VATICAN CITY—Pope John's recent action setting up a Secretariate for Christian Unity was described by an official of the Holy Office as the "Manga Carta" in the field of Catholic-Protestant relations.

Pather Marco Giraudo, O.P., deputy to the Commissioner Genral of the Sacred Congregation of the Holy Office, stated that this "marks the first time that the Church has officially entered into contact with the leaders of the separated brethren."



#### Universal Church

There is one remarkable feature of Catholicism that is so evident it is usually overlooked.

The Catholic Church in Italy is Italian; in Spain it is mish; in Ireland it is Irish; in the United States it is erican. And that it the way it should be.

When God became man, He became man all the way, Jesus Christ, the Divine Son, the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, equal with the Father, became a man of His times. He was a Jew, known as the carpenter's son. In speech and dreas He was a Nazarene, so indistinguishable from His fellow townsmen that they retused to believe He could be anything more than they were.

As Christ was a man of His times, the Church in every age and civilization, where She was able to influence men at all, has been of the times. She became identified with the Roman empire. That disappeared and She became an integral part of feudalism. Then She became so mitigately one with the monarchies of Europe that men who knew not what She was decided that the Catholic Church would never survive in the modern world.

And yet in our time it has been the ancient Catholic Church that inspired the Catholic statesmen in Germany, France, Italy and Belgium who took the lead away from the anti-clerics in forming a new Europe.

It is the Church of Cardinal Richelieu which today recog-nizes that clergymen have no place in modern governments and forbids them any part in politics, while a Protestant bishop can run for the presidency in Finland and a prom-inent Baptist minister can be a candidate for Mayor of Philadelphia.

It is the Catholic Church in Austria which publicly de-clared that there would be "no return to the state church conception which degraded religion to a sort of ideological superstructure for patrictism and good citizenship." while in Protestant England the Anglican Church opposes every suggestion that the Church of England be separated from the state.

For those who know the Catholic Church intimately there is nothing surprising about her ability to get along with all governments and people. "The Church from the (Continued on page 5)

be acquainted with the relevant facts of each situation or issue. Nobody is going to be totally right all the time in an effort of this scope.



The august Assistant Secretary for External Affairs, Frederick Boland, came to me and said many kind things to restore my youthful equanimity.

Most recently, in early 1058, I met Mr. Boland in indianapolis when he visited with us for the evening after giving a lecture before the Indianapolis Council on World Affairs. The audience for his lecture was lamentably small on that occasion but I feel sure it will be much larger the next time.

One thing which he said during that lecture is, alas, too regretably vaid still. It was, "The greatest danger in the world today is the breakfour of traditional diplomacy between the U.S. and the Soviet Union. Diplomacy has given way on both sides, ", Unless an effective brake can be put on the arms race, we may well be doomed."

Mr. Boland's academic background and his professional diplomatic experience fit him admirably to be both a leading citizen of his country and a leading citizen of the world. He graduated from Dublin University, a 16th century foundation whose degrees are recognized in full at Oxford and Cambridge. He followed this with studies, under x Rockefeller Foundation scholarship, at Harvard, Chicago and North Carolina. Besides his service as Assistant Secretary of the Irish Department of External Affairs, hie has been head of the Irish Section in the former League of Nations, Chairman of the Irish Committee on War Relief, Principal Secretary of the Irish Department of External Affairs, Irish Ambassador in London, and head of the Irish Permacun Delegation to the United Nations, He is a Knight Commander of the Papal Order of St, Gregory, and a Grand Cross of the Order of the No-hers Star (Sweden).

His present eminent position, and the distinction which he brings to it will reflect much credit on his compatriots everywhere. It may even cut in on the facile acceptance, by thoughtless headline-readers, of a Brendan Behan as the modern Representative Irishman.

Q. Can we offer to God the sufferings, hardships, and great labors of others even though they show no outward belief in God or appear to be unaware of the part they could take in Christ's work of re-demption?

For those who know Her, the Catholic Church is the prolongation, the fulfillment of the lucamation; the Church is Christ Who must be made flesh in all ages and dwell among all people as one of them.

This is the fairest answer we know to the objection that American Catholics are not sincerely and unreservedly devoted to the democracy of these United States. With all sincerity we American Catholics can still make our own the words of the great Cardinal Gibbons and say that we live in our land with undisturbed belief in the perfect harmony existing between our religion and duties as American citizens: that we prefer its form of government before any other; that we admire its institutions and its laws; that we accept the Constitution without reserve, with no desire, as Catholics, to see it changed in any feature.

And this we say not out of expediency but out of a com-

And this we say not out of expediency but out of a compelling necessity of our belief. We would cease to be Catholic in the measure that we would refuse to be American, for it is our religious conviction that we must make Christ as native to this nation and this century as He was to the village of Nazareth 2000 years ago.

#### Move the U.N.?

One of Mr. Khrushchev's many proposals last week was that the headquarters of the United Nations should be taken out of New York and set up somewhere else. He may — or may not! — have got the idea from The Tablet, a conservative Catholic newspaper published in Brooklyn, N. Y. It had just about then revived an old suggestion that "a more distant location, like Geneva, would be preferable."

Geneva could be acceptable—once more. Centuries of Swiss experience and skill in preserving neutral attitudes could be at the service of all; Swiss hotel-keepers attend strictly to their professional function; and there would be no wharfing complications.

Besides Geneva, where? The idea of a small, supra-Besides Geneva, where? The idea of a small, supra-national area, having no economic or military significance, open to all the world and its representatives as a center of civilized thought, has already been realized in the Vatican State. Perhaps a World State might similarly be conceived as the headquarters of the United Nations. But perhaps the Italian Government might object to choosing Italy as the host country, on the grounds that it already has quite enough trouble.

What about Ireland, then? On the outer edge of Eur ope, it is a convenient world center for air, sea and cable communications. A small island, security safeguards are more easily organized there. On the other hand, there might be depressives who would regard an invasion by the United Nations with its staffs, its permanent and impermanent delegations, as a fulfillment of one of the "Prophecies of St. Malachy," that Ireland is to be engulfed some time shortly before the end of the world.

It is all very difficult. Perhaps, if only people were more rational, the United Nations might do well enough where it is, right there in New York. If only hotel-keepers, newsmen and other free citizens of the U.S. could be kept from having too much sway in supra-national affairs, if only Khrushchew were more intent on making real peace than on "making the fur fly," if only Castro made less with the fuss and the teathers, if only Great Britain was not so old and so impermeably reasonable and the United States so young and so indefatigably right all the time, if only . . .

"Mr. Khrushehev's visit did not frighten me. It was the advice of so many people who call then-selves patriotic, who know so well how to handle the problems of the world, who believe so little in democracy. These are the ones that frighten me." Naurice Davis Indianapolis Hebrew






