote numerous works about the faith. For his staunch adherence to the Christian religion, Justin (like John the Baptist) was beheaded in Rome in the year 165.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Ramaki (Water chestnuts wrapped in bacon)

As we celebrate Jesus' baptism by water, enjoy this water chestnut recipe!

- × 6-8 cans of whole water chestnuts
- × soy sauce
- × brown sugar
- × 2 packages of center cut bacon

Preheat oven to 350 F. Marinate the water chestnuts in soy sauce, overnight if possible. Put brown sugar in a bowl and cut each bacon slice into 3 pieces. First roll the marinated water chestnuts into the brown sugar and set them in a baking dish until you are finished with all the water chestnuts. Once you have finished your first step then wrap each chestnut in bacon, secure with a toothpick and place it back in the same baking dish. Bake at 350 F for 1.5 hours turning once midway.

Fabian was a layman who came into the city of Rome from his farm one day as people were preparing to elect a new pope. Fabian may have come for the same reason many still come to Rome today during a papal election: concern for the future of the faith, curiosity about the

new pope, and a desire to grieve for the pope who had passed. Many important people gathered to make this momentous decision. During the deliberations, a dove descended from the ceiling and settled on the head of Fabian. The people interpreted this as a sign that Fabian was worthy to be pope, and much to Fabian's surprise, he was elected.

With Fabian's election, the Church entered a time of peace and Fabian was able to build up the structure of the Church of Rome. The emperor at the time, Philip, was friendly to Christians; the persecution stopped, and Christians gained acceptance. However, when Philip died, so did the time of peace. The new emperor, Decius, ordered all Christians to deny Christ. Many didn't have the courage to stand up for their faith, but Fabian did. He died a martyr in the year 250.

Chicken Cacciatore Slow Cooker Recipe

Enjoy this Italian meal in honor of St. Fabian, whose story started in Rome.

- × 1 bag frozen chicken breast tenderloins
- × 1 -14oz. can tomato paste
- × 1/3-1/2 cup red cooking wine
- × 4-5 whole cloves garlic chopped
- × 3 jars tomato basil sauce
- × whole mushrooms
- × 1/4 tsp. dried basil
- × 1/4 tsp. black pepper
- × 1/4 tsp. red pepper flakes
- × 1/4 tsp. salt
- × 1 chopped red pepper
- v optional:sliced/diced oniondried rosemary 1/4 tsp.

Combine all ingredients in crock pot. Cook on low for 7 hours or on high for 3-4 hours.





In today's Gospel, Jesus changes Simon's name to Peter and gives him a special role in the early Church. Today's prayer will use Lectio Divina to help you reflect on the fact that Jesus calls you by name as well.

Lectio Divina (Latin: "divine reading") is a way of developing a closer relationship with God by reflecting prayerfully on his words in Sacred Scripture. In Lectio Divina, the chosen passage is read three times in total, giving an opportunity to think deeply about it and respond thoughtfully.

Choose a reader for the passage on the next page. After each reading, allow for a minute or two of silence to let the words sink in. Listen for any words or phrases that seem to jump out. After the third reading, pray about what God is calling you to focus on today. Family members are invited to share their experience afterward. This formula can be used for any Scripture passage.

(Feast Day April 3) d. 304

St. Agape, St. Chionia, and St. Irene were three virgin sisters from Thessalonica, Macedonia. According to Christian tradition, Agape and her sisters were martyred for the faith in the year 304. They were convicted of possessing sacred scriptural texts despite a decree issued in

303 by the Emperor Diocletian naming such possessions a crime punishable by death. During their trial, the sisters refused to make a sacrifice to the pagan gods and were martyred. Even though it would have been seemingly easy for Agape to momentarily push her faith aside to keep her life, she said, "I believe in the living God and will not by an evil action lose all the merits of my past life." She was wise enough to know that one small evil action can have enormous consequences.



Miki and
Companions

(Feast Day February 6) 1545 – 1597

When the first missionaries came to Japan in 1549, they were welcomed, and many Japanese people became Christians. When the Japanese leader Hideyoshi took command, he feared that Christians would take over the government, so in 1587 he banished them and destroyed many of their churches. On December 8, 1596, Hideyoshi arrested and condemned to death the friars of Miako. Among them were Paul Miki and his companions: missionary priests, brothers, laymen, catechists, doctors, artisans, servants, and innocent children.

Paul Miki was born in Japan and educated by the Jesuits. He would have been the very first Japanese priest if he had escaped arrest, for he had already completed his studies for the priesthood. From his cross he forgave his persecutors and told the people to ask Christ to show them how to be truly happy.

Some missionary priests stayed and went into hiding, dressing like the Japanese people in order to minister to the Christians. When missionaries returned to Japan in the 1860s, at first they found no trace of Christianity. But after establishing themselves, they found that thousands of Christians lived around Nagasaki and that they had secretly preserved the faith for over 200 years. Beatified in 1627, the martyrs of Japan were finally canonized in 1862.

Enjoy this delicious Japanese dish in honor of St. Paul Miki.

- × 3 Tbsp. seasoned rice vinegar
- × 3 cups cooked sushi rice
- × 1/2 cup cream cheese, softened
- × 1/2 cup Kewpie mayonnaise
- 6 ounces imitation crab, shredded and roughly chopped
- × 1/4 cup green onion, sliced
- x 1/4 cup furikake (Japanese seasoning)
- × Optional: nori sheets, wasabi, soy sauce

Cook sushi rice according to package instructions. Preheat oven to 450 F. In a large bowl, mix rice with seasoned rice vinegar until well combined. In a separate bowl, combine cream cheese, mayonnaise, crab and green onion and fold until combined. Spread the rice into a 9x13 baking dish and smooth out along the bottom. Sprinkle the half of the furikake over the rice. Layer the crab mixture over the top, and top with the rest of the furikake. Bake for 15 minutes or until bubbly and slightly browned on top. The Cure of Simon's Mother-in-Law, Other Healings, and Jesus Leaves Capernaum

Mk 1:29-39

On leaving the synagogue

He approached, grasped her hand, and helped her up.

Then the fever left her and she waited on them.

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



(Feast Day February 12) d. 304

St. Victoria of Albitina was born in North Africa. She converted to Christianity when she was still a youth. Victoria refused an arranged marriage to a young nobleman and on her wedding day she escaped through a window in her parents' house. She sought refuge in a nearby church and there dedicated her life to God.

Her pagan brother tried to intercede with the judge by claiming she was insane; she disproved this by engaging in a debate with the judge. The judge was willing to release her if she agreed to her brother's supervision, but she refused, saying she would obey only God. The judge, knowing her family, pleaded with her to not throw away her life on what he considered a fantasy; she proclaimed that she was a Christian, that she was loyal to God, and that she had taken part in the Eucharist. She was noted during her imprisonment for her courage. She was later martyred with 45 fellow parishioners.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Hot Roast Beef Party Sandwiches

Peter's mother-in-law hosted people at her house just after Jesus healed her. This is a great recipe whether you are hosting people or simply gathering with your family.

- × 2 (9-oz) pkgs. dinner rolls
- × 2/3 cup peach preserves
- × 1/2 cup mustard/mayo blend (Grey Poupon has a great dijon blend)
- × 3/4 lb. thinly sliced deli roast beef
- × 1/2 lb. thinly sliced Havarti cheese
- × salt and pepper to taste

Remove rolls from packages. Do not separate rolls. Cut rolls in half horizontally, creating one top and one bottom per package. Spread preserves on top side of rolls; spread mustard-mayo on bottom side of rolls; top with beef and cheese. Sprinkle with salt and pepper if desired. Put two halves together, preserves side down, and wrap in aluminum foil. To make ahead, prepare recipe until this point. Freeze up to one month and thaw overnight in refrigerator and bake as directed. Bake at 325 F for 20-25 minutes or until cheese is melted. Slice into individual sandwiches. Optional: Add ½ cup toasted walnuts to add crunch.

The Cleansing of a Leper

Mk 1:40-45

A leper came to Jesus and kneeling down begged him and said, "If you wish, you can make me clean."

Moved with pity, he stretched out his hand, touched him, and said to him, "I do will it. Be made clean."

The leprosy left him immediately, and he was made clean.

Then, warning him sternly, he dismissed him at once.

He said to him, "See that you tell no one anything, but go, show yourself to the priest and offer for your cleansing what Moses prescribed; that will be proof for them."

The man went away and began to publicize the whole matter. He spread the report abroad so that it was impossible for Jesus to enter a town openly. He remained outside in deserted places, and people kept coming to him from everywhere.

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



St. Lucy Yi Zhenmei (Feast Day February 19) December 9, 1815 - February 19, 1862

Lucy Yi was born in 1815 in China. Lucy was the youngest child in her family and was very dedicated in her prayer life. At the age of 12, she decided to consecrate her life to God. She loved reading and learning. When she was 20 years old and pursuing her college education she fell ill. After her recovery

Lucy took her spiritual life still more seriously. She knew she could not leave her family to become a nun because they needed her financial help. Instead, she prayed daily and worked to support them. After her father died, she lived with her brother and mother, using part of her time to teach the faith to children nearby. Lucy Yi later became a missionary, and while on a mission trip in 1862, she entered a region that was hostile to Christians. The local governor imprisoned and sentenced to death the priest and several missionaries in their group. She was among those who were sentenced to death because she refused to renounce her faith. The following day she was executed. St. John Paul II canonized St. Lucy Yi and her companions on October 1, 2000.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Chocolate Mint Icebox Cake

Enjoy this sweet treat for St. Valentine's Day!

- x 1 package (9 ounces) chocolate wafers
- × 1 3/4 cups chilled heavy cream
- × 3/4 tsp. mint extract
- × 1 cup miniature chocolate chips
- × 1/4 cup sugar

Make the mint cream: With an electric mixer, beat heavy cream, sugar, and mint extract until stiff peaks form.

Line a serving platter with two sheets of wax paper side by side. Assemble the cake: Spread each wafer with about ½ Tbsp. mint cream, forming stacks. Lay stacks horizontally along seam of wax paper, pressing gently to form a log. With a small spatula or knife, cover log with remaining cream. Refrigerate at least 4 hours and up to 2 days. To serve, gently remove wax paper from underneath cake (holding cake in place with a metal spatula if necessary). Sprinkle with chocolate chips. Slice cake diagonally with a serrated knife. Serves 8.

If left untreated, it can cause nerve damage that can result in crippling of hands and feet, paralysis, and blindness. The bacteria that causes leprosy was discovered by G. H. Armauer Hansen in Norway in 1873. The first effective treatment (promin) became available in the 1940s. In the 1950s, dapsone was introduced.

Bl. Charles de Foucauld

(Feast Day December 1) d. 1916

Blessed Charles de Foucauld was born into an aristocratic family in Strasbourg, France. When he was a teenager, Charles distanced himself from the faith and claimed that he no longer believed in God. In 1876, Charles joined the French army and was sent to Algeria. His experience in the army inspired him to take up travel and exploration. Charles set out for a one-year exploration expedition to Morocco. Because Europeans were forbidden in Morocco, Charles disguised himself as a Jew.

When he returned to France, he felt a strong interior grace to go back to Church. He would spend long hours there repeating this strange prayer: "My God, if you exist, allow me to know you!" Eventually, Charles felt the call to leave everything and follow Jesus. He became a Trappist monk, and after 7 years, Charles left the monastery and worked as a gardener and sacristan for the Poor Clare nuns in Nazareth, and then later in Jerusalem. At the age of 43, he returned to France and was ordained a priest. Later that year Charles journeyed to Beni-Abbes, Morocco, to serve among the Tuareg people, a nomadic ethnic group. He was deeply respectful of the faiths and cultures he lived among and became a "brother" to the people. De Foucauld was the inspiration for the founding of several lay associations, religious communities, and secular institutes of laity and priests. He was assassinated by a band of men at his hermitage in the Sahara on Dec. 1, 1916. On May 26, 2020, Pope Francis approved a second miracle attributed to de Foucauld's intercession, paving the way for his canonization.

The Transfiguration of Jesus

Mk 9:2-10

Jesus took Peter, James, and John and led them up a high mountain apart by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no fuller on earth could bleach them. Then Elijah appeared to them along with Moses, and they were conversing with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus in reply, "Rabbi, it is good that we are here! Let us make three tents: one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." He hardly knew what to say, they were so terrified. Then a cloud came, casting a shadow over them; from the cloud came a voice, "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him." Suddenly, looking around, they no longer saw anyone but Jesus alone with them.

As they were coming down from the mountain, he charged them not to relate what they had seen to anyone, except when the Son of Man had risen from the dead. So they kept the matter to themselves, questioning what rising from the dead meant.

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



St. Feast Day November 12 c. 1580- November 12, 1623

St. Josaphat was born John Kuncevic in about 1580 in a village of the Province of Volhynia (then a part of the Polish Kingdom, now modern-day Ukraine). His parents belonged to the Eastern Rite Church of Kyiv (Ukraine) which was then separated from Rome. When

John was just a child, his mother explained theicons in church. Years later he told a friend that he felt a spark of fire leave the wounded side of Christ (pictured in the icon) and enter his own heart, which was filled with joy. This event influenced the rest of his life. Within him grew the desire to suffer for his Savior.

John's father sent him to Wilno, where the topic of reunification of the Eastern Rite Church with the Roman Catholic Church was a hotly debated topic. In 1595, the local bishops held a synod and voted to unite with Rome. In the meantime, John made his profession of faith, then entered the Basilian Monastery of the Holy Trinity in Wilno and took the name of Josaphat. He was ordained a priest in 1609, and eventually became the Bishop of Plock. He at once called a Synod to revitalize his diocese where he pursued the reunion of all with Rome. This was met with hostility and Josaphat suffered much slander.

Josaphat was eventually removed from Plock and cruelly killed on November 12, 1623. He was forty-five years old. Josaphat's death brought a movement toward Catholicism and unity.

Marshmallow and Popcorn Balls

Transform these simple ingredients into something dazzling!

- × 15 cups popped popcorn, which is 1/2 cup popcorn kernels popped
- × 6 Tbsp. butter or margarine
- × 5 cups miniature marshmallows
- × 3/4 tsp. vanilla extract
- × cooking spray

Pop the popcorn and remove any kernels that did not pop. Place popcorn in large bowl that has been sprayed with cooking spray. Prepare a large baking dish or piece of parchment paper. Heat butter and marshmallows over medium-low heat until melted, stirring often. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. (Optional: also add ½ tsp. salt for a kettle-corn flavor) Pour

mixture over the popcorn, tossing or stirring to make sure all the popcorn is coated evenly. Let mixture cool enough to touch. Spray cooking spray on your hands and form a cup of popcorn into a ball. Place each ball in the baking dish or on the parchment paper. Continue until you use all the mix, spraying additional cooking spray on your hands as needed. Munch and enjoy!

Since the Passover of the Jews was near,

and spilled the coins of the money changers

and overturned their tables,

At this the Jews answered and said to him,

"What sign can you show us for doing this?"

The Jews said,

"This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and you will raise it up in three days?"

But he was speaking about the temple of his body.

Therefore, when he was raised from the dead,
his disciples remembered that he had said this,
and they came to believe the Scripture
and the word Jesus had spoken.

While he was in Jerusalem for the feast of Passover, many began to believe in his name when they saw the signs he was doing.

But Jesus would not trust himself to them because he knew them all, and did not need anyone to testify about human nature.

He himself understood it well.

Sts. Perpetua and Felicity

(Feast Day March 7) d. 203

Saints Perpetua and Felicity were Christian martyrs who lived during the early persecution of the Church in Africa by the Emperor Severus. Perpetua, a well-educated noblewoman, made the decision to follow the path of her mother and became a Christian, although she knew it could mean her death during the persecutions ordered by the Emperor Severus.

Her pagan father was frantic with worry and tried to talk her out of her decision. At 22-years-old, the well-educated, high-spirited woman had every reason to want to live -- including a baby son whom she was still nursing.

Perpetua was arrested with four other catechumens, including Felicity who was eight months pregnant, and their instructor in the faith, Saturus. Perpetua was baptized before she was taken to prison. She was known for her gift of "the Lord's speech" and receiving messages from God. At the time of her baptism she was told by God to pray for nothing but endurance in the face of her trials.

While in prison, Perpetua was able to visit with her baby. Her father came and begged her to change her mind. When she and the others were taken to be examined and sentenced, the judge, out of pity, tried to get her to change her mind, but she did not back down. For their unwillingness, all were sent to the public games in the amphitheater. Felicity gave birth to a girl a few days before the games commenced. There Perpetua and Felicity were beheaded, and the others killed by beasts.

TAKE TIME TO CHAT

- × Jesus was angry with the merchants in the temple because they were cheating the people. Have you ever been cheated? How did that make you feel?
- × Jesus was also angry because the merchants were robbing the people of the opportunity to worship and pray. Have you ever been distracted in prayer? What did you do to push away the distractions?
- × Everything that Jesus says is important, but sometimes the people in the story don't understand what he means. For example, in today's Gospel, the people didn't understand what Jesus meant when he said, "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up." What do you do when you don't understand something that Jesus says?
- × Perpetua and Felicity were brave women who knew that God would take care of them and their families, even though they were punished for being Christians. Share a time when you did something brave with God's help.

God Made vs. Human Made



We hear in today's Gospel about what people have made (the temple) and what originates from God (Jesus). This game is a fun and easy way to teach young children about God as creator and giver of all good gifts. Point to an object and ask, "human-made or God-made?" Children are then invited to respond. This game is a lot of fun and can lead to many teachable moments. For example, is a car human-made or God-made? A car is human-made but God gave the human the intelligence and creativity to design it and the strength and diligence to assemble it. Isn't God good?



Today's Gospel teaches us that it took forty-six years to build the Jerusalem temple! Build this delicious salad in just one day! This recipe is meant for a party so feel free to cut it in half for a smaller crowd.

- × 3 heads of lettuce, shredded
- × 1 bag of frozen peas, thawed
- × 6 hard-boiled eggs, chopped
- × 6 slices of cooked bacon, crumbled
- × 6 slices of cooked bacon, crumbled
- × 8 ounces shredded cheddar cheese (can substitute swiss cheese or combine the two)
- × 2 envelopes of Hidden Valley ranch dressing mix
- × 2 cups of mayonnaise
- × 2 cups of sour cream
- × Optional: paprika

In a large bowl, layer lettuce, peas, eggs, bacon, and cheese. In another bowl, make the dressing by mixing together the mayonnaise, sour cream, and ranch mix. Spread the dressing over the top layer in the bowl. Sprinkle with paprika, if desired. Cover the bowl and refrigerate the salad for up to 24-hours. Right before serving, toss the salad with the dressing and mix well. Enjoy!

