

IO Things a Disciple of Jesus Does



Jesus wants you to be His disciple. What does that look like? What are the habits of discipleship? Here are a few noticeable ingredients in the life of a disciple:

A relationship rooted in prayer

Disciples have a real relationship with Jesus including genuine, two-way communication with Him. Our Lord speaks in Scripture, Church teaching and several other ways. We reach out to Him, sharing our thoughts and feelings, asking Him to fulfill our needs and the needs of others. Through daily prayer we learn to love Jesus more and more, living as His beloved disciples.

Joy for all to see

We all show joy in different ways. Sometimes joy is obvious; other times it underlies an appearance of peace, of happiness with or without many material pleasures. Disciples of Jesus know that the joy of heaven awaits those who persevere in faith; this foretaste of heavenly joy helps disciples rejoice amidst life's ups and downs.

Embrace the cross

●It might seem like an odd selling point for Jesus to say, "Be my disciple and you will suffer." But Jesus, who suffered and died for us, is very close to us in life's inevitable hardships. We can unite our suffering to His, experiencing His intimate presence while carrying our crosses. Disciples don't just accept a cross; with persevering faith, we embrace whatever sorrow God permits us to experience.

A listening ear

Unisciples of Jesus are attentive to each neighbor—in their neighborhood and beyond. We listen both to God and to those He places in our daily path. One of our deepest needs is be acknowledged-to be heard. Like Jesus, who always listens to those He encounters, we focus on those who reach out to us, listening attentively and authentically.

Will you let me be your servant?

Our calling from God—our vocation—always involves serving others. Disciples of Jesus engage in works of mercy, living virtuously in service of our fellow women and men. Service doesn't have to be showy; oftentimes it is a little act of love that benefits our neighbor by our small sacrifice and God's boundless grace.

Encountering Jesus in the Sacraments

Jesus promises to be with us until the end of time as we know it. A key way that disciples of Jesus spend time with Him is in the sacraments of His body, the Church. Experiencing His mercy in the Sacrament of Penance, encountering Him in the most holy Eucharist-these and other sacramental experiences help draw us ever more deeply in to communion with Jesus.

BHonoring His Mother Mary, the mother of Jesus, is also His first disciple. Moms tend to be aware of their child's friends, often caring deeply for them; Mary is just such a mother, praying constantly for all of her Son's disciples. From the cross, Jesus says to us, "Behold your mother." Mary's words that encouraged the first miracle of Jesus, at Cana, echo through the ages: "Do whatever He tells you."


Be bold—for the glory of God!