Jesus said to Nicodemus:

For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come toward the light, so that his works might not be exposed.


But whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God.

Moscoso-

Cárdenas



(Feast Day May 4) April 21, 1846 – May 4, 1897

Victor Emilio Moscoso-Cárdenas was born in Cuenca in Ecuador on April 21, 1846. He studied law in college but felt drawn to the religious life, so he abandoned his studies in order to join the Jesuits in 1864. He began his novitiate in Cuenca where the Jesuits had settled since the order was forced to leave Quito due to the anti-religious sentiment and persecution at the time. Moscoso studied in the San Luis college where he did his philosophical studies.

Moscoso first began his duties as a priest and as a teacher. He was known for his kind and generous personality and a serene, simple, and humble character. In 1895 the Liberal Revolution broke out in Ecuador, which triggered a series of persecutions and a wave of anti-religious sentiment against religious orders and priests. On May 4, 1897, the soldiers who were authorized to take priests as prisoners, barged into the church, killed

several people, and broke the tabernacle. The men proceeded to throw the hosts to the ground and drink the wine mocking the sacraments. They found Moscoso in a room kneeling. There, he was shot and killed. On February 5, 2019, Pope Francis -- himself a Jesuit – approved his beatification and declared that he had been killed "in odium fidei" (in hatred of the faith).

TAKE TIME

- × Why was it necessary for God to send his Son into the world to die for our sins?

- × In today's Gospel, Jesus refers to himself as "light" and says that some prefer darkness to light. Why would someone prefer darkness (to do evil works) rather than follow Jesus?
- × Where do you see darkness and light in the story of Bl. Victor Emilio Moscoso-Cárdenas?

FAMILY FUN Flashlight Tag



To remember that Jesus is the light shining in the darkness, play a game of flashlight tag tonight. When it starts to get dark, select one person to be "it." The person who is "it" gets a flashlight and counts to 50 with their eyes closed. While he or she is counting, everyone else hides. When the person is finished counting, he or she has to find the others by shining the flashlight on them. The next person who becomes "it" is either the first or the last person found.





RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Potato Garlic Soup with Rosemary Butter

We can take comfort in knowing that God sent his Son to save us. Enjoy this comfort food today!

- × 4-5 cups chicken broth or bone broth for extra protein
- × 6 whole garlic cloves, peeled
- × 4-5 large russet or Yukon Gold potatoes, peeled and chunked
- × 1 cup whole milk
- × salt to taste
- × 1/8 tsp. white pepper
- × 1 Tbsp. finely chopped rosemary
- × 1/4 cup butter

Place broth, garlic cloves and potatoes in pot. Bring to a boil and lower to simmer until potatoes are tender. Carefully blend ingredients with immersion blender or slightly cool to puree in batches in blender until smooth. Add milk and salt and pepper to taste. Prepare garnish by adding rosemary to butter. Garnish with generous dollop of chopped fresh rosemary butter.

The Coming of Jesus' Hour

Jn 12:20-33

Some Greeks who had come to worship at the Passover Feast came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and asked him, "Sir, we would like to see Jesus." Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Amen, amen, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit. St. Magdalene of Nagasaki

(Feast Day October 20) 1611 - 1634

Magdalene of Nagasaki was a Japanese woman who, in spite of great danger and difficulty, remained faithful to Jesus Christ until her martyrdom. Magdalene was born in the early seventeenth century into a devout Christian family. Her parents were martyred around 1620, when Magdalene was in her teens.



It was around this time that the first Augustinians arrived in Japan. As a committed Christian, Magdalene made herself known to them. She served as a catechist and interpreter for the early Augustinian missionaries. She found their Augustinian spirituality appealing, with its emphasis on the interior search for God and community. She asked to be accepted into the Order of Saint Augustine, and in 1625 was formally received into the Augustinian Third Order. She considered becoming a full-fledged Dominican sister, but continued religious persecution kept her from doing so.

As persecution of Christians in Japan became stronger, Magdalene fled to the hills, where she worked at bringing the Word of God to those who did not know Jesus and strengthening the faith of those who did. As a follower of Jesus, she was threatened, ridiculed, tortured, and killed, but through it all, her Christian witness was strong. Pope John Paul II canonized her in 1987.

TAKE TIME TO CHAT

- × In today's Gospel, Jesus says that when a grain of wheat dies and falls to the ground, it produces much fruit. Share an example of how this happens in nature.
- × In what way do we benefit from Jesus' death?
- * The Gospel makes it clear that those who put Jesus first gain eternal life. Is it easy or hard to put Jesus first? Explain your answer.
- × Why have Christians been persecuted in every age of history?

RECIPE OF

Baked Parmesan Chicken

In the Gospel of John, Jesus' "hour" refers to the hour of his Passion and Death. This easy recipe bakes in just one hour.

- × 3 lbs. bone-in chicken thighs
- × 1 cup of breadcrumbs
- × 1 cup of grated parmesan cheese
- × garlic salt to taste
- × pepper to taste
- × paprika to taste

Preheat oven to 350 F. Rinse chicken thighs. Pour remaining ingredients in plastic bag. Coat each thigh by placing it in the bag and shaking it. Place chicken in one layer in a baking dish. Add 1/3 cup of water to the bottom of the dish. Dot each chicken thigh with butter or margarine. Bake for 1 hour. Enjoy!

The Entry into Jerusalem

Mk 11:1-10 (The Gospel at the Procession with Palms)

When Jesus and his disciples drew near to Jerusalem, to Bethphage and Bethany at the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village opposite you, and immediately on entering it, you will find a colt tethered on which no one has ever sat. Untie it and bring it here.

If anyone should say to you,

'Why are you doing this?' reply,

'The Master has need of it

and will send it back here at once."

So they went off

and found a colt tethered at a gate outside on the street, and they untied it.

Bl. Diego Luis de San Vitores and St. Pedro Calungsod

(Feast Day April 2) 1627 - 1672, 1654 - 1672

Fr. Diego Luis de San Vitores was a Jesuit missionary who was granted permission to serve in the Philippines. As he was making his way there, the ship carrying him stopped in Guam and Fr. Diego Luis vowed to return there. He arrived in Guam in 1668 along with Pedro Calungsod and a group of Jesuit missionaries and lay assistants from the Philippines. Fr. Diego Luis believed that young men, strong in their faith like Calungsod, would be helpful in influencing the youth. The Jesuit missionaries only chose those catechists and assistants

who were outstanding models of Christian life to accompany them on their missions. Calungsod, a native of the Philippines, was in his late teens when he came to Guam. In 1669, Fr. Diego Luis established the first Catholic church in Guam.

After the death of a friendly local chief who had supported the missionaries, members of the Chamorro (an indigenous tribe) rose against the missionaries. Fr. Diego Luis and Pedro Calungsod were both martyred on April 2, 1672. After the murders, the Christian Faith spread quickly throughout Guam. Blessed Diego Luis was beatified in 1985 by Pope John Paul II, and St. Pedro Calungsod was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI in 2012.

- What strikes you when you hear the story of the Lord's Passion?
- The soldiers beat Jesus and made fun of him. How do you think that made Jesus feel?
- × What would it have been like to be Simon of Cyrene?
- In what way do the saints who have died for their faith imitate Christ?

Q-Tip and Finger Painting

You will need various colors of paint, paper (or paper plates), paint brushes, water, and newspaper or something to keep the paint from getting on the floor. Consider creating a donkey (with your handprint), Jesus, Pilate, the guards, the cross, Peter, the Last Supper, etc.



RECIPE OF

Stuffed Red Peppers

As you prepare this meal, reflect on how the veil of the sanctuary was torn from top to bottom.

- × 4 large red peppers
- × 2 Tbsp. vegetable oil
- × 1 lb. ground sirloin
- × 1 chopped Vidalia onion
- × 2 cups cooked rice
- × 2 tsp. garlic salt
- × 1 tsp. black pepper
- × 1 Tbsp. finely chopped garlic
- × 1 large can crushed tomatoes
- × 1 8 oz. can tomato paste
- x 1 Tbsp. chopped fresh Italian parsley
- × 1-2 cups shredded mozzarella

Heat oven to 350 F. Cut peppers in half from the top to the bottom, removing the stem and seeds. Rinse. Put them in a pot of boiling water for 3 minutes. Remove and dry. Meanwhile, in a skillet, cook the onion and garlic in vegetable oil for 3 minutes. Then, add beef, parsley, garlic salt and pepper and brown. Drain any fat. Stir in the cooked rice, tomatoes and paste. Cook for 2 minutes. Lay the peppers down in a 9 x 13 baking pan. Stuff the mixture into each half. Put the remaining mixture around the peppers. Cover with foil. Bake for 15 minutes. Uncover. Cover the top with mozzarella and bake for 15 minutes without foil on. Enjoy!

The Washing of the Disciples' Feet

Jn 13:1-15

Before the feast of Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to pass from this world to the Father.

He loved his own in the world and he loved them to the end. The devil had already induced Judas, son of Simon the Iscariot, to hand him over.

So, during supper,

fully aware that the Father had put everything into his power and that he had come from God and was returning to God, he rose from supper and took off his outer garments.

He took a towel and tied it around his waist.

Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and dry them with the towel around his waist. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him,



"Master, are you going to wash my feet?"

Jesus answered and said to him,

"What I am doing, you do not understand now,
but you will understand later."

Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet."

Jesus answered him,

"Unless I wash you, you will have no inheritance with me."

Simon Peter said to him,

"Master, then not only my feet, but my hands and head as well."

Jesus said to him,

"Whoever has bathed has no need except to have his feet washed,
for he is clean all over;
so you are clean, but not all."

For he knew who would betray him;
for this reason, he said, "Not all of you are clean."

So when he had washed their feet and put his garments back on and reclined at table again, he said to them, "Do you realize what I have done for you? You call me 'teacher' and 'master,' and rightly so, for indeed I am. If I, therefore, the master and teacher, have washed your feet, you ought to wash one another's feet.

I have given you a model to follow, so that as I have done for you, you should also do."

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



(Feast Day August 10) c. 225 - August 10, 258

Lawrence was a Roman deacon under Pope Sixtus II. We know very little about his life, but he has made a deep and lasting impression on the early Church. In AD 258, Emperor Valerian issued an edict: all bishops, priests and deacons must be put to death. Saint Lawrence, other deacons, and Pope Sixtus II were apprehended. The Pope was killed, but the emperor offered to spare Lawrence's life, in exchange for his handing over of "the treasures of the Church." He imagined that the Christians must have considerable treasure because of the sacred vessels that were used at Mass. Lawrence acknowledged

that the Church was indeed rich and asked for time to get everything in order and make an inventory. After three days he gathered a great number of blind, lame, maimed, leprous, orphaned, and widowed persons and put them in rows. When the emperor arrived, Lawrence simply said, "These are the treasures of the Church." The emperor was so angry he had a great gridiron prepared with coals beneath it, and had Lawrence's body placed upon it. After the martyr had suffered the pain for a long time, the legend concludes, he made his famous cheerful remark: "It is well done. Turn me over!"

St. Lawrence is buried in Rome and the basilica built over his tomb has become one of the seven pilgrim churches in Rome.

TAKE TIME TO CHAT

- In today's Gospel, Jesus demonstrates humble service by washing the disciples' feet. What does it mean to be humble? Why is humility an attractive quality in an individual?
- Share a time when you performed an act of service for someone. How did that make you feel?
- * At the Mass of the Lord's Supper, we celebrate Jesus' Last Supper and the institution of the Eucharist. Why is the Eucharist important to you?
- St. Lawrence presented to the emperor those who were outcast and called them the treasures of the Church. Why are people more important than gold and riches?

FAMILY FUN Family Foot Washing



On Holy Thursday, we remember the Last Supper and the institution of the Eucharist. At the Mass of the Last Supper, we hear the story from the Gospel of St. John, of Jesus washing his apostles' feet. The foot washing scene in the Gospel is not only meant to be an example of humble service, but also a record of the institution of the priesthood. Today's foot washing activity helps families remember that we too are called to mirror Christ's humility and serve one another.

Invite your family to wash each other's feet at home. Ensure that everyone gets a turn. You'll need some towels (one for the floor and others for drying the feet), a chair, a pitcher or large glass of warm water, and a basin or large bowl. Prepare the space with a towel on the floor and a chair on top of that. Have the other items nearby. Begin by reading the Gospel. Then invite each family member to have their feet washed.

When someone gets their feet washed:

- × Invite them to sit in the chair.
- × Place their feet over the large bowl.
- × Pour the warm water over their feet.
 - × Dry their feet with a towel.
- × Optional: Kiss the top of their feet when you are finished.
- * Then invite the next person to sit in the chair to have their feet washed.



Easy Lamb Chops

On the night of the Last Supper, Jesus celebrated the Passover meal with his disciples. The Passover meal included eating roasted lamb. Remember Jesus' Last Supper with this easy meal!

- × 8 1/2-inch-thick lamb loin chops (about 2 pounds), fatty tips trimmed
- × salt and freshly ground pepper
- × pinch of dried thyme
- × 3 Tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil
- × 1 Tbsp. of minced garlic
- × 1 sliced onion
- × 3 Tbsp. red wine or water
- × 2 Tbsp. fresh lemon juice
- × 2 Tbsp. minced parsley
- * pinch of crushed red pepper

Step 1: Season the lamb with salt and pepper and sprinkle lightly with thyme. In a very large skillet, heat the olive oil until shimmering. Add the lamb chops and garlic and cook over moderately high heat until the chops are browned on the bottom, about 3 minutes. Turn the chops, add onion and cook until the chops are browned, (about 2 minutes longer for medium meat). Transfer the chops to plates, leaving the garlic in the skillet.

Step 2: Add the water, lemon juice, parsley and crushed red pepper to the pan and cook, scraping up any browned bits stuck to the bottom, until sizzling, about 1 minute. Pour the pan sauce over the lamb chops and serve immediately.

Suffering and Triumph of the Servant of the Lord

Is 52:13-53:12 (First Reading of the Liturgy)

See, my servant shall prosper,
he shall be raised high and greatly exalted.
Even as many were amazed at him—
so marred was his look beyond human semblance
and his appearance beyond that of the sons of man—
so shall he startle many nations,
because of him kings shall stand speechless;

Oppressed and condemned, he was taken away, and who would have thought any more of his destiny? When he was cut off from the land of the living, and smitten for the sin of his people, a grave was assigned him among the wicked and a burial place with evildoers, though he had done no wrong nor spoken any falsehood.


But the LORD was pleased to crush him in infirmity.

St. Longinus is the centurion who pierced the side of Our Lord while He was hanging on the Cross. It is said that when he threw his spear into Christ's side, some of the blood and water from Jesus' wound fell into Longinus' eyes, healing him of his cataracts and leading to his conversion. St. Longinus then converted, left the army, took instruction from the apostles, and became a monk in Cappadocia. There he was arrested for his faith, his teeth forced out and tongue cut off. However, St. Longinus

miraculously continued to speak clearly and managed to destroy several idols in the presence of the governor. The governor, who was made blind by the demons that came from the idols, had his sight restored when St. Longinus was beheaded. The blood of St. Longinus came into contact with the governor's eyes and healed him. St. Longinus' relics are now in the church of St Augustine, in Rome. Longinus' spear is one of the many relics of Christ, and it can be found in St. Peter's Basilica.

Enjoy this vegetarian soup on this day of fasting and abstaining from meat.

- × 4 Tbsp. olive oil
- × 2 cups chopped spinach
- × 2 Tbsp. finely minced garlic
- × 1 tsp. salt
- × 1/2 tsp. black pepper
- × 2 cups carrots, peeled and chopped into rounds
- × 2 cups potatoes, peeled and diced
- × 1 medium yellow or white onion, chopped
- × 2 celery stalks, chopped
- × 2 cups fresh green beans, cut into 3/4-inch pieces (can use frozen)
- × 32 ounces vegetable broth
- × 4 cups peeled, seeded, and chopped tomatoes (or a large can of diced tomatoes)
- × 1 cup corn
- × 1-2 tsp. lemon juice
- × 1-2 bay leaves
- × Optional:
 - 1/4 cup fresh parsley
 - 1/2 tsp. curry powder
 - 1/2 tsp. dried thyme
 - 1/2 tsp. red pepper flakes

Heat the olive oil in a large stockpot or Dutch oven over medium-low heat. Once hot, add carrots, potatoes, celery, onion, and green beans with ½ the salt. Stir often, until the onion is translucent, about 7 minutes. Add the garlic and any other spices you like, such as curry powder, pepper flakes, or thyme. Stir occasionally for about 5 minutes. Add the vegetable stock and raise the heat to high, bringing the soup to a simmer. Then add the corn, tomatoes, bay leaves, and pepper. Reduce the heat to low. Cover and cook for about 25 minutes. Add the spinach and let simmer another 5 minutes. Remove from heat and take out bay leaves. Stir in the lemon juice and the parsley as well as any spices needed for taste. Serve and enjoy!

HOLY SATURDAY

For the Easter Vigil, the Liturgy of the Word consists of seven readings from the Old Testament. Each reading is followed by a psalm that is sung and a prayer that relates what has been read in the Old Testament to the mystery of Christ. After these readings conclude, the altar candles are lit and the Gloria is sung for the first time since before Lent (with the exception of Holy Thursday). The Alleluia is also sung for the first time since before Lent. The Gospel of the Resurrection follows.

The Resurrection of Jesus

Mk 16:1-7

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



(Feast Day Emerentiana January 23) d. 304

Emerentiana's mother was the wet nurse and nanny of St. Agnes. The influence of Agnes and her parents had a profound effect on Emerentiana. A slave by birth but a milk-sibling, Emerentiana was inspired by her mistress Agnes who was teaching her the holy Faith so that she might be baptized a Christian.

Her course of study was abruptly ended with the glorious death of Agnes. Several days after Agnes was publicly martyred, Emerentiana went to the tomb to pray. Mocked by a group of pagans who saw her there grieving, she courageously defended her mistress. This brave rebuttal raised the fury of a group of pagans and they stoned Emerentiana to death on the very tomb of her dear mistress Agnes. The tomb of the teacher became the throne of martyrdom for the disciple. It is a beautiful scene that confirms what has been believed and taught since the first centuries of the Church: martyrdom is equivalent to baptism for those not yet baptized.

This evening at the Easter Vigil, the Church welcomes catechumens into the Catholic Church in parishes across the whole world. Like St. Emerentiana, these individuals were inspired by someone who witnessed their faith and were led by teachers and mentors to be baptized into new life.

- Do you think people had a hard time believing that Jesus was alive? Why or why not?
- × Why is Jesus' resurrection so important to the Christian faith?
- * People who are seeking baptism in the Catholic Church will be baptized tonight at the Easter vigil. Many of us have been baptized as infants. What do you think it's like to be baptized as an adult? What do you think it feels like to have all your sins washed away for the first time in the waters of baptism and receive the gift of the Holy Spirit?

Make Your Own Paschal Candle



Each year at the Easter Vigil, the parish prepares a new Paschal candle. It reminds us of our eternal life in Jesus Christ. The Paschal Candle is lit during Mass on Easter through the feast of the Ascension of our Lord and during baptisms. The Paschal candle has four decorative features: the cross, the Alpha (A) and Omega (Ω) symbols, the numbers of the current calendar year, and the five grains of incense, which symbolize the 5 wounds of Jesus.

You will need:

- × 1 tall white pillar candle
- Acrylic paint and paint brushes or decorative
 - × Stickers
 - × Pencil and paper
 - Scissors or a knife.
- Cloves or gems/rhinestones

Start with sketching your design on paper. Then draw it on the candle before you paint it. On the candle, put a cross in the Center. Above the cross, draw the Alpha symbol (A). Below the cross, draw the Omega symbol (Ω). The Greek letters Alpha and Omega signify that God is the beginning and the end. Starting in the upper left quadrant around the cross, write one number of the year in each section: 2-0-2-1. Then, you can add the rhinestones at the beginning and end of each bar of the cross and one in the center (5 rhinestones total). If you chose to use cloves instead, use your scissors or a knife to carve out a little bit of the wax so that the clove can sit in the candle. These five marks represent the 5 wounds of Jesus on the cross.

Pray this prayer when your candle is complete:

Christ yesterday and today,
the beginning and the end,
Alpha and Omega,
all time belongs to him,
and all ages;
to him be glory and power,
through every age and for ever.
Amen.



RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Rice Pilaf

Many cultures around the world continue to abstain from meat on Holy Saturday. You can enjoy this recipe even if this is not your tradition.

- × 3/4 stick of butter
- × 1 1/2 cup fine egg noodles
- × 1 cup uncooked long grain rice
- × 2 cups vegetable broth

Melt butter in a frying pan. Add fine egg noodles. Over medium heat, lightly brown egg noodles, stirring often to avoid browning/burning. Add rice. Mix rice around in the pan to mix with fine egg noodles and butter. Add chicken broth. Cover pan and simmer on low for 20 minutes. After 20 minutes, stir the pilaf and taste. Add a little salt if preferred. Enjoy!

Each person has a small candle and follows the priest or deacon holding the Paschal candle into the darkened church.

The Empty Tomb

Jn 20:1-9

On the first day of the week,

Mary of Magdala came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark,

"They have taken the Lord from the tomb,

For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead.

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



St. Cleopas of Emmaus

(Feast Day September 25) 1st Century

St. Cleopas was one of the disciples who met the risen Lord on the road to Emmaus, and is commemorated in the Roman Martyrology on September 25th. While little is known of either him or his companion, there is a tradition which identifies this Cleopas with the husband of Mary (the mother of James the Lesser). Furthermore, some speculate that he was the brother of St. Joseph, the spouse of the Virgin Mary.

The Gospel of Luke offers a unique postresurrection narrative of Cleopas and an unnamed traveling companion who were on their way to Emmaus, a town about 7 miles from Jerusalem. The two travelers felt troubled over the recent death of Jesus. They had placed great hopes in Christ and felt confused over his death, yet they were simultaneously amazed over the stories circulating that day about a resurrection. As they walked, they encountered Jesus who interpreted the Scriptures to them in an attempt to help Cleopas and his friend understand the necessity of what had happened. The words of Jesus must have given the two a sense of awe, for as they approached Emmaus, they urged Jesus—whom they still did not recognize—to stay with them. Jesus agreed, and at the dinner table, he took the bread, blessed it, and gave it to Cleopas and his friend. It was at that moment the two realized that this stranger was Jesus. At the moment of recognition, however, Jesus vanished. Even though it was already evening and getting dark, Cleopas and his companion promptly went back to Jerusalem to share their glorious experience.

- x 1 package original ranch style salad dressing mix
- x 1 small jar chopped red pimentos, drained
- x 1 small can chopped chilies, drained or 1/2 of a fresh jalapeño pepper, cored and diced
- × 1 can ripe olives drained and chopped
- * 1 package fajita size flour tortillas

Soften cream cheese in a bowl and mix all ingredients together. Spread the mix on the tortillas and roll the tortilla. Wrap to tighten with saran wrap. Chill overnight or for several hours. To serve, cut in bite sized pieces, about 3/4 inch to serve.

Today, visitors can enter the cave (which is preserved inside the church) and see the actual place where Jesus rose from the dead. Visitors generally wait in line for 3 or 4 hours to visit the tomb.

Appearance to the Disciples, Thomas, and Conclusion

Jn 20:19-31

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked, where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews,

The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord.

Thomas answered and said to him, "My Lord and my God!"

Jesus said to him, "Have you come to believe because you have seen me?

Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed."

Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book.

But these are written that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name.

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



(Feast Day June 28) d. 202

St. Irenaeus was the Bishop of Lyon in the region of Gaul (present day France). He, much like Thomas the Apostle in today's Gospel, was a seeker of truth. He is known for laying the foundations of Christian theology and exposing and refuting the errors of the Gnostics. The Gnostics claimed access to secret knowledge imparted by Jesus to only a few disciples. Their teaching was attractive and confusing to many Christians. It was the spread of Gnosticism in Gaul, and the ravages it was making among the Christians of his diocese, that inspired Irenaeus to undertake the task of exposing its errors. He produced a treatise in five books in which he set forth fully

the inner doctrines of the various Gnostic sects, and afterwards contrasted them with the teaching of the Apostles and the text of Sacred Scripture. His work gradually ended the influence of the Gnostics. St. Irenaeus suffered martyrdom in Lyons, with many others, in the year 202, under the Emperor Septimus Severus, after eighty years spent in the service of the Lord.

You can build it with blankets, pillows, cardboard boxes, etc. Hang out and play games, tell stories, or imagine what it was like for the disciples in the Gospel today.



THE WEEK Irresistible Coconut Custard Pie

Once Thomas encountered the risen Christ, the truth of the Gospel was irresistible! Celebrate the risen Christ with this irresistible pie!

- × 2 cups whole milk
- × 3/4 cup sugar
- × 1/2cup flour
- × 4 eggs
- × 4 Tbsp. butter, softened
- × 1 tsp. vanilla
- × 1 tsp. baking powder
- × 1 1/4 cup coconut

Put all ingredients, except coconut, in mixer and blend for one minute. Add 1 1/4 cup coconut. Place in a buttered and floured deep pie dish. Bake 360 F for 45-50 minutes until slightly golden browned around edges.



Chaplet of Divine Mercy

St. John Paul II declared the Second Sunday of Easter Divine Mercy Sunday in 2000 when St. Faustina Kowalska, to whom Jesus revealed the Divine Mercy image, was beatified. Jesus told Sr. Faustina, "Humanity will never find peace until it turns with trust to Divine Mercy." This day is a chance to reflect on the mercy of God in our lives. Many people pray The Chaplet of Divine Mercy at 3:00pm every day. You are encouraged to pray it today, on the feast of Divine Mercy.

Here is how you pray the chaplet using a rosary.

OUR FATHER
HAIL MARY

APOSTLES' CREED:

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, his only son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

ON THE OUR FATHER BEADS:

Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of your dearly beloved son, our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

ON THE HAIL MARY BEADS:

For the sake of his sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

AFTER FIVE DECADES, CONCLUDE BY RECITING THREE TIMES:

Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

Appearance to the Disciples in Jerusalem

Lk 24:35-48

The two disciples recounted what had taken place on the way, and how Jesus was made known to them in the breaking of bread.

You are witnesses of these things."

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



Mark Rey was born in 1577 in Sigmaringen, Germany. As a practicing lawyer, he traveled across Europe as a tutor to aristocrats but then started defending the poor. Nicknamed "the poor man's lawyer," Rey upheld the causes of the poor and oppressed people. If a poor man needed some clothing, Rey would often give the man the clothes right off his back. His life was characterized by complete generosity to others. In 1612, he became a Franciscan Capuchin monk, taking the name of Fidelis. Before entering the order, he divided his wealth between needy seminarians and the poor. During a severe epidemic in a city where he was guardian of a friary, Fidelis cared for and

cured many sick soldiers. When he was sent to Switzerland as a missionary to preach against the Calvinists and Zwinglians (Christians who belonged to congregations that broke away from the Catholic Church), he was accused of opposing the peasants' national aspirations for independence from Austria. Fidelis was stabbed to death in a church in Seewis. He was canonized by Pope Benedict XIV in 1746. Fifteen years later, he was recognized as a martyr. The ministry of Fidelis exemplifies Jesus' command in today's Gospel to preach in his name and to witness to his life.

Easy Artisan Bread

Remember Jesus' triumph on the cross by making this bread.

- × 3 cups all-purpose flour (one may be whole wheat white)
- × 1/2 tsp. yeast
- × 1 tsp. salt
- × 1.5 cups warm water (100-110 F)

In a bowl, stir all ingredients until combined. Cover with plastic wrap and set at room temperature for 8 to 24 hours. Turn dough out onto a well-floured surface and form a ball by pulling the dough from the sides to the top. Rest for 30 minutes as you preheat oven to 450 F. Place baking dish with high sides into the oven while preheating. Slash a cross on top of the bread and carefully place into baking dish. Cover and bake 30 minutes; uncover and bake 10-15 minutes more until golden brown. Cool before slicing.

The Good Shepherd

Jn 10:11-18

Jesus said:

"I am the good shepherd.

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



St. Peter Chanel was born in the diocese of Belley, France. After his ordination to the priesthood, he found himself in a rundown country parish and completely revitalized it in 3 years. However, his heart was set on missionary work, so in 1831, he joined the newly formed Society of Mary (Marists) which concentrated

on missionary work at home and abroad. In 1836, St. Peter was appointed Superior of a little band of missionaries sent to proclaim the Faith to inhabitants in Western Oceania. After an arduous ten-month journey, St. Peter went to the Island of Futuna (northeast of Fiji) accompanied by a lay brother and an English layman. At first, they were well received by the pagans and their king. However, the king's jealousy and fear were aroused when the missionaries learned the language and gained the people's confidence; he realized the adoption of the Christian Faith would lead to the abolition of some of the prerogatives he enjoyed as both high priest and sovereign. When the king's son asked to be baptized, persecution by the king reached a climax. Fr. Chanel was clubbed to death. Within two years after his death, the whole island became Catholic and has remained so. He was canonized by Pope Pius XII in 1954. Peter Chanel is the first martyr of Oceania and its patron.

Sheep Talk and Yarn Crafts



On this Good Shepherd Sunday challenge your family to learn more about sheep and try your hand at knitting.

There are many words to learn when talking about sheep:

- × The female sheep is called a ewe.
- × A male sheep is called a ram. Rams, which are larger than ewes, sometimes fight with each other to prove who is the strongest.
- × The young sheep are called lambs.

- Sheep eat facing the same direction, always keeping the wind blowing toward them.
 Each sheep usually keeps two other sheep in sight when feeding.
- Sheep move around in large groups called flocks.
- Sheep farms may have little flocks of 50 to 200 sheep.
- Larger operations may have 1,000 to 5,000 sheep.
- × Little flocks of 10 or fewer sheep may belong to people who like to dye and knit yarn that is made from the sheep's wool.
- × Sheep provide meat called lamb or mutton. Lamb comes from a sheep less than a year old. Older sheep provide meat called mutton which has a much stronger flavor and is tougher meat.

- Sheep have a thick coat of wool on their body which is called a fleece.
 - → This fleece can be made into a fiber called yarn.
 - → In spring, the fleece is removed by a shearer. Skilled shearers can remove the fleece all in one piece in about 5 minutes. A talented shearer can shear over 100 sheep in one day.
 - → The wool that comes from sheep is cleaned and turned into yarn which is made into wool fabric. Sweaters, coats, mittens and suits can be made from wool.
 - → Other parts of the sheep are used to make things such as insulation, baseballs, upholstery, crochet needles, and tennis balls.
 - → Oil from the wool of sheep is called lanolin and is used to make beauty products such as lotions and creams.

Yarn Craft

Option 1: Learn how to knit by exploring an online tutorial or asking a friend or relative to help. Check out Walmart or the Dollar Store for inexpensive knitting supplies. Pick a simple project for each family member to try.

Option 2: Yarn Sheep

For each sheep craft, you will need:

- × Two wooden clothes pins
- An oval shaped piece of cardboard about 4 inches long
- Enough yarn to wrap around the cardboard
- × Glue
- × Felt or construction paper

Paint or color one end of the sheep black for its head. Use a black marker or paint to color the clothes pins black. Clip your painted clothes pins onto the appropriate spots on the sheep. Make sure that it can stand up. When you have them where you want, put a dab of glue between the cardboard and the clothes pin to hold it tight. While the glue is still wet, slip the end of the yarn in so it holds in place. Keep wrapping making sure to cover the springs of the clothes pins and any cardboard. Add enough layers until the sheep is as fat as you would like him. Tuck the end of the yarn into the sheep and put a dab of glue on it to hold it. Next cut little ears out of felt or construction paper, and a tail too if you like and glue them on.

Easy Shepherd's Piewith Roasted Potatoes

- × 8 red new potatoes
- × 2 Tbsp. butter, melted
- × salt and pepper
- × 1 lb. extra lean ground turkey (or lean ground beef)
- × 1.5 cups diced onion
- × 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- × 2 cups low-sodium beef broth
- × 1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
- × 1 cup frozen peas
- × 1 cup frozen carrots

Rinse and dice potatoes into bite-sized chunks and toss with melted butter, 1 tsp. kosher salt, and 1/2 tsp. black pepper. Cover and microwave for 7 minutes or until tender. Meanwhile, cook the meat and onion in an oven safe skillet over medium-high heat until meat is no longer pink.

Drain if necessary and return to skillet. Stir in the flour until incorporated, about 1 minute. Add the broth and Worcestershire and cook until thickened, about 5-7 minutes. Stir in peas and carrots and simmer until heated through, about 1-2 minutes. Season with salt and pepper, about 1/2 tsp. each. Scatter the cooked potatoes over the meat and broil until golden brown, about 5 minutes.

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY

STS. TIMOTHY AND MAURA

(Feast Day May 3) d. 286

Sts. Timothy and Maura suffered for the faith during the persecution under the Emperor Diocletian. Timothy came from Egypt and was the son of a priest. Raised in the Church, he became a lector and spent his evenings preaching the Gospel

as well as keeping the holy Scriptures and liturgical books safe in his home during the persecutions. In the year 286 Timothy married a pious 17-year-old woman named Maura, and the two began a life of prayer and Christian witness together.

When Timothy and Maura had been married for only 20 days, Timothy was denounced as a Christian and a keeper of the holy books. His captors, on the authority of Diocletian himself, demanded that Timothy surrender the books of Scripture to them. Timothy refused and was tortured. Arian, the governor, tried to convince him to give in for Maura's sake. Maura was brought to Timothy and

encouraged him to stand firm and not deny Christ. She confessed to be a Christian herself and was subject to torture as well. Afterward, she was immersed in a pot of boiling water, but remained unharmed. While the governor was impressed by the miracle, he soon resumed his tortures by having the young couple nailed to two crosses facing each other.

For 10 days they prayed together, sang hymns, and encouraged each other as they suffered for Christ. Ultimately, both found themselves welcomed into the arms of Christ as glorious martyrs. The witness of their courage and joy so inspired their torturer that he soon became a Christian, was martyred himself, and is venerated in the Eastern Church as St. Arian of Alexandria.

The Vine and the Branches

Jn 15:9-17

Jesus said to his disciples:

"As the Father loves me, so I also love you.

Remain in my love.

If you keep my commandments, you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and remain in his love.

"I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and your joy might be complete.

This is my commandment: love one another as I love you.

No one has greater love than this,

to lay down one's life for one's friends.

You are my friends if you do what I command you.

I no longer call you slaves,

because a slave does not know what his master is doing.

I have called you friends, because I have told you everything I have heard from my Father. It was not you who chose me, but I who chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit that will remain, so that whatever you ask the Father in my name he may give you. This I command you: love one another."

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



(Feast Day September 20) 1795 - September 22, 1839

St. Paul Chong Hasang was born in Korea, in 1795. He came from a family of noble scholars that were dedicated to the Catholic faith and to its growth in Korea. His father was a Catholic intellectual who had written the first Catholic catechism in the Korean language. His father was martyred in 1801. His family

was thereafter persecuted and stripped of all property. Despite this hardship and tragedy, the family never denied the faith.

Throughout his life, he continued to seek missionary support for the Church in Korea. When Paul was twenty-one, he went to China, where he asked the Bishop of Peking to send missionaries to Korea. He escorted Bishop Laurent Imbert on his mission and served him faithfully during his ministry. Bishop Imbert was impressed by Paul's devotion to the faith and decided

to prepare him for the priesthood. Before this could happen, however, a new persecution of Christians broke out in Korea. Bishop Imbert was forced to flee; Paul and his mother and sister were arrested.

While awaiting execution in prison, Paul wrote "A Letter to the Minister," defending the Catholic faith to the Korean government. This work impressed everyone, even the enemies of the Church. However, the government was not moved to alter its stance. After much suffering and torture, Paul and his family were beheaded outside Seoul on September 22, 1839. Despite severe hardship and persecution, he kept his faith and served as a sterling example of piety for others, heeding the words of Jesus in today's Gospel to remain in his love and bear fruit that remains.

RECIPE OF

Korean Noodle Bowl

In honor of our saint, enjoy this Korean dish. You can use whatever vegetables you have that are fresh and in-season. Use as little or as much of each ingredient as your family enjoys!

- 1/3 package of somen noodles (about 2 ounces per serving)
- × 3 whole scallions
- × 2-3 cloves garlic, minced
- × 4 Tbsp. sesame seed oil, divided
- × 1-2 cups julienned carrots
- × 1-2 cups broccoli florets
- × 1-2 packages of medium shrimp, peeled and uncooked
- × 1/4 cup soy sauce
- × 2-3 Tbsp. honey or brown sugar
- × 1-2 Tbsp. lime juice
- * 1-2 Tbsp. grated ginger or 1 tsp. ground ginger
- × 1 Tbsp. dried cilantro
- × 1-2 tsp. Korean red pepper paste or Sriracha sauce
- × 3 tsp. sesame seeds
- Optional: 1 fried or poached egg per serving

Prepare somen noodles according to package instructions and drain when done, rinsing with cold water. Slice scallions, keeping white ends separate from the green shoots. In a wok or large pan, preheat 2 Tbsp. of sesame oil over medium-low heat. Add white ends of scallions and garlic to the oil and cook until fragrant. Be careful not to burn the garlic. Add carrots and broccoli and continue to cook until almost tender, 3-5 minutes. When the vegetables are not quite fully cooked, add shrimp and cook until they start to look opaque. While the shrimp cooks, begin mixing the sauce. Combine remaining 2 Tbsp. sesame oil, soy sauce, honey, lime juice, ginger, cilantro and red pepper paste in a bowl and whisk together until well combined. Pour sauce over shrimp just as it begins to turn pink and mix well. Toss in noodles and mix them into the sauce. Top with chopped green scallion shoots and sesame seeds. Optional: add a fried or poached egg on top of each served bowl. Enjoy!

St. Cristóbal Magallanes and Companions

(Feast Day May 21) d. 1915-1937

Cristóbal grew up in rural Mexico, working as a shepherd. At age 19, he entered the seminary, and once ordained, became a parish priest in Jalisco. He founded a seminary, authored a newspaper, founded schools for both adults and children, and assisted the people of his congregation

with employment via the organization of carpentry shops and an electric mill. Father Cristóbal encouraged the cooperation of his congregation with the indigenous peoples of the region, together forming an agricultural cooperative which was quite successful.

Cristóbal and his 24 companion martyrs lived under a very anti-Catholic government in Mexico, one determined to weaken the Catholic faith of its people. Churches, schools, and seminaries were closed; foreign clergy were expelled. Cristóbal established a clandestine seminary, and he and the other priests were forced to minister secretly to

Catholics during the presidency of Plutarco Calles (1924-28). Despite his preaching against violence, he was arrested on his way to a local farm to celebrate Mass. Without trial, he was shot and killed, following his request to distribute his possessions to the poor, and his general absolution of his would-be executioners. The companions of Father Cristobal did not die as a single group but over 22 years' time in eight Mexican states during the Mexican Cristero War. They were beatified in 1992 and canonized eight years later by St. John Paul II.

Make a Kite



Kites remind us of Jesus' ascension into heaven. Here is one way to make a simple kite using common household supplies.

Supplies:

- × Paper lunch bag
- × Yarn or strong string
- × Scissors
- × Popsicle stick for each kite
- Streamers, tape, crayons, stickers, construction paper to decorate the kite

First decorate your kite using the supplies you have. Then, using the scissors, cut a small hole at the bottom base of the bag. Cut a piece of yarn or string that is about 2 feet long. Secure one end to the middle of the popsicle stick; this will help keep the string inside the bag when the kite is flying. Feed the other end of the string through the hole in the bag. If you desire, use tape to hang streamers from the open part of the bag to wave when you fly your kite. Your kite is ready to fly!



RECIPE OF

Shortcut Jalapeno and Cheese Corn Bread Using Jiffy Mix

Honor our Mexican saint by making this delicious recipe!

- × 1 box of Jiffy Corn Muffin Mix
- × 2 tbsp. of melted butter
- × 1/3 cup of milk
- × 1/2 cup of shredded cheddar cheese
- x 1 can (15 oz.) of sweet corn - drained
- * 1 medium Jalapeno diced (or) 2 Tbsp. of canned jalapeno diced (Or substitute 1 can chopped green chiles (4.5 oz))
- × 1 egg

Preheat oven to 375 F. Starting with the corn muffin mix, combine all the ingredients and mix until moist. Grease an 8×8 pan and pour the mixture into the pan. Bake for about 25-35 minutes. This moist bread may appear not done. Insert a toothpick in the middle of dish. When it comes out clean, you will know the bread is fully cooked.

Appearance to the Disciples

Jn 20:19-23 or Jn 15:26-27; 16:12-15

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked, where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews,

Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you."

When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side.

The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord.

Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you.

As the Father has sent me, so I send you."

And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them,

"Receive the Holy Spirit.

Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained."



Joan was born to pious parents of the French peasant class near the province of Lorraine. When Joan was only twelve years old, the great miracle of her life unfolded. One summer day, she heard a mysterious voice, which was accompanied by a bright light. She identified the speaker as Michael the Archangel. He spoke to her many times, gradually revealing a mission. "You have been chosen to restore the kingdom of France," said the voice, "and to protect King Charles." She was to accomplish these things as the head of the army! In obedience, Joan offered her services to the commander of the royal forces. After telling the commander a fact that could have only

been known by revelation, he was persuaded to take her seriously and outfitted her with white armor adorned with the names of Jesus and Mary.

During the Hundred Years War, Joan led French troops against the English and recaptured the cities of Orléans and Troyes. This enabled Charles VII to be crowned as king in Reims in 1429. Captured near Compiegne the following year, Joan was sold to the English and placed on trial for heresy and witchcraft. The English resented France's military success—to which Joan contributed.

Although Joan is most remembered for her military exploits, she had a great love for the sacraments, which strengthened her compassion toward the poor. Popular devotion to her increased greatly in 19th-century France and later among French soldiers during World War I.

Joan was burned at the stake as a heretic after a politically motivated trial. A second Church trial 25 years later nullified the earlier verdict. Joan was a martyr, but not in the technical sense. She was killed for her politics, not for her faith. She died because she did what she thought God wanted her to do. She was beatified in 1909 and canonized in 1920.

Rosemary's Chocolate Cake

Make this cake to celebrate the birthday of the Church this Pentecost! Light some birthday candles to remind you of the manifestation of the Holy Spirit in tongues of fire. Sing "Happy Birthday" together!

- × 2 cups sifted flour
- × 2 tsp. baking powder
- × 2 tsp. baking soda
- × 2 cups sugar
- × 1/2 tsp. salt
- × 4 rounded tbsp. cocoa powder



- × 2 cups hot water
- × 1 cup vegetable oil
- × 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- × 2 tsp. vanilla

Sift flour, baking powder, soda, sugar salt and cocoa together. Add hot water, oil, eggs and vanilla and beat until all incorporated (batter will be very runny). Bake in heavy 9x13 pan (stoneware is best) at 350 F for 40 minutes or until tester comes out clean.

St. Charles Lwanga and Companions

(Feast Day June 3) d. between November 15, 1885 – January 27, 1887

By 1879 the first Catholic missions were started in Uganda and other parts of Central Africa. Under King Mutesa, missionaries preached, people studied the faith, and many believed in Jesus. Unfortunately, King Mutesa was succeeded by King Mwanga, who began persecuting the Christians in Uganda. Mwanga was a corrupt man who abused his young pages (male servants).

Charles Lwanga was in his late teens when he served as a page in the court of King Mwanga. He served under the chief page, Joseph Mukasa, who was a Catholic and went to great lengths to protect the younger boys from the king. Mukasa denounced the king's actions and the king subsequently had Mukasa beheaded. That night, realizing that their lives may be in danger, Charles and 100 other catechumens were baptized. At 25 years old, Charles replaced Mukasa as chief page. Charles catechized the young men, encouraged them to refuse to take part in the pagan customs of the country, and protected them from the king's advances.

The following May, King Mwanga learned that some of the pages were being instructed in the faith. He was furious and ordered all the pages to be questioned to separate the Christians from the others. Mwanga commanded his soldiers to kill Charles Lwanga and his friends. Most of the pages were under the age of twenty-five. The youngest was thirteen years old. After their deaths, many other Christians were persecuted and killed. The example of these teenagers and men inspired other people, which caused the faith to grow and spread in Africa. Twenty-two Ugandan martyrs, including Charles and the pages, were canonized in 1964.

- x Ice Breaker—Freeze something (toy, laminated paper, etc.) in a baggie of water and then "break" the ice to get the item out. For older kids, consider putting a large t-shirt in a baggie filled with water and freeze it. Then challenge them to get the item out of the bag, unfreeze it, and wear it.

- * Wet Chalk—Wet the ground and create a drawing with chalk. Watch it change as it dries! (Bonus: You can do this inside on a chalkboard or another safe surface such as a bathtub wall).
- * Toe Swim—Fill a large bowl with small toys, water, and ice cubes on top. Put your toes in the water to fish out a toy.



RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Grammie's Cheesecake

This recipe reminds us of the Most Holy Trinity as it has three distinct parts that make one delicious dish!

Crust Ingredients:

- × 9 oz vanilla wafers, crushed
- × 1/4 cup butter, melted
- × 1 Tbsp. sugar

Filling Ingredients:

- 3 8 oz packages of Philadelphia
 Cream cheese, softened
- × 1 cup sugar
- × 5 eggs at room temperature
- × 1 1/4 tsp. vanilla
- × dash of salt

Topping Ingredients:

- × 1 pint sour cream
- × 1/2 cup sugar
- × 1 tsp vanilla

Mix all the crust ingredients. Pat into a 9 x 13 Pyrex dish and set aside to make filling. Place cream cheese in mixing bowl and beat adding eggs one at a time, beating in between each addition. Add sugar, vanilla, and salt till blended, pouring over crust. An electric hand-mixer works best, but it is not required. Layer filling over the crust. Bake at 325 F for 40-45 minutes until slightly brown around the edges and center is bouncy to the touch. (If you overcook, cheesecake begins to crack and will not be as moist.) Refrigerate overnight before topping. Mix the topping. Spread over filling at least an hour before serving. Serve a bowl of berries alongside for added flavor.

Bl. Franz Jagerstatter

(Feast Day June 7) May 20, 1907 - August 9, 1943

Franz Jagerstatter was born in Upper Austria as the child of a farm maidservant, Rosalia Huber. Franz lost his father during World War I and was adopted after Heinrich Jagerstatter married his mother. As a young man, he loved to ride his motorcycle and was the natural leader of a gang whose members were arrested in 1934 for brawling. For three years he worked in the mines in another city and then returned to his hometown, where he became a farmer and married Franziska Schwaninger, a deeply religious woman. Inspired by his wife, Jagerstatter began to study the Bible and the lives of the saints.

In 1939, he was drafted into the Austrian army. When he refused to take the oath of loyalty to Hitler and perform military service with a weapon, he was imprisoned in Linz, Austria where he was tortured and bullied for two months. Franz believed that he could not be both a Nazi and a Catholic, and that there were some things in which one must obey God more than men. While he was tempted to lose his faith, God's presence was with him which helped him to persevere.

Franz learned that one year before, a priest had refused to perform military service for the same reasons as his and had died for his convictions. This news gave Franz the support and comfort he needed in order to stay strong in his convictions. On August 9, 1943, Franz Jagerstatter was beheaded. He was beatified in Linz on October 26, 2007.

Seed Grows of Itself and The Mustard Seed

Mk 4:26-34

Jesus said to the crowds:

"This is how it is with the kingdom of God; it is as if a man were to scatter seed on the land and would sleep and rise night and day and through it all the seed would sprout and grow, he knows not how.

Of its own accord the land yields fruit, first the blade, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. And when the grain is ripe, he wields the sickle at once, for the harvest has come."

He said,

"To what shall we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable can we use for it?

It is like a mustard seed that, when it is sown in the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on the earth.

But once it is sown, it springs up and becomes the largest of plants and puts forth large branches,

so that the birds of the sky can dwell in its shade."

With many such parables

he spoke the word to them as they were able to understand it.

Without parables he did not speak to them,

but to his own disciples he explained everything in private.

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



(Feast Day June 26) c. 1500 – June 26, 1549

Fr. Luis de Cáncer de Barbastro, O.P., was a Dominican priest and Spanish missionary to the New World. In 1542 he went to the territory of Guatemala and successfully ministered to the Mayan people. Aware of their sensitivity for music and their mistrust of Europeans, he used song as

a first means of contact. The Dominican friars translated the content of their preaching into rhythmic poetic form using the different languages of the region and employing images and musical expressions from the local cultures. Fr. Cáncer mastered the different dialects of the area and was the composer of Christian canticles in these native languages. His evangelization efforts were so successful that an area that was known for violence was renamed the "Province of True Peace." He believed that aggression and violence were counterproductive to the spread of the Gospel and that the native peoples needed to be treated with dignity.

Following his missionary success in Guatemala, Fr. Cáncer went on a mission to Florida in 1549. His expedition set sail from Mexico and landed just north of modern-day Tampa Bay. Fr. Cáncer celebrated Mass in Florida on the Feast of Corpus Christi. At first the missionaries were welcomed by the native peoples, who knelt in prayer as Fr. Cáncer chanted litanies to God and to the saints. However, this welcome did not last long. Two of Fr. Cáncer's companions went ashore to stay with the natives, but soon perished at the hands of their hosts. When Fr. Cáncer heard word of the killing, he resolved to continue with the mission despite the danger. On June 26, he made his way ashore where he was clubbed to death in sight of the rest who were still in the boat. Though not a canonized saint, he is nevertheless regarded by those working for the canonization of the martyrs of La Florida as the "proto-martyr" of Florida.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Make Ahead Breakfast Bake

This delicious breakfast recipe contains dry mustard, which reminds us of today's parable of the mustard seed. Dry mustard is made by toasting mustard seeds for 20 seconds in a dry skillet and grinding them in a spice grinder.

- x 1 lb. bulk sausage (breakfast or mild/sweet Italian work well)
- × 3 cups day old bread, cut into 1/2 inch cubes
- x 1 cup sharp cheddar cheese, shredded (about 4 ounces)
- × 6 eggs, lightly beaten
- × 2 cups whole milk
- × 1/2 tsp. salt
- × 1/2 tsp. black pepper
- × 1/2 tsp. dry mustard (you can substitute 1 1/2 tsp. of prepared Dijon or Yellow mustard)

Crumble sausage in skillet, cook over medium heat until browned, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat and drain well. Spread bread cubes into bottom of buttered 13x9x2 dish. Top bread cubes with crumbled, browned sausage, and cheese. Combine eggs, milk, salt, pepper, and mustard. Beat well and pour over bread/sausage/cheese. Cover and refrigerate overnight. Bake, uncovered, at 350 F until knife inserted in center comes out clean – about 40-50 minutes. Yield: 6-8 servings.

Fisher and Thomas More

(Feast Day June 22) 1469-6/22/1535, 1478-7/6/1535

John Fisher was born in England in 1469. After he was ordained a priest, the royal family appointed him tutor for Prince Henry, who became King Henry VIII. In 1504, Fisher became bishop of Rochester, and also chancellor of Cambridge University. Henry, then king, was proud to be his friend.

All this changed when King Henry wanted to divorce his wife and marry another woman. Henry's request for a divorce was refused by the pope (because, in the eyes of the Church, marriage is permanent), and Bishop Fisher supported this decision. He was strong enough to resist signing the document siding with King Henry, even though all the other bishops of England had signed it. Six months later, King Henry had parliament write another document claiming that Henry was supreme head of the Catholic Church in England. Again, Bishop Fisher refused to sign. This made the king angry. The bishop was sentenced to prison in 1534 on the charge of high treason. Fisher was kept in prison for 14 months without a trial. In June of 1535, he was condemned to death by beheading.

Thomas More was born in 1477. Thomas was married and had four children. He was a shrewd lawyer and eventually became the chancellor of England, which is the highest-ranking judicial office in England. Thomas was a charming, witty man, who won the friendship of the king. That friendship changed when King Henry asked Thomas to approve of the divorce he wanted. When Thomas refused, the king became angry. Then when Thomas refused to sign the Oath of Supremacy, he was sent to prison. He was

kept for more than a year in the Tower of London. The king tried hard to make him change his mind, but Thomas stood firm. He knew this stand would mean certain death for him and disgrace for his family, but he followed his conscience. Finally, after suffering for a long time, Thomas was led out to be beheaded on July 6.

The stories of John Fisher and Thomas More are a reminder of the importance of religious liberty and the importance of witnessing our faith in the public sphere. Sts. John Fisher and Thomas More teach us that this can only come about through Christians with courageous conscience, being faithful to truth, and having a proper understanding of the relationship between church and state.

Jairus's Daughter and the Woman with a Hemorrhage

Mk 5:21-43 or 5:21-24, 35B-43

When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side,

"You see how the crowd is pressing upon you, and yet you ask, 'Who touched me?'"

And he looked around to see who had done it.

The woman, realizing what had happened to her,

approached in fear and trembling.

She fell down before Jesus and told him the whole truth.

He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has saved you.

Go in peace and be cured of your affliction."

While he was still speaking,

people from the synagogue official's house arrived and said,

"Your daughter has died; why trouble the teacher any longer?"

Disregarding the message that was reported,

Jesus said to the synagogue official,

"Do not be afraid; just have faith."

He did not allow anyone to accompany him inside

except Peter, James, and John, the brother of James.

When they arrived at the house of the synagogue official,

he caught sight of a commotion,

people weeping and wailing loudly.

So he went in and said to them,

"Why this commotion and weeping?

The child is not dead but asleep."

And they ridiculed him.

Then he put them all out.

He took along the child's father and mother and those who were with him and entered the room where the child was.

He took the child by the hand and said to her, "Talitha koum," which means, "Little girl, I say to you, arise!"

The girl, a child of twelve, arose immediately and walked around. At that they were utterly astounded.

He gave strict orders that no one should know this and said that she should be given something to eat.

St. Oliver Plunkett

(Feast Day July 2) November 1, 1629 – July 1, 1681

St. Oliver Plunkett is especially familiar to the Irish and the English—and with good reason. The English martyred Oliver Plunkett for defending the faith in his native Ireland during a period of severe persecution.

Oliver was born in Ireland in 1629. He studied for the priesthood in Rome and was ordained there in 1654. Due to religious persecution in his native land, it was not possible for him to return to minister to his people. After some years of teaching and service to the poor he was appointed Archbishop of Armagh in Ireland. Archbishop Plunkett established himself as a man of peace and, with religious fervor, set about visiting his people, establishing schools, ordaining priests, and confirming thousands. Four years later, in 1673, a new wave of anti-

Catholic persecution began, forcing Archbishop Plunkett to do his pastoral work in secrecy and disguise, and to live in hiding. Meanwhile, many of his priests were sent into exile, schools were closed, Church services had to be held in secret, and convents and seminaries were suppressed. As archbishop, Plunkett was viewed as ultimately responsible for any rebellion or political activity among his parishioners.

Archbishop Plunkett was arrested and imprisoned in Dublin Castle in 1679, but his trial was moved to London where he was tried for treason. With deep serenity of soul, he was prepared to die, calmly rebutting the accusations against him and refusing to save himself by giving false evidence against his brother bishops. Oliver Plunkett publicly forgave all those who were responsible for his death. He was hanged, drawn, and quartered in July 1681. Pope Paul VI canonized Oliver Plunkett in 1975.

Boil potatoes in salted water until tender; drain and mash. Add cubed cheese, sour cream, butter, salt and pepper and mix well. Cover. Can be stored in refrigerator several days. Before serving sprinkle with paprika and bake uncovered in 350-degree oven 30-35 minutes or until heated through.

St. Augustine Zhao Rong

(Feast Day July 9) d. 1815

Christianity arrived in China by way of Syria in the 600s. Over the centuries, Christianity in China was free to grow or was forced to operate secretly depending on China's relations with the outside world.

Augustine Zhao Rong, is one of a group of 120 Catholics who were martyred between the years 1648 and 1930 in China. Zhao Rong was a bailiff of a county jail. During the persecution of 1772, he was moved by the words of Fr. Martinus Moye to his fellow Catholic prisoners, and, ultimately

converted. He later became a priest, and when in 1815 another persecution broke out, he was arrested and tortured. Because of his age, he died of the ill treatment.

Of the 120 martyrs, eighty-seven were Chinese, ranging in age from nine to seventy-two, and four of them were priests. Thirty-three were foreign-born, mostly priests or women religious. Though the missionaries and religious tried to distance themselves from foreign policies, the Chinese government did not differentiate and saw them all as westerners.

The martyrdoms of China are very moving, each person having died heroically though many of them suffered torture and cruel deaths. Fr. Francis Li, grandson of a Chinese martyr, describes his grandfather going to his death joyfully saying to his brother and son, "Let's go, we are going to heaven today!"

Black Eyed Pea Salad

Enjoy this summer salad this 4th of July!

- × 3 Tbsp. olive oil
- × 1 tsp. Dijon mustard
- × 2 tbsp. of white wine or apple cider vinegar
- × 1 Tbsp. lemon juice
- × 1 tsp. sugar or 1 tsp. honey
- × 1 1/2 tsp. ground cumin
- × 2 cloves garlic, minced
- \times 1/2 1 tsp. salt (to taste)
- × 1/2 tsp. cayenne pepper
- × 1/3 cup red onion
- x 1 cup chopped bell peppers either red, yellow, or orange (or a mix of all three)
- × 2 Tbsp. chopped black olives
- × 2 cups cooked long grain white rice or cooked brown rice
- × 2 cups cooked fresh or frozen black-eyed peas (if using canned black-eyed peas, make sure peas are drained, wellrinsed and not too mushy)

- x 3 Tbsp. chopped basil or parsley (optional)
- × 8 cups salad greens (romaine, bibb, young kale, red leaf work very well, or iceberg)

In large mixing bowl, whisk olive oil, Dijon mustard, vinegar, lemon juice, cumin, sugar/honey, garlic, salt and cayenne pepper. Add onion, bell peppers, olives, rice, and peas. Stir until coated. Cover and refrigerate at least one hour, up to 24 hrs. Stir once more, adding basil/parsley and a dash more salt if desired. Then turn onto bed of salad greens and serve.

Canticle of Zechariah

He has raised up for us a mighty savior, born of the house of his servant David. Through his holy prophets he promised of old that he would save us from our enemies, and from the hands of all who hate us.

This was the oath he swore to our father Abraham:
to set us free from the hand of our enemies, free to worship him
without fear,
holy and righteous in his sight
all the days of our life.

The Mission of the Twelve

Mk 6:7-13

Jesus summoned the Twelve and began to send them out two by two and gave them authority over unclean spirits.

He instructed them to take nothing for the journey

but a walking stick—

no food, no sack, no money in their belts.

They were, however, to wear sandals

but not a second tunic.

He said to them,

"Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave.

Whatever place does not welcome you or listen to you,

leave there and shake the dust off your feet

in testimony against them."

So they went off and preached repentance.

The Twelve drove out many demons,

and they anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.

MARTYRS OF SCILLITAN

(Feast Day July 17) d. 180

The Scillitan Martyrs were a group of twelve North African Christians (seven men and five women) who were executed for their beliefs on July 17, 180. Their names were Speratus, Nartzalus, Cintinus (Cittinus), Veturius, Felix, Aquilinus, Laetantius, Januaria, Generosa, Vestia, Donata, and Secunda. They were an example of the strength and vigor of the Church in Africa in the 2nd century. The martyrs take their name from Scilla (or Scillium), a town in Numidia (present day Algeria). The Acts of the Scillitan Martyrs are considered to be the earliest documents of the church of Africa.

Speratus, their principal spokesman, wrote that they had lived a quiet and moral life, paying their dues and doing no wrong to their neighbors. However, when called upon to swear an oath to the emperor, they refused. The proconsul of Scillium asked the seven men and five women what has caused them to rebel against worshipping the emperor. They replied, "the books and epistles of Paul, a just man." The emperor was seemingly unimpressed but not particularly upset, and so he gave them thirty days to reconsider and recant, but they all refused. Their trial and execution took place in Carthage under Governor Vigellius Saturninus, who was the first persecutor of Christians in Africa.

Sebastian (Feast Day January 20) c. 256 - January 20, 287

According to legend, Sebastian was born at Narbonne, Gaul. He became a soldier in the Roman army and encouraged two Christians, Marcellian and Marcus, under sentence of death, to remain firm in their faith. Sebastian made numerous converts: among them were Nicostratus, who was in charge of prisoners and his wife, Zoe, a deaf mute whom he cured; the jailer Claudius; Chromatius, Prefect of Rome, whom he cured of gout; and Chromatius' son, Tiburtius. After Chromatius was healed, he set the prisoners free, freed his slaves, and resigned as prefect.

Sebastian was captain in the praetorian guards during the reign of Emperors Diocletian and Maximian. Neither knew that Sebastian was a Christian, but when it was discovered that he was a Christian, he was ordered to be executed. He was shot with arrows and left for dead, but when the widow of St. Castulus went to recover his body, she found he was still alive and nursed him back to health. Soon after, Sebastian intercepted the Emperor, denounced him for his cruelty to Christians, and was beaten to death on the Emperor's orders.

St. Sebastian is the patron saint of athletes because of his physical endurance and his energetic way of spreading and defending the Faith.

Backyard Olympics



The Summer Olympic Games provide the perfect inspiration for families and friends to create an Olympic competition. Friendly competition teaches children about teamwork and how to be a gracious winner or loser. Before starting your backyard Olympics, consider holding an opening

ceremony and ask Olympians to take an oath of good sportsmanship like athletes do at the Olympic Games.

Call some friends or relatives and invite them to join your family for some games to play in the yard or a local field. Consider creating paper medals for the events.

Some event ideas include:

- * Running Long Jump: With a running start, see who can jump the farthest from a line marked on the ground.
- × Relay Race: Use a stick or baton to hand off between runners while they go on a designated path. If you don't have enough runners for a race, have participants race to beat their own time.
- * No Water Synchronized Swimming: Have groups pick music and choreograph a short routine to see how in sync they can stay.
- * Balance Beam: Paint a straight, even stripe on a flat section of lawn, which is the "balance beam." Ask participants to perform a series of increasingly difficult maneuvers without straying from the stripe. Award points for completion of each maneuver. Some fun suggestions include: walking forward, walking backward, hopping on one foot, doing front rolls, doing cartwheels.



- * Hula-hoop-a-thon: Kids keep their hoops moving as long as possible and are eliminated when their hoops touch the ground.
- × Discus: See who can throw a frisbee the farthest distance.
- * Water Balloon Shot Put: See who can throw a water balloon the farthest distance.
- Pool Noodle Javelin: Each child gets three attempts to see who can throw his or her pool noodle the farthest.

Multiplication of the Loaves

Jn 6:1-15

So the men reclined, about five thousand in number. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks, and distributed them to those who were reclining, and also as much of the fish as they wanted. When they had had their fill, he said to his disciples, "Gather the fragments left over, so that nothing will be wasted." So they collected them, and filled twelve wicker baskets with fragments from the five barley loaves that had been more than they could eat. When the people saw the sign he had done, they said, "This is truly the Prophet, the one who is to come into the world." Since Jesus knew that they were going to come and carry him off to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain alone.

Bl. Stanley Rother

(Feast Day July 28) March 27, 1935 - July 28,1981

Stanley Francis Rother grew up on a farm in Oklahoma and attended Holy Trinity Catholic Church and School. He worked hard doing chores, attended school, played sports, was an altar server, and enjoyed the activities associated with growing up in a small town. While in high school, he began to discern the possibility of a vocation to the priesthood. After high school, he went to seminary and was ordained a priest. After five years, Fr. Rother received permission to join the staff at the Oklahoma diocese's mission in Santiago Atitlan, Guatemala. He served

the native tribe of the Tz'utujil. Fr. Rother learned Spanish and the Tz'utujil language. He celebrated Mass in their language and helped translate the New Testament.

Fr. Rother was surrounded by extreme poverty among the Tz'utujil, who were living in one-room huts growing what they could on their small plots of land. He ministered to his parishioners in their homes eating with them, visiting the sick and aiding them with medical issues. He even put his farming skills to use by helping them in the fields, bringing in different crops, and building an irrigation system.

While he served in Guatemala, there was a civil war and the Catholic Church was caught in the middle due to its emphasis on catechizing and educating the people. During this conflict, thousands of Catholics were killed. For his safety, Fr. Rother returned home to



Oklahoma, but didn't stay long, as he was determined to give his life completely to his people, stating that "the shepherd cannot run." He returned to Santiago Atitlan to continue the work of the mission.

Within a few months, he was executed. On Dec. 1, 2016, Pope Francis officially recognized Fr. Rother as a martyr for the faith. He is the first martyr from the United States and the first U.S.-born priest to be beatified. The Rite of Beatification was held on Sept. 23, 2017, in downtown Oklahoma City – an event attended by more than 20,000 people from around the world.

- × 1 8oz. can chicken stock
- × 1 cup whipping cream
- * 1/4 cup chopped fresh dill or 2 tsp. dried dill weed

- x 12 oz. tagliatelle or linguine, freshly cooked
- × 4 oz. smoked salmon, cut into thin strips
- × feta cheese
- × capers

Bring chicken stock & cream to boil in heavy large skillet over high heat. Reduce heat & simmer until mixture thickens enough to coat a spoon, whisking occasionally about 10 minutes. The Bread of Life Discourse

Jn 6:24-35

When the crowd saw that neither Jesus nor his disciples were there, they themselves got into boats and came to Capernaum looking for Jesus.

And when they found him across the sea they said to him, "Rabbi, when did you get here?"

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



(Feast Day July 25) 1549 – July 25, 1583; 1550 – July 25, 1583

Alphonsus Pacheco was born in Spain. At the age of eighteen, he entered the Jesuit novitiate. He was eventually recruited for the Far East missions. Alphonsus arrived in Goa, India in September 1574 and was ordained a priest and worked at St Paul's college. He returned to Europe and two years later he returned to Goa with thirteen new missionaries.

Anthony Francisco was a Portuguese missionary and was among the thirteen who arrived in Goa with Fr. Pacheco in 1581. Francisco was ordained in 1582. Fr. Francisco was appointed to the mission at Orlim on the Salsette peninsula; however, his active

missionary career lasted only a few months. When a new mission superior arrived in Salsette, Fr. Pacheco served as his guide in the visitation of all the villages in Salsette. Fr. Francisco and others were among the group. In the village of Cuncolim, there was a revolt against Portuguese colonization and the Jesuits were killed in the incident. When Fr. Pacheco saw the hostile Hindu villagers massacring his three companions, he boldly faced the assailants and immediately a lance pierced his breast. Extending his arm in the form of a cross, he prayed," Lord, you were pierced with a lance for me. I ask you to pardon those who have wounded me and to send them to other missionaries to lead them to heaven." Fr. Pacheco died saying the name "Jesus." The last to fall was Fr. Francisco. All five Jesuits were between thirty and thirty-five years of age. Their bodies were recovered from a well and taken back to the mission in Goa. They were beatified by Pope Leo XIII on April 2, 1893.

Preheat oven to 450 F. Oil a covered casserole dish or a Dutch oven. Sift together flour, salt, baking soda, and Cream of Tartar. Add buttermilk. Mix until blended; dough will be a bit sticky. Knead 4 or 5 times (not too much or the bread will be tough) and shape into a ball. Cut cross in top and place in prepared pan. Bake covered 30 minutes.



MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



(Feast Day August 9) October 12, 1891 - August 9, 1942

Edith Stein was born into a prominent Jewish family in Breslau, Germany (now Wroclaw, Poland). At the age of 14, she stopped believing in God. She went to university

and became fascinated with philosophy. She eventually earned a doctorate in philosophy in 1916 and became a university teacher. Her spiritual journey began after reading the autobiography of St. Teresa of Avila, which led to her baptism in 1922. After several years as an active laywoman, rising intellectual, and pioneer feminist, Edith Stein entered the Carmel of Cologne where – in imitation of St. Teresa of Avila -- she became a Carmelite nun, taking the name Teresa Benedicta of the Cross and devoted herself to contemplative prayer and philosophical work.

After living for four years in the Cologne Carmel, Sister Teresa Benedicta moved to the Carmelite monastery in Echt, Netherlands, in 1938. The Nazis occupied that country in 1940. In retaliation for being denounced by the Dutch bishops, the Nazis arrested all Dutch Jews who had become Christians. Teresa Benedicta and her sister Rosa, also a Catholic, died in a gas chamber in Auschwitz on August 9, 1942.

St. Teresa Benedicta of the Cross was a woman of integrity who followed the truth wherever it led her. Pope John Paul II beatified Teresa Benedicta of the Cross in 1987 and canonized her 12 years later.

Bubble Fun



Jesus is the living bread that came *down* from heaven. Today, make some bubbles and send them up to heaven. You can use bubbles from the store or make your own solution and wand.

- × 4 cups warm water
- × 1/2 cup sugar
- × 1/2 cup blue Dawn dish soap

Whisk the sugar into the warm water until the sugar dissolves. Whisk in dish soap. Let the homemade bubbles sit for a couple of hours for best results. Make your own wand with one of the following:

- × Fly swatter
- Plastic cup: Punch a hole in the bottom to blow through. Dip the large open end into the solution.
- Plastic soft drink bottles: Cut the bottom off the bottle and dip. Use the lid end of the bottle to blow.
- Pipe cleaners: Create just about any shape you like from a pipe cleaner, just make sure you keep a small section as a handle.
- Plastic funnel: This already has a natural shape for a bubble wand. Use the large end to dip and the small end to blow.

 Celebration
 Ice Cream Cake

Celebrate Jesus with this delicious cake!

For Cake: 1 store bought Angel food cake (you can also use a chiffon tube cake)

- × 3 pints of ice cream (Choose 3 flavors that work well together. There are so many possibilities, but some ideas include: coffee, maple walnut, and chocolate chip; mint chip, chocolate, and vanilla; strawberry, vanilla, and lemon.
- Large soup spoon for scooping ice cream from pint and knife or spatula for spreading
- For chocolate whipped cream icing:
 pint of heavy whipping cream metal bowl and hand beater
 2-3 Tbsp. of chocolate fudge topping (i.e. Hershey's or Sanders ice cream topping)

Put metal bowl and beaters in freezer along with pint of whipping cream for 10-15 minutes before whipping the cream. Whip cream until soft yet somewhat firm peaks form before adding the chocolate fudge. If you add too soon, the cream will not whip to a stiff enough consistency. Put the whipped cream into the refrigerator until ready to ice the cake.

Slice angel food cake in half horizontally with a serrated bread knife. Slice each section in half again horizontally so that there are four even layers. Use a sturdy dinner sized paper plate and cut a piece of parchment or wax paper to size before laying down the first layer of cake. This makes it easy to transfer ice cream cake to a nice serving plate later. Take two of the pints of ice cream out of the freezer to let soften a few minutes before spreading on layers. Work quickly to scoop and spread first pint of ice cream on bottom layer of cake. Smooth ice cream and add second layer of cake. Spread second pint of ice cream. Put cake back into the freezer to harden.

Take remaining pint of ice cream out of the freezer to soften. Use a second plate for the third layer of cake, then spread the 3rd flavor of ice cream topped with final 4th cake layer. Put back in freezer to harden. When hardened, take bottom section out of freezer and ice with chocolate whipped cream, including inside of tube. Add second layer of hardened cake and frost this portion as well with the chocolate whipped cream. Return to freezer until hardened and ready to serve.

Depending on the season and air temperature, you may need to let the ice cream cake soften from 5 - 15 minutes before slicing to serve. Sprinkle with shaved chocolate or fruit.



Sometimes it takes time to understand the meaning of the Gospel. Journaling is a great way to unpack the words and talk to God.

Create a simple prayer journal or get an empty notebook. Set aside 10-20 minutes for your family to reflect on the Gospel. Create a prayerful environment by lighting candles and/or playing instrumental music in the background. Read today's Gospel and invite everyone to listen to what God is saying to them in the silence of their hearts. After a period of silence, invite everyone to write what they heard in their journal. Mary Visits Elizabeth and the Canticle of Mary

Lk 1:39-56

Mary set out and traveled to the hill country in haste to a town of Judah. where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the infant leaped in her womb, and Elizabeth, filled with the Holy Spirit, cried out in a loud voice and said, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And how does this happen to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me? For at the moment the sound of your greeting reached my ears, the infant in my womb leaped for joy. Blessed are you who believed

that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled."

And Mary said:

"My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my Savior for he has looked with favor on his lowly servant. From this day all generations will call me blessed: the Almighty has done great things for me and holy is his Name. He has mercy on those who fear him in every generation. He has shown the strength of his arm, and has scattered the proud in their conceit. He has cast down the mighty from their thrones, and has lifted up the lowly. He has filled the hungry with good things, and the rich he has sent away empty. He has come to the help of his servant Israel for he has remembered his promise of mercy, the promise he made to our fathers, to Abraham and his children forever."

Mary remained with her about three months and then returned to her home.

of Alexandria

(Feast Day November 25) d. 310

Catherine of Alexandria was born around 287 in Alexandria, Egypt. At that time, Alexandria was one of the finest cities in the world, and a center of learning and culture as well as faith. Christian tradition states that she was of noble birth, possibly a princess, and very well-educated. Around the age of fourteen, she experienced a moving vision of Mary and the infant Jesus, and she decided to become a Christian.

When she was only eighteen years old, Catherine presented herself to the Emperor Maxentius

who was violently persecuting the Christians, denounced him for his cruelty, and endeavored to prove that worship of false gods was wrong. Astounded at the young girl's audacity, but unable to provide an argument against her position, the tyrant detained her in his palace and summoned fifty philosophers to debate her. However, Catherine was moved by the power of the Holy Spirit and spoke eloquently in defense of her faith and emerged from the debate victorious. Her words were so moving that several of the pagans converted to Christianity and were immediately executed. Maxentius was furious and had Catherine scourged and then imprisoned. During her imprisonment more than 200 people came to see her, including Maxentius' wife. All converted to Christianity and were subsequently martyred. Twelve days later, when the dungeon was opened, a bright light and fragrant perfume filled the space, and Catherine came forth even more radiant and beautiful. Soon afterwards, the saint was condemned to die on a spiked wheel, but, at her touch, this instrument of torture was miraculously shattered. The Emperor, enraged beyond control, then had her beheaded. Angels carried her body to Mount Sinai where later a church and monastery were built in her honor.

Pineapple Rosemary Agua Fresca

The feast of the Assumption is also a harvest feast day. In many Catholic countries today is the day the vineyards, herbs and plants are blessed. This wonderful Pineapple and Rosemary Aqua Fresca is perfect for the feast of the Assumption.

- × 3 cups pineapple chunks
- × 4 cups water divided
- × 2 Tbsp. rosemary
- × 3/4 cup water
- × 1/4 cup sugar
- × 2 cups pineapple juice
- × 4 cups ice
- pineapple chunks and
 rosemary sprigs for garnish

Combine pineapple chunks, 2 cups water and rosemary in a blender or food processor. Blend until completely liquified. Allow the rosemary to steep in the liquid for about 15 minutes. Strain into a large pitcher. Add remaining water, sugar and pineapple juice and ice to the pitcher. Stir to combine. Portion Agua Fresca in glasses and garnish with chunks of pineapple and rosemary sprigs.

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



(Feast Day August 28) 330 - 405

Moses the Black was a slave of a government official in Egypt who dismissed him for theft and suspected murder. He was a large, imposing figure and became the leader of a gang of bandits who roamed the Nile Valley spreading terror and violence. On one occasion, he took shelter with some monks in a colony in the desert of Scete when attempting to hide from local authorities. Their lifestyle as well as their peace and contentment influenced Moses deeply. He soon gave up his old way of life and joined the monastic community at Scete.

Moses had a rather difficult time adjusting to regular monastic discipline. His flair for adventure remained with him. Attacked by a group of robbers in his desert cell, Moses fought back, overpowered the intruders, and dragged them to the chapel where the other monks were at prayer. He told the brothers that he didn't think he should hurt the robbers and asked what he should do with them. The overwhelmed robbers repented, were converted, and themselves joined the community.

At one point, Moses became discouraged when he concluded he was not perfect enough to be a monk. Early one morning, St. Isidore, abbot of the community, took Brother Moses to the roof and together they watched the first rays of dawn come over the horizon. Isidore told Moses, "Only slowly do the rays of the sun drive away the night and usher in a new day, and thus, only slowly does one become a perfect contemplative."

Moses proved to be a prophetic and effective leader. He was eventually ordained a priest and became the spiritual leader of a colony of hermits in the desert. At about age 75, the colony was attacked by a group of bandits. Moses forbade the brothers to take up weapons. All but eight were martyred by the bandits.

Today, St. Moses the Black is remembered as one of the Desert Fathers and is honored as an apostle of non-violence.

With a timer set for 1 minute (or an appropriate time for the player), the person acts out the event on their slip of paper without talking. The first person/team to guess the correct answer gets a point. Rotate so everyone gets a turn to act and a turn to guess.

The Tradition of the Elders

Mk 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

When the Pharisees with some scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around Jesus,

they observed that some of his disciples ate their meals with unclean, that is, unwashed, hands.

—For the Pharisees and, in fact, all Jews,

do not eat without carefully washing their hands,

keeping the tradition of the elders.

And on coming from the marketplace

they do not eat without purifying themselves.

And there are many other things that they have traditionally observed,

the purification of cups and jugs and kettles and beds. —

So the Pharisees and scribes questioned him,

"Why do your disciples not follow the tradition of the elders

but instead eat a meal with unclean hands?"

He responded,

"Well did Isaiah prophesy about you hypocrites, as it is written:

This people honors me with their lips,
but their hearts are far from me;
in vain do they worship me,
teaching as doctrines human precepts.
You disregard God's commandment but cling to human tradition."
He summoned the crowd again and said to them,
"Hear me, all of you, and understand.
Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person;
but the things that come out from within are what defile.

"From within people, from their hearts, come evil thoughts, unchastity, theft, murder, adultery, greed, malice, deceit, licentiousness, envy, blasphemy, arrogance, folly. All these evils come from within and they defile."

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



(Feast Day July 24) March 6, 1880 - July 24, 1936

Born in Barcelona, Spain, Blessed Maria Mercedes Prat showed a great love for her neighbor and tried to inspire that type of love in others. She attended Mass daily and gave herself to God completely as a child. Maria was a devoted student, painter, and excelled in sewing. After her parents' deaths, she helped care for her younger siblings. As an orphan and the eldest daughter, she combined successfully her prayer life, her responsibilities in the home, her artistic talent, and her apostolate as a catechist and a member of the Teresian Arch-confraternity.

Once her siblings were old enough, she entered the Society of St. Teresa of Jesus in Tortosa and eventually went back to Barcelona for her assignment at the motherhouse. There, she taught joyfully in the community school for sixteen years until the sisters were forced to flee due to the unrest from the Spanish Civil War and the persecution of Catholics. She was arrested and shot for being a religious sister. The words of the Our Father were the last words on her lips. The sisters in the order described her as a "true Teresian—a religious according to the heart of God."

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Skewered Sesame Beef

This meal can be enjoyed without touching the food with your hands!

- × 1/4 cup soy sauce
- × 2 Tbsp. sesame oil
- × 1 Tbsp. Dijon mustard
- × 1 Tbsp. sugar
- × 2 tsp. garlic, minced
- × 8 oz. beef tenderloin, cut into 1-inch cubes
- × 12 mushrooms, halved
- x 1 large red pepper, seeded and cut into 1-inch pieces
- × 2 Tbsp. sesame seeds, toasted

Stir first 5 ingredients together to make marinade. Add cubed beef to the marinade and set at room temperature for one hour or refrigerate up to 4 hours. Thread each wooden cocktail skewer with one piece of bell pepper, one beef cube, and one mushroom half. Dip one side of each skewer in the toasted sesame seeds. Arrange on lightly greased baking sheet and bake 5 minutes at 450 F or arrange directly over moderately hot coals for 2 to 3 minutes.

The Healing of a Deaf Man

Mk 7:31-37

Again Jesus left the district of Tyre and went by way of Sidon to the Sea of Galilee, into the district of the Decapolis.

And people brought to him a deaf man who had a speech impediment and begged him to lay his hand on him.

He took him off by himself away from the crowd.

He put his finger into the man's ears

and, spitting, touched his tongue;

then he looked up to heaven and groaned, and said to him,

"Ephphatha!"— that is, "Be opened!" —

And immediately the man's ears were opened,

his speech impediment was removed,

and he spoke plainly.

He ordered them not to tell anyone.

But the more he ordered them not to,

the more they proclaimed it.

They were exceedingly astonished and they said,

"He has done all things well.

He makes the deaf hear and the mute speak."

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



(Feast Day May 23) 1892 - 1945

Vilmos Apor de Altorja was a Hungarian Roman Catholic bishop, born in Ségesvár, Transylvania (at that time, Hungary, now Romania). He was a baron in the noble Apor Family and served as a bishop during World War II. He became famous for his steadfast commitment to the poor. During the persecution of the Jews, he actively

defended the persecuted and employed all his contacts in favor of those seeking refuge; the episcopal estates, convents and hospitals gave shelter to the needy. He was a gentle and kind person and dedicated himself to opposing both communism and Nazism. He used his sermons as a chance to condemn them, though coming at a great personal risk to himself. On Good Friday 1945, he sacrificed his life for his faithful while defending the women hidden in the cellar of the episcopal palace against abuse from violent Soviet soldiers. The bullets that penetrated his body formed the shape of a cross.

The beatification process opened on 5 March 1991 and culminated after Pope John Paul II presided over the beatification in Saint Peter's Square on November 9, 1997.

Incredible Accomplishments



Today, help your family appreciate two people in history who experienced hearing loss and have done great things.

Ludwig van Beethoven is one of the most famous composers that ever lived. He was profoundly deaf, but that didn't stop him from composing his world-renowned music. Beethoven had lost 60% of his hearing by the age of 31 and became completely deaf at 46. Beethoven continued to write music even when deaf. He wrote his famous 5th Symphony as he was losing his hearing. You can listen to a 7-minute excerpt of this piece here: https://www.classicsforkids.com/composers/composer_profile.php?id=7

Thomas Edison was quite possibly the greatest inventor of all time. Many of his inventions have improved the quality of our modern day lives. During his career Edison's inventions included the incandescent light bulb, the phonograph, and the motion picture camera. Thomas Edison was completely deaf in one ear and hard of hearing in the other. He believed that his deafness was a benefit to his work, as it would help keep conversations short so that he could have more time for work! Plan a trip to Greenfield Village to see Edison's laboratory and more!



Bananas have lots of potassium and magnesium which promote hearing health. Here's an enjoyable way to add bananas to your diet today.

- × 1 2/3 cups sugar
- × 2/3 cup shortening
- × 3 eggs
- x 1 1/4 cups bananas (ripe and mashed)
- × 2/3 cups buttermilk
- x 2 1/3 cups all-purpose
 flour (sifted)
- × 1 1/4 tsp. baking powder
- × 1 1/4 tsp. baking soda
- × 1 tsp. salt

Preheat oven to 350 F. Put flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt in a bowl. Cream shortening & sugar. Add eggs, bananas and buttermilk. Add dry ingredients and mix until just blended.

Pour into a 13x9 or 2 8-inch round pans. Bake for 30 minutes. Check every 5 minutes after that until toothpick comes out clean in middle

Peter's Confession about Jesus, The First Prediction of the Passion, and The Conditions of Discipleship

Mk 8:27-35

Jesus and his disciples set out

for the villages of Caesarea Philippi.

Along the way he asked his disciples,

"Who do people say that I am?"

They said in reply,

"John the Baptist, others Elijah,

still others one of the prophets."

And he asked them,

"But who do you say that I am?"

Peter said to him in reply,

"You are the Christ."

Sts. Cornelius and Cyprian

(Feast Day September 16) d. 253, 258

St. Cornelius was elected to succeed St. Fabian as the Bishop of Rome (pope), after Fabian was killed in a persecution in the year 250. The Church faced not only persecution, but also opposition from within. A priest named Novatian denied the Church's authority to forgive apostacy. Novatian and his followers believed that those who renounced the faith could not be accepted back into the Church even if they had repented. Novatian had himself consecrated as a rival Bishop of Rome, thereby becoming an anti-pope. St. Cornelius called a council of bishops together to settle the dispute. The council condemned

Novatian's view. Pope Cornelius, backed by St. Cyprian and other bishops, upheld the Church's teaching, and allowed sinners to do penance and return to the Church. In 253, St. Cornelius was exiled by the authorities, and died a martyr soon afterward.

St. Cyprian was a famous lawyer and orator in North Africa. He didn't become a Christian until age forty-six, then later became a priest and the bishop of Carthage. St. Cyprian went into hiding during the Roman persecution of 250, to allow himself to continue ministering to his people. He, like Cornelius, had to deal with the beliefs of Novatian. During this time another priest took over his position and then forgave all those who renounced the faith without requiring any penance of them at all. This position was too lenient, and Cyprian succeeded in having it condemned by the Church. New persecutions broke out under Emperor Valerian. St. Cyprian was arrested and tried for being a Christian. When he was read his death sentence, he exclaimed "Blessed be God!" He was martyred in 258.

The winner is determined by whether the person who thought of an object is able to successfully answer each of the 20 questions without giving away the object OR whether the person who is asking the questions is able to correctly guess the object in 20 or less questions.

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



Karolina grew up in a Catholic family in rural Poland in the Diocese of Tarnow. She was one of eleven children. Her family prayed daily and displayed the love of God to her. Often, Karolina would gather neighbors and relatives, mainly children, and they would read the Scriptures together under a pear tree near her home. She loved praying the rosary, using the beads given to her by her mother. Her prayers often caused her to get less sleep than she needed.

She would pray the rosary constantly, and even though it was a long walk to Mass, she would go during the week, in addition to Sunday. Because of her love for serving, she helped her uncle in the library, and she also helped organize things at her parish. In addition to serving the Church, she taught her younger siblings and the children of the area their catechism. By age 16, Karolina was a beautiful, enthusiastic girl.

In 1914, World War I broke out in Poland, and in November 1914, the Russian army controlled her city. On November 18, an armed Russian soldier attempted to force himself on her and eventually killed her. Karolina was only 16.

Three thousand people flocked to her funeral and called for her cause for sainthood to be introduced. Pope John Paul II beatified her in Poland.

Enjoy this Polish dish in honor of Bl. Karolina Kózka.

- × 4 pieces fresh Kowalski sausage (also can use Italian sausage)
- × 3 bell peppers (any colors)
- × onion
- × 2 small zucchinis
- × 2-3 carrots
- × 1 lb. red or gold potatoes (cut into small pieces)

Slice vegetables and put in a baking pan. Cut kielbasa into 3 or 4 inch slices. Mix vegetables and sausage. Pour over olive oil, add Italian herbs (thyme, basil, oregano, rosemary, garlic, pepper, salt). Mix all together. Bake in oven for 50 min-1 hr at 400 F.

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



(Feast Day May 16) 1345 – 1393

St. John was born in the town of Pomuk (later Nepomuk) in Bohemia around the year 1340. After being cured of a childhood disease through the prayer of his parents, John studied for the priesthood in Prague and

Padua. After ordination, he was assigned to a parish in Prague where he gained a reputation as a great preacher. King Wenceslaus IV heard of him and invited him to become the confessor for the royal court around the year 1379. In 1393, the king asked what his beautiful wife had confessed, but John would not reveal her confession despite the king's attempted bribes and torture. Finally, the king had him burned, tied to a wheel, and thrown off a bridge into a river. His body was found the next day, and he was immediately revered as a saint. He was canonized in 1729 by Pope Benedict XIII.

Visit a Cider Mill



Fall is a beautiful season in Michigan. Enjoy the beauty of the season by visiting a cider mill. While you're there, consider stopping in the bakery, going for a hayride, visiting the petting zoo, and picking some delicious Michigan apples.



Sin entered the world when Adam and Eve ate the forbidden fruit. There is nothing forbidden about enjoying this recipe using freshly picked apples.

- × 4 large apples
- × 1/4 cup brown sugar
- × 1 tsp. cinnamon
- x 1/4 cup chopped pecans (optional)
- × 1/4 cup currants or chopped raisins
- × butter
- × 3/4 cup boiling water

Preheat your oven to 375 F. Cut out holes in apples for stuffing: Rinse and dry the apples. Use a sharp paring knife to cut out the cores. First cut out the stem area and then use a small metal spoon to scoop out the seeds. Cut the holes so that they are an inch or so wide. Leave the bottom ½ inch of the apples intact. Place the brown sugar, cinnamon, currants or chopped raisins, and chopped pecans (if using) in a small bowl and stir to combine. Put the apples in a baking dish and stuff each apple with the sugar stuffing mixture. Place a dot of butter on top of the sugar. Pour the boiling water into the bottom of the baking dish. Bake at 375 F for 30 to 45 minutes, until the apples are cooked through and tender, but not overcooked and mushy. When done, remove the apples from the oven and baste them with the juices from the pan. Serve with a side of vanilla ice cream.



The Confiteor

This prayer, which is often said at the beginning of Mass, helps us to take direct responsibility for our sins and names sin in the areas of thoughts, words, actions, and omissions. It also includes a bodily gesture to show repentance and calls on the Church in heaven and on earth. Pray this as a family, thinking deeply on the words to examine one's conscience.

I confess to almighty God
and to you, my brothers and sisters,
that I have greatly sinned
in my thoughts and in my words,
in what I have done
and in what I have failed to do,
(strike your fist over your heart for the bolded lines)

through my fault, through my fault,

through my most grievous fault;

Bl. Jesús Emilio Jaramillo Monsalve

(Feast Day October 3) February 16, 1916 - October 3, 1989

Jesús Emilio was born in Santo Domingo, Colombia, and entered seminary at the age of 13. He was ordained a priest in 1940 and entered the Xaverian Missionaries. While pursuing doctoral studies in Bogotá, he served as a chaplain in a women's prison, a spiritual director for seminarians, and novice master for his community. Jesús Emilio was consecrated as a bishop in 1971, taking the name Jaramillo. The region entrusted to his care suffered from the ravages of the Colombian civil war where drug trafficking was rampant. Through his efforts, he was able to bring stability and security

to the region, despite the powerful influence of the drug cartels and rebel groups. As bishop, Jaramillo championed the rights of the poor and was known as a dedicated shepherd who tirelessly worked for justice.

Bishop Jaramillo was kidnapped on October 2, 1989, as he and another priest were making parish visits. The rebels eventually released the priest but murdered the bishop in revenge for the constant criticism of the rebels and his work for peace for the people of Colombia. Blessed Jesús Emilio Jaramillo Monsalve was beatified by Pope Francis on September 8, 2017. His memory is celebrated on October 3, the anniversary of his martyrdom.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Crockpot Italian Wedding Soup

This delicious and easy recipe is fitting as we reflect on marriage today.

- 12-16 ounces frozen meatballs, regular or mini (or you can use your own meatball recipe)
- × 6 cups chicken broth
- × 1/2 cup carrot, diced (about 3 medium carrots)
- × 1/2 cup celery, diced (about 1 medium stalk)
- × 1/4 of an onion, chopped
- × 1 minced clove of garlic
- × 1 Tbsp. dried parsley
- × 1 tsp. dried oregano
- × salt and pepper to taste
- × 2 cups frozen chopped spinach, defrosted
- x pasta (Acini di pepe, orzo, or shape of your choice)

Place the meatballs in the slow cooker. Then add the chicken broth, seasoning, and vegetables. Cook on low for 6-8 hours or high for 3-4 hours. In the last half-hour of cooking, add the pasta and spinach and cook until tender. Serve with Parmesan cheese if desired.



Nuptial Blessing

The Nuptial Blessing is a beautiful moment in a Catholic wedding ceremony. It takes place after the bride and groom have exchanged their consent and have become husband and wife. In this blessing, the celebrant prays for the married couple and asks that God give them special graces. Invite one person to lead your family in this prayer. Offer the prayer for all the married couples in your immediate and extended family and any future marriages of your children.

O God, who by your mighty power created all things out of nothing, and, when you had set in place the beginnings of the universe, formed man and woman in your own image, making the woman an inseparable helpmate to the man, that they might be no longer two, but one flesh, and taught that what you were pleased to make one must never be divided;

O God, who consecrated the bond of Marriage by so great a mystery that in the wedding covenant you foreshadowed the Sacrament of Christ and his Church;

O God, by whom woman is joined to man and the companionship they had in the beginning is endowed with the one blessing not forfeited by original sin nor washed away by the flood.

Look now with favor on these your servants,
joined together in Marriage,
who ask to be strengthened by your blessing.
Send down on them the grace of the Holy Spirit
and pour your love into their hearts,
that they may remain faithful in the Marriage covenant.

May the grace of love and peace
abide in your daughters
and let them always follow the example of those holy women
whose praises are sung in the Scriptures.

May husbands entrust their hearts to their wives, so that, acknowledging them as their equal and joint heir to the life of grace, they may show them due honor and cherish them always with the love that Christ has for his Church.

And now, Lord, we implore you:

may these your servants

hold fast to the faith and keep your commandments;

made one in the flesh,

may they be blameless in all they do;

and with the strength that comes from the Gospel,

may they bear true witness to Christ before all;

(may they be blessed with children,

and prove themselves virtuous parents,

The Rich Man

Mk 10:17-30 or 10:17-27

As Jesus was setting out on a journey, a man ran up, knelt down before him, and asked him, "Good teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus answered him, "Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone.

You know the commandments: You shall not kill; you shall not commit adultery; you shall not steal; you shall not bear false witness; you shall not defraud; honor your father and your mother."

He replied and said to him, "Teacher, all of these I have observed from my youth." Jesus, looking at him, loved him and said to him, "You are lacking in one thing.

Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." At that statement his face fell, and he went away sad, for he had many possessions.

Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, "How hard it is for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!" The disciples were amazed at his words. So Jesus again said to them in reply, "Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for one who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." They were exceedingly astonished and said among themselves, "Then who can be saved?" Jesus looked at them and said, "For human beings it is impossible, but not for God. All things are possible for God." Peter began to say to him, "We have given up everything and followed you." Jesus said, "Amen, I say to you, there is no one who has given up house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or lands for my sake and for the sake of the gospel who will not receive a hundred times more now in this present age: houses and brothers and sisters and mothers and children and lands, with persecutions, and eternal life in the age to come."

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



Bl. Adílio Daronch

(Feast Day May 21) October 25, 1908 - May 21, 1924

Blessed Adílio Daronch was a Catholic teenager. He was born to Italian immigrants as the third of eight children and lived his entire life in Brazil. He was known to have had a love for football and riding. He became a dedicated altar server following the reception of his First Communion and often accompanied the priest Blessed Manuel Gómez González on his long missions of evangelization to the Kaingang Indians.

In 1924, the Bishop of Santa Maria asked Fr. Manuel to go to the Teutonic colonies in the forest in the south, so Fr. Manuel decided to take Daronch with him. The pair stopped in Palmeria to administer the sacraments where Fr. Manuel exhorted the local revolutionaries to practice mutual respect and forgiveness. But the extremists took a strong dislike to this and grew incensed when he provided a burial for some of their own. The extremists viewed the pair with suspicion and plotted to kill them for this.

The locals warned the two not to go into the forest for they would be at risk. The pair was ambushed in the morning on May 21 and shot dead. Both were beatified in October of 2007 in Brazil. Daronch was made the co-patron for World Youth Day 2012 and 2013.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Chicken Piccata

This Mediterranean dish is rich in flavor!

- × 4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- x 1/4 cup + 1 1/2 Tbsp. flour
 (divided)
- × 1 1/2 tsp. chicken bouillon
- × 2 Tbsp. olive oil
- × 1/2 cup cooking wine
- × juice of one lemon (or 1/4 cup)
- × 1/2 cup chicken stock
- × 2 Tbsp. capers
- × 2 Tbsp. chopped, fresh parsley
- × 1 lb. cooked pasta

Pound chicken to ¼ inch thickness. Mix ¼ cup flour with salt and pepper to taste. Coat chicken with flour mixture. Cook chicken in olive oil in skillet on med-high about 4 minutes per side until golden brown. Remove chicken. Lower heat to medium and add butter & 1 ½ Tbsp. flour. Stir until smooth. Stir in wine, lemon juice, stock, & bouillon (if granules, dissolve in 2 Tbsp. water). Scrape up the brown bits from skillet. Simmer 2 minutes. Return chicken to skillet and simmer for 5 minutes. Add capers & parsley. Serve over pasta.

Ambition of James and John

"You know that those who are recognized as rulers over the Gentiles lord it over them.



MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



Ignatius was born in Syria and was a convert to Christianity. In the year 107, Emperor Trajan visited Antioch and forced the Christians there to choose between death and apostasy (denying the Christian faith). Ignatius would not deny Christ and thus was condemned to

be put to death in Rome. Ignatius allowed soldiers to bind him in a rickety cart and lead him to Rome for martyrdom. As his cart rolled into towns, local bishops and Christians came to meet and encourage him.

Ignatius is well known for the seven letters he wrote on the long journey from Antioch to Rome. They urge the Christians there to remain faithful to God and to obey their superiors. He was very concerned with unity in the Church; the letters warn against heretical doctrines, providing solid truths of the Christian faith. Ignatius also wrote that Christ was present in the Church, in each member, and in the Blessed Sacrament. He called himself "the bearer of God." Ignatius was devoured by wild beasts in the Roman amphitheater.

RECIPE OF

Hummus and Tabbouleh

Serve this dish with one dip on the left and one of the right and some warm pita bread in the middle.

Easy to Make Hummus:

- × 1 lb. canned chickpeas
- × 1/3 cup tahini
- × juice of 1-2 large lemons
- × 1 small clove garlic, minced
- × Kosher salt to taste
- × 1/8 tsp. ground cumin (optional)
- × 2-3 Tbsp. olive oil

Boil chickpeas in canned juice for five minutes on medium heat. Drain. Place chickpeas, tahini, lemon juice, garlic, cumin, and salt in blender to make an almost smooth thick paste. Place hummus in a shallow bowl and garnish with parsley, radishes, pickles, or toasted pine nuts. Drizzle with olive oil. Serves 4 to 6 people.



Tabbouleh:

- × 1/2 cup fine bulgur wheat
- × 2 large tomatoes, diced
- * 1 bunch green onions, chopped
- * 4 bunches of parsley, chopped
- x 1/2 cup mint chopped or 2 Tbsp. dried mint
- x 1 large cucumber peeled and chopped (optional)
- × 1/2 cup olive oil
- × juice of three lemons
- × 1/2 Tbsp. salt
- × 1/2 tsp. pepper

Wash bulgur wheat. Drain and place in a large bowl. Add all chopped vegetables and mix well. Add oil, lemon juice, salt, and pepper. Allow bulgur to soak and absorb the juice about an hour, serve over fresh lettuce or with hummus and pita bread.

The Blind Bartimaeus

Mk 10:46-52

As Jesus was leaving Jericho with his disciples and a sizable crowd,

Bartimaeus, a blind man, the son of Timaeus,

sat by the roadside begging.

On hearing that it was Jesus of Nazareth,

he began to cry out and say,

"Jesus, son of David, have pity on me."

And many rebuked him, telling him to be silent.

But he kept calling out all the more,

"Son of David, have pity on me."

Jesus stopped and said, "Call him."

So they called the blind man, saying to him,

"Take courage; get up, Jesus is calling you."

He threw aside his cloak, sprang up, and came to Jesus.

Jesus said to him in reply, "What do you want me to do for you?"

The blind man replied to him, "Master, I want to see."

Jesus told him, "Go your way; your faith has saved you."

Immediately he received his sight

and followed him on the way.

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



St. Boniface was born around the year 675 in Wessex (present-day Devon), England. His birth name was Winfrid. He was a brilliant monk in a Benedictine monastery in England. Although he was the head of a school, he thought God wanted him to be a missionary. He went to Frisia (Northern Netherlands and Germany) to begin his work. A war forced him to return to England for a few years, but he did not give up. Next, he journeyed to Rome to ask the pope to tell him where to serve. Pope Gregory II changed Winfrid's name to Boniface, which means "a man who does good deeds." Then he sent Boniface to eastern Germany to convert pagans to Christianity.

For nearly 35 years, Boniface traveled all over Germany, preaching, teaching, and building schools, monasteries, and convents. He returned to Rome to report to the pope about his work. There, the pope ordained him bishop and told him to return to Germany to continue his missionary work and to reform the German Church. In the kingdom where he lived, he had great problems because of lay interference in bishops' elections and the worldliness of the clergy. In order to restore the German Church to its fidelity to Rome and to convert the pagans, Boniface was guided by two principles: 1) to restore the obedience of the clergy to their bishops in union with the pope of Rome, and 2) the establishment of many houses of prayer which took the form of Benedictine monasteries.

As an old man, Boniface returned to Frisia to work among the pagans. One morning, while he was waiting to confirm a group of converts, a band of angry natives rushed into the church and murdered Boniface and about 50 converts. Today St. Boniface is the patron of Germany.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK Scones

In honor of our British saint, enjoy some scones today!

- × 2 cups all-purpose flour
- × 2 tsp. baking powder
- × 1/4 tsp. baking soda
- × 1/2 tsp. salt
- × 2 Tbsp. sugar
- × 1/3 cup cold butter, cut in chunks
- × 1/2 cup buttermilk
- x 1 large egg beaten into the buttermilk
- × milk and sugar

Sift together the first 5 ingredients. Cut in butter with pastry blender. Add buttermilk/egg mixture just until it comes together. Knead dough on floured surface a few times (not too much or they will become tough). Divide dough in

half and pat into a 7-inch circle. Cut circle into 8 wedges. Place on parchment lined baking sheet. Repeat with remaining dough. Brush with milk and sprinkle with sugar. Bake at 425 F for 12 to 15 minutes.

Rais was an Egyptian maiden. According to one account, she was the daughter of a Christian priest living in Alexandria, Egypt. At age twelve, she was sent to live in a women's monastery at Tamman. During a time of widespread persecution of Christians during

the reign of the Roman emperor Diocletian, she went to a well to draw water with other nuns. On the way, they saw a ship with a group of nuns, monks, and other Christians in chains on their way to torture and death. By God's grace, Rais was touched by a desire to suffer for the Lord. Rais confessed herself to be a Christian, berated the abusers, and insisted that they kill her as well if they were killing Christians. She was immediately imprisoned with the others. They were all taken to the Egyptian town of Antinopolis, where Rais was the first of the group to be beheaded.

St. Andrew
Dung Lac
(and the
Vietnamese
Martyrs)

(Feast Day November 24) 1795 – December 21, 1839

St. Andrew Dung Lac was born in Vietnam in 1785. He was born with the name Trần An Dũng but took the name Andrew at his baptism. He was a Catholic convert. Desiring to serve the Church and his country by ministering to the Vietnamese people, he became a Catholic priest and then a

missionary for the promulgation of the faith. During persecution, Andrew Dúng changed his name to Lac to avoid capture, and thus he is memorialized as Andrew Dúng-Lac. He was one of 117 people martyred in Vietnam between 1820 and 1862. Members of the companions group gave their lives for Christ in the 17th, 18th, and 19th centuries, and received beatification during four different occasions between 1900 and 1951. All were canonized during the papacy of St. John Paul II.

In the generations that preceded Andrew's missionary work, Christianity did not spread peacefully throughout Vietnam. The first Portuguese missionary arrived in 1533. Many more followed, including the Dominican and Jesuit orders, but they were met with violent resistance at the hands of various political regimes. Waves of terror and torture were inflicted on all those who dared to carry the faith to the people of Vietnam, and thousands of Catholics and other Christians were murdered for their zeal.

FAMILY FUN Thankful Bunting



Start preparing for Thanksgiving by taking on an attitude of gratitude! Gratitude increases our overall happiness, helps us to be less self-centered, and helps us to be the people God calls us to be. Reflecting on what you are thankful for is a great way for your family to cultivate a generous spirit and a sense of contentment. Collect all of your family's sentiments of gratitude and make a thankful bunting (a string of colorful triangular flags) today.



Here's what you'll need:

- Sturdy white paper, such as cardstock or watercolor paper
- × Scissors
- × Tape
- × Black permanent markers, such as Sharpies
- × Paint/crayons/markers
- × (Optional) Sewing machine

Instructions: First, cut your paper into triangles big enough to draw and write on. Cover your work surface to protect it from the paint/ markers. Next, tape a series of triangles down on your work surface, to hold them in place. Invite family members to draw pictures and/ or write words of the things they are thankful for. Then color the images with paint, markers, or crayons. Once finished, remove the tape. Arrange the triangles and sew them together into one long bunting. If you don't have a sewing machine, use a hole punch to punch holes in the top corners of each triangle, then weave yarn through all the holes to string them all together. Finally, hang your new thankful bunting up where everyone can see it!



RECIPE OF THE WEEK Pumpkin Muffins

In honor of the widow's contribution of two coins, make this simple seasonal two-ingredient recipe.

- × 1 spice cake mix
- × 1 can pure pumpkin (not the pumpkin pie filling)

Mix ingredients well. Preheat oven to 350 F. Put cupcake holders in muffin tin or spray muffin tin to prevent sticking. Fill each muffin well 1/2 to 2/3 full. Bake for 20 to 30 minutes, or until toothpick comes out clear. Let cool and enjoy!

Roque Gonzalez y de Santa-Cruz was born in Paraguay in 1576 as the son of noble Spanish parents. He was an unusually good and religious boy who eventually became a priest. He ministered to the Natives of Paraguay, seeking them out in remote places to evangelize and instruct them in Christianity. After ten years he joined the Society of Jesus.

These were the days of the beginnings of the famous "reductions" of Paraguay. The "reductions" were settlements of Christian Natives run by the Jesuit missionaries, who served as their guardians and trustees. These settlements remained autonomous and isolated from Spanish colonists and Spanish rule. A major factor attracting the Natives was that they were afforded protection from enslavement and forced labor.

Fr. Roque played an important part in establishing the reductions. He labored for nearly twenty years, grappling patiently with hardships, fierce tribes and with the opposition of the European colonists. He threw himself heart and soul into the work. For three years he was in charge of the Reduction of St. Ignatius, and then spent the rest of his life establishing other reductions, half a dozen in all, east of the Parana and Uruguay rivers. He was the first European known to have penetrated into some districts of South America. In 1628, Fr. Roque was killed by natives in an attack on his mission.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Fig Marmalade and Fig Crostini Appetizer

Large shady fig trees were plentiful in the time of Jesus and are still found in Israel today. This sweet dish is fitting as we reflect on today's Gospel.

Fig Marmalade:

- × 2 lbs dried figs
- × 1 pound of sugar (2 cups)
- × 1/2 Tbsp. anise seeds
- × 3 tsp. unflavored gelatin
- × 3/4 cup of water

Fig Crostini Appetizer:

- × 1 baguette
- × 1 log of goat cheese
- × 1 small jar of fig marmalade jam

Boil sugar and water for 5 minutes. Add dried figs and anise seed. Cover and let simmer on low heat until figs are well cooked. Add Gelatin dissolved in 1 Tbsp of warm water and stir thoroughly to thicken, it will thicken as it cools. Pour while hot into clean glass jars. Seal immediately and refrigerate.

Slice baguette and toast slightly in single layer on baking sheet. Spread a layer of the softened goat cheese on each slice of bread and top with a dollop of the fig marmalade. Simply delicious!

Miguel Agustín Pro

(Feast Day November 23) January 13, 1891 - November 23, 1927

Miguel was born in Guadalupe, Mexico in 1891. From an early age, he was intensely spiritual and equally mischievous, frequently exasperating his family with his humor and practical jokes. As a child, he was daring and sometimes went too far, tossing himself into near-death accidents and illnesses.

Miguel was particularly close to his older sister, and after she entered a cloistered convent, he came to recognize his own vocation to the priesthood. Although he was popular with the ladies and had prospects of a lucrative career, Miguel renounced everything for Christ his King and entered the Jesuits in 1911.

In 1914, a tidal wave of anti-Catholicism crashed down upon Mexico, forcing him to flee to the United States. He was sent to Europe to finish his seminary formation and was ordained to the priesthood. When he returned to Mexico, his country was facing grave religious persecution. The churches were closed and priests went into hiding. Miguel spent the rest of his life ministering to peoples' spiritual needs and helping the poor, often dressed as a beggar or police officer in order to remain hidden.

Falsely accused in the bombing attempt on a former Mexican president, Fr. Pro became a wanted man. He was sentenced to death without the benefit of any legal process. On the day of his execution, Fr. Pro forgave his executioners, prayed, bravely refused the blindfold, and died proclaiming, "Viva Cristo Rey!" meaning, "Long live Christ the King!"

SERVANT OF GOD CONSTANCE HELEN GLADMAN

December 23, 1922 - November 30, 1964

Constance Gladman was born in a small rural town in southwestern Australia. At a young age, Connie (as she was called) felt a calling to religious life.

Connie attended a teaching college in Melbourne. She wanted to go into the convent but her dad would not let her. He felt that his oldest daughter needed to be exposed to the world before making such a decision. Heeding her dad's wishes, Connie taught in regular schools after graduation, but her desire to teach the poor and impoverished never left her.

When she was in her mid-20s, her father, seeing how his daughter had never lost her desire to become a nun, relented and gave her his blessing. Connie then joined the Congregation of the Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart. Connie took the religious name of Sister Mary Rosina, and, from that point on, she dedicated her life to the missions. She was sent to Papua New Guinea to teach. Sister Mary became highly respected and was elevated to the post of Teacher's Supervisor. The government held her in high regard and, needing qualified people to help train local teachers, she agreed to assist them. Training others to teach was something she came to truly love.

On November 30, 1964, while Sister Mary Rosina was working with a novice teacher, a man quietly moved up behind her and killed her. She was 41 years old. She has been declared a Servant of God, the first step in becoming a saint, and her cause is now before the Congregation for the Causes for Saints.

Create an Advent Wreath



Advent wreaths help us to "prepare the way of the Lord." Create an Advent wreath for your home or to give as a gift. There are a variety of ways to create an Advent wreath. Here are two ideas:

Option 1

- × 4 toilet paper tubes
- × Purple construction paper and/or marker
- × Pink construction paper and/or marker
- Green construction paper (or green marker or crayons)
- 1 piece of yellow paper (construction paper, Post-it notes, highlighted paper, etc.)
- × A round plate (a paper plate is fine)

Cut the green paper into a circle so that it fits on top of the plate. Trace handprints on the green paper to make leaves for on the wreath. Wrap 3 of the toilet paper tubes in purple construction paper or color them purple. Wrap the remaining toilet paper roll in pink. Place the tubes on the plate, spaced evenly around the perimeter. Secure them with tape. Make flames from the yellow paper and tape the flames on the candles as appropriate.

Option 2

- × 12" wire wreath frame
- Soft greenery garland (if you have a dollar store near you, check them out for this)
- Purple poinsettia flowers or other purple flowers
- × Advent candle set
- × 4 candle holders
- × white Christmas ribbon
- × greenery ties
- × glue gun

Wrap garland around your wire wreath until it is completely covered. Use hot glue to hold it in place. Next, take the white ribbon and wrap it around until you've found your desired placement. Secure it with a small dab of hot glue. Using a little bit of floral wire or greenery ties, space out the candle holders as evenly in place as possible and secure in place. Fill in empty areas of your wreath with purple poinsettia flowers and use a little bit of hot glue to hold them in place. Add the candles and you're done!



RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Veggie-Stuffed Holiday Crescent Wreath

Speaking of wreaths, enjoy this dish as a first course!

- × 6 slices bacon
- ×1/2 cup chive-and-onion cream cheese spread (from 8-oz container)
- × 2 cans (8 oz each) Pillsbury™ refrigerated crescent rolls
- × 2 cups frozen broccoli florets (from 14-oz bag), thawed, finely chopped and patted dry with paper towel
- × 1/3 cup diced red bell pepper
- × 1 egg, beaten
- × 1 tsp. sesame seed
- × fresh rosemary, if desired

Heat oven to 375 F. Cook bacon as desired until crisp. Drain on paper towel; crumble bacon and set aside. Unroll both cans of dough; separate into 16 triangles. On ungreased large cookie sheet, arrange triangles with shortest sides toward center (in the shape of a star),

overlapping in wreath shape and leaving 4-inch round circle open in center. Crescent dough points may overlap edge of cookie sheet. Press overlapping dough to flatten. Spread cream cheese spread on dough to within 1 inch of points. In small bowl, mix crumbled bacon, broccoli and bell pepper; spoon onto widest part of dough. Pull end points of triangles over broccoli mixture and tuck under dough to form ring (filling will be visible). Carefully brush dough with beaten egg; sprinkle with sesame seed. Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until deep golden brown. Cool 5 minutes. With broad spatula, carefully loosen wreath from cookie sheet; slide onto serving platter. Serve warm. Store in refrigerator.

The Preaching of John the Baptist

Lk 3:1-6

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was tetrarch of Galilee, and his brother Philip tetrarch of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias was tetrarch of Abilene, during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John the son of Zechariah in the desert. John went throughout the whole region of the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah: A voice of one crying out in the desert: "Prepare the way of the Lord,

"Prepare the way of the Lord,
make straight his paths.

Every valley shall be filled
and every mountain and hill shall be made low.

The winding roads shall be made straight,
and the rough ways made smooth,
and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

(Feast Day December 5) d. 304

St. Crispina was a wealthy Roman wife and mother of several children in Thagara, Africa. When she found herself in danger of losing her children, her possessions, and her life in the raging persecution, instead of being intimidated, she was filled with a holy joy, because of the Christian education which she had received from her most tender years. Being arrested in her native city of Thagara by order of the proconsul Anulinus, and brought before his tribunal, he inquired of her whether she was aware

of the imperial edicts which commanded that all persons should sacrifice to the gods of the empire. She said that she would not sacrifice to any other God other than the Lord Jesus who suffered for us. As a result, Crispina was tortured and publicly ridiculed. On December 5, she was beheaded. St Crispina was held in high veneration all through Africa and is honored by St. Augustine in various parts of his works, in which he speaks of her martyrdom.

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



St. Rene Goupil

(Feast Day October 19) May 15, 1608 - September 29, 1649

St. Rene was born in 1608 and entered the Jesuit novitiate in Paris, France, but his deafness prevented his joining the order. He then studied medicine, and in 1639, offered

to work as a medic for the Jesuit missionaries in America. He was a missionary to the Huron Indians, working as a layman without pay. After working in a hospital in Quebec for two years, he assisted St. Isaac Jogues on his missionary travels.

He was captured and severely tortured by the Iroquois, enemies of the Huron, for making the sign of the cross over a child's head. This gesture was mistaken for some type of curse. While they were in captivity, Fr. Isaac received

Rene into the Jesuits as a religious brother. He was the first of the order in the Canadian missions to suffer martyrdom. In his letters, Fr. Jogues, called him "an angel of innocence and a martyr of Jesus Christ." He was killed by a blow to the head, and as he died, he invoked the name of Jesus.

- × 1 lb. chicken thighs boneless, skinless

- × 2 Tbsp. lime juice

Combine chicken, cumin, oregano, lime juice, orange juice, garlic, and olive oil in a bowl. Marinate at least 1 hour or up to 4 hours. Grill or broil chicken over medium heat until no pink remains. Once cooked, remove chicken and rest 3 minutes. Chop into ½ inch cubes. Meanwhile, warm tortillas on a skillet. Top tortillas with chicken and toppings as desired. Serve with a side of rice. Enjoy!

Prayer to Our Lady of Guadalupe

THE STORY OF OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE

On December 9, 1531, in Mexico, Our Lady appeared to Juan Diego, a poor humble Aztec man who had recently converted to the Catholic faith. She asked him to go to the Bishop and tell him to build a church where she said, "I will show and offer all of my love, my compassion, my help and my protection to my people." Juan Diego did as she asked, but the Bishop asked for a sign that this message was really from Our Lady.

Mary granted his request. On December 12, she showed Juan where the most beautiful Castilian roses were and told him to gather them. It was a miracle that the roses were there and in bloom because there was frost on the ground, and the ground was an infertile place where only cactus and thistles grew. After he gathered them, Mary helped arrange them in his tilma, or poncho, and told him to show them to the Bishop.

When he brought them to the Bishop, the Bishop was amazed at the roses, but was even more amazed at what began to happen to Juan Diego's tilma. Right before their very eyes, the image of Our Lady began to form on the cloth. The picture of Mary was beautiful, and the Bishop fell to his knees. He had the church built at her request.

The tilma is still intact after 470 years. The colors have not faded, and the cloth has not deteriorated. It has been on display in the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe all this time.

The image of Our Lady that appeared on the tilma was very significant to the Aztec people. God had her dressed in a way that they would understand who she was. She was dressed in royal clothes; that showed that she was very important, perhaps a queen. She also had the symbol of the cross at her neck which was the same symbol the Spaniards had on their ships and in the churches they built. She had a sash tied around her waist which meant that she was with child, for this was the way the Aztec women dressed when they were pregnant. And on her beautiful dress were all sorts of designs and flowers. But there was one flower on her dress that was very significant. It had only four petals. To the Aztecs, the four-petal flower was the symbol for the true God, the God above all gods. This flower was located on her abdomen, right over the place where Jesus was growing inside of her. The Aztecs immediately understood that this was the mother of the true God!

This appearance of Our Lady of Guadalupe was very important to the history of our continent. The Aztecs and the Spaniards were on the brink of war. The Aztec culture and religion were very different from

the Spaniards'. They worshipped gods, to whom they would offer human sacrifices, often killing 50,000 people a year. The Spaniards, who were Catholic, were naturally disgusted by this. But they were cruel to the Aztecs too, treating them like animals and sometimes killing them for no reason. If a war had occurred, it would have been very brutal and the Spaniards and Christianity would have been totally wiped out.

Mary's appearance changed everything. It helped the Aztec people to embrace Christianity, and it helped the Spaniards to treat them with respect and as human beings. In seven years, six million Aztecs converted to the Catholic faith. This was the biggest conversion in the history of the Church! That is why Our Lady of Guadalupe is the Patroness of the Americas. Juan Diego, the humble man to whom she appeared, was canonized in the summer of 2002.

Share this prayer as a family from St. Pope John Paul II:

O Virgin of Guadalupe,
Mother of the Americas,
grant to our homes the grace of loving
and respecting life in its beginnings,
with the same love with which
you conceived in your womb
the life of the Son of God.

Blessed Virgin Mary,

Mother of Fair Love,

protect our families so that
they may always be united
and bless the upbringing of our children.

Our hope, look upon us with pity,
teach us to go continually to Jesus,
and if we fall
help us to rise again and return to Him
through the confession of our faults
and our sins in the Sacrament of penance,
which gives peace to the soul.

We beg you to grant us a great love of all the holy Sacraments, which are, as it were, the signs that your Son left us on earth.

Thus, Most Holy Mother, with the peace of God in our consciences, with our hearts free from evil and hatred, we will be able to bring to all others true joy and peace, which come to us from your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, who with the Father and the Holy Spirit, lives and reigns for ever and ever.

Amen.

The third Sunday of Advent is traditionally called Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete is the Latin word meaning "rejoice." Some people mark this Sunday on their Advent wreath with a pink candle instead of a purple candle. This Sunday is a joyful reminder that our salvation is near.

And how does this happen to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me? For at the moment the sound of your greeting reached my ears, the infant in my womb leaped for joy. Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled."

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



(Feast Day December 1) Fourth Century

Adrian and Natalia lived in Nicodemia (modern-day Turkey). She was a Christian, but Adrian was a non-Christian imperial officer. They were married for one year prior to their martyrdom and lived in Nicomedia during the time of Emperor Maximian in the early fourth century. The emperor promised a reward to informants who would bring Christians to trial. The denunciations then began, and twenty-three Christians were captured in a cave near Nicomedia.

They were tortured, urged to worship idols, and then brought before the Praetor, in order to record their names and responses. Adrian, the head of the praetorium, watched as these people suffered with such

courage for their faith. Seeing how firmly and fearlessly they confessed Christ, he asked: "What rewards do you expect from your God for your suffering?" The martyrs replied: "Such rewards as we are not able to describe, nor can your mind comprehend." Natalia's husband was so impressed by the witness of the Christian martyrs that he declared himself a Christian, although he had never been baptized.

The scribes reported this to the emperor, who summoned St. Adrian and tried to persuade him to sacrifice to the gods and ask for forgiveness. Adrian refused, and Maximian then ordered Adrian to be thrown into prison. His wife, Natalia, hastened to the prison and encouraged her husband. St. Adrian was cruelly tortured and killed. After Adrian's death, an army commander asked the emperor's approval to wed St. Natalia, who was both young and rich. But she hid herself away in Byzantium because she was fearful the Emperor would force her to marry. St. Adrian appeared to her in a dream and said that she would soon be at rest in the Lord. She died on the 1st of December, which is now her feast day. Although she died of natural causes, she is considered a martyr and was buried among other Christian martyrs in Argyropolis.

Make Your Own Ornaments



Create your own salt dough ornaments to hang on your Christmas tree or to give as gifts. You need only three ingredients: flour, salt, and water.

Mix together 2 cups all-purpose flour, 1 cup table salt, and 1 cup of warm water to make a dough. Roll the dough between two pieces of parchment or wax paper and then use cookie cutters to cut whatever shape you choose. Put them on a parchment-lined baking sheet and create a small hole somewhere on the ornament for a ribbon or ornament hook so you can hang it on the tree. Bake at 250 F for about 2 hours or until the ornaments are dry. Once cool, you can paint them if you wish. Consider lightly spraying them with a coat of polyurethane spray for the ornament to last for years to come.



RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Arugula and Pear Salad with Honey Dressing

Modern folklore suggests that the partridge in a pear tree in The Twelve Days of Christmas represents Jesus. Enjoy this light pear salad as we prepare for the first day of Christmas.

Dressing:

- × 1/4 cup honey
- × 1/4 cup balsamic vinegar
- × 1/2 cup extra virgin olive oil
- × 1 garlic clove, minced finely

Salad:

- × arugula lettuce
- × pears
- × goat or gorgonzola cheese
- × pomegranate seeds
- × candied walnuts or pecans

Whisk all dressing ingredients together. Combine salad ingredients and dressing. Keep extra dressing in fridge as it will keep for several weeks.

(Feast Day December 25) Second Century - Third Century

St. Anastasia, also known as Anastasia of Sirmium, is a Christian saint and martyr who suffered for Christ during the time of Diocletian's Christian persecutions. She is one of the seven women commemorated by name in the Canon of the Mass.

Legend holds that Anastasia's father was a noble pagan named Praetextatus and her mother was St. Fausta of Sirmium. Because her mother was a Christian, Anastasia was baptized as an infant and secretly raised with Christian values. Following the death of her mother, Anastasia's father gave her in marriage to the pagan Publius, but she preserved her virginity.

During the persecutions of Diocletian, Anastasia secretly visited the prisons and cared for the suffering captives. Anastasia's servant informed Publius, and he locked her up and beat her. Anastasia began secretly corresponding with her adviser, St. Chrysogonus, who had gone to Aquileia. He told her to be brave, be patient and accept the Lord's will. After the death of her husband, Anastasia distributed her property to those less fortunate and suffering.

She then set off to follow Chrysogonus to Aquileia. Chrysogonus was personally interrogated by Diocletian but he never renounced his faith. Chrysogonus was ordered to be beheaded and thrown into the sea. Afterward, Anastasia returned to Sirmium and also gave her life for the faith.

and looked for him among their relatives and acquaintances,


but not finding him,

And he said to them, "Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" But they did not understand what he said to them. He went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them; and his mother kept all these things in her heart. And Jesus advanced in wisdom and age and favor before God and man.

MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY



St. Reparata was born in the third century in Caesarea, a Roman Province of Palestine. She was baptized at a very young age and arrested and tortured for her faith at the age of eleven during the persecution of Decius. Her persecutors tried to burn her alive, but she was saved by a shower of rain and miraculously emerged unharmed. She was then forced to drink boiling tar. When she again refused to renounce her faith, she was decapitated. Her legend states that immediately upon dying a dove appeared to symbolize the departure of her spirit to heaven. Later elaborations of her legend state that her body was laid in a boat and blown by the breath of angels to the bay now known as the Baie des Anges in Nice.

She is the patron saint of Nice, France and a copatron saint of Florence (with St. Zenobius). The former Cathedral of Santa Reparata in Florence was dedicated to her. Sainte-Réparate Cathedral, in Nice, is also dedicated to her. The city of Florence holds a celebration in honor of St. Reparata each year on October 8 in commemoration of its deliverance from the Ostrogoths in 406, which they attribute to the intercession of St. Reparata.

The Samaritan Woman

Jn 4:5-42 or Jn 4:5-15, 19b-26, 39a, 40-42 [Short form printed here]

Jesus came to a town of Samaria called Sychar, near the plot of land that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there.

Jesus, tired from his journey, sat down there at the well. It was about noon.

A woman of Samaria came to draw water.

Jesus said to her,

"Give me a drink."

His disciples had gone into the town to buy food.

The Samaritan woman said to him,

"How can you, a Jew, ask me, a Samaritan woman, for a drink?"

—For Jews use nothing in common with Samaritans.—

The sisters of Lazarus sent word to Jesus, saying,
"Master, the one you love is ill."
When Jesus heard this he said,
"This illness is not to end in death,
but is for the glory of God,
that the Son of God may be glorified through it."
Now Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus.
So when he heard that he was ill,
he remained for two days in the place where he was.

Martha, the dead man's sister, said to him,

he has been dead for four days." Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?" So they took away the stone. And Jesus raised his eyes and said, "Father, I thank you for hearing me. I know that you always hear me; but because of the crowd here I have said this, that they may believe that you sent me." And when he had said this, He cried out in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, tied hand and foot with burial bands, and his face was wrapped in a cloth. So Jesus said to them, "Untie him and let him go."

Now many of the Jews who had come to Mary and seen what he had done began to believe in him.

PALM SUNDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION



Mk 14:1-15:47 or 15:1-39

As soon as morning came,

the chief priests with the elders and the scribes,

that is, the whole Sanhedrin held a council.

They bound Jesus, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate.

Pilate questioned him,

"Are you the king of the Jews?"

He said to him in reply, "You say so."

The chief priests accused him of many things.

Again Pilate questioned him,

"Have you no answer?

See how many things they accuse you of."

Jesus gave him no further answer, so that Pilate was amazed.

Now on the occasion of the feast he used to release to them one prisoner whom they requested.

A man called Barabbas was then in prison

along with the rebels who had committed murder in a rebellion.

The crowd came forward and began to ask him to do for them as he was accustomed.

Pilate answered,

"Do you want me to release to you the king of the Jews?"

For he knew that it was out of envy

that the chief priests had handed him over.

But the chief priests stirred up the crowd

to have him release Barabbas for them instead.

Pilate again said to them in reply,

"Then what do you want me to do

with the man you call the king of the Jews?"

They shouted again, "Crucify him."

Pilate said to them, "Why? What evil has he done?"

They only shouted the louder, "Crucify him."

So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd,

released Barabbas to them and, after he had Jesus scourged,

handed him over to be crucified.

The soldiers led him away inside the palace, that is, the praetorium, and assembled the whole cohort.

They clothed him in purple and,

weaving a crown of thorns, placed it on him.

They began to salute him with, "Hail, King of the Jews!"

and kept striking his head with a reed and spitting upon him.

They knelt before him in homage.

And when they had mocked him,

they stripped him of the purple cloak,

dressed him in his own clothes,

and led him out to crucify him.

They pressed into service a passer-by, Simon,

a Cyrenian, who was coming in from the country,

the father of Alexander and Rufus, to carry his cross.

They brought him to the place of Golgotha —which is translated Place of the Skull — They gave him wine drugged with myrrh, but he did not take it. Then they crucified him and divided his garments by casting lots for them to see what each should take. It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. The inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews." With him they crucified two revolutionaries, one on his right and one on his left. Those passing by reviled him, shaking their heads and saying, "Aha! You who would destroy the temple and rebuild it in three days, save yourself by coming down from the cross." Likewise the chief priests, with the scribes, mocked him among themselves and said, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. Let the Christ, the King of Israel, come down now from the cross that we may see and believe." Those who were crucified with him also kept abusing him.

At noon darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon.

And at three o'clock Jesus cried out in a loud voice, "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?"

which is translated,



"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"
Some of the bystanders who heard it said,
"Look, he is calling Elijah."
One of them ran, soaked a sponge with wine, put it on a reed and gave it to him to drink saying,
"Wait, let us see if Elijah comes to take him down."
Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last.

Here all kneel and pause for a short time.

The veil of the sanctuary was torn in two from top to bottom. When the centurion who stood facing him saw how he breathed his last he said,
"Truly this man was the Son of God!"



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
