

Fate of the UN

We do not propose to review the criticism of the United Nations' position in the Congo. We do not propose to analyze the motives of the special interests which have sought to trustrate the actions of the United Nations in the Congo. We do not propose to comment on the cynical opportunism of Nehru in taking Goa by force.

We would simply observe that the whole thing is ter-rifyingly similar to what happened to the old League of Nations when Mussolini went into Ethiopia, when he decided —correctly—that he could defy the nations of the world without immediate consequences.

We would also observe that "the chips are down." and the integrity and usefulness of the United Nations Organiza-tion is called into question.

The position is further aggravated because so many new and independent nations have emerged in the world and have been admitted to the United Nations. Their votes there can upset the plans of the "major" powers of the world. For this as well as other reasons, there is now much talk of putting an end to the United Nations Organization.

Great Britain has indicated a possibility of withdrawing support from the United Nations over the Katanga issue. France has already walked out of United Nations debates several times over Algeria. There is increasing discussion of the wisdom, and even the good faith, of our own country in its support of the general doctrine of democracy and try in its support of the general of self-determination for all nations.

The Russians have tried to destroy the United Nations because it is not sufficiently amenable to communist policy. The extreme "rightist" elements in every country (magnerading under the respected label of "conservatism") want to destroy it because, as they allege, it is communist-deminated in the communist communist the communist communist communist communist communist communist communist communist communist communications.

The United Nations Organization has many imperfections, all of them a real expression of the imperfections of its members. Its decisions are very often a hodge-podge of special pleadings. But, in spite of everything, it represents a fundamental ideal and a crying need of all manking; that the nations of the world should discuss their differences—angrily, as may be—and arrive at working solutions which, at least, do not lead to war.

One thing is certain. If the United Nations is fatally undermined and any hope of its ultimate effectiveness is destroyed, we shall all have taken a major and perhaps irrevocable step toward another world war; and this for the second time in forty years.

Is this what we want?

The name of Stalin has been erased from Soviet history, "Old Guard" communists, like Molotov, have been hounded into obscurity. Albania, politically recidivist (or whatever the communist jargon is), has been excommunicated, even at the cost of losing submarine base facilities in the Eastern Mediterranean.

These and other events are not the result of impulsiveness. They are deliberate gestures to "prove" that Russian political and social economy is deviating from the old Stalinist line of "guns instead of butter" for the Russian people, as a preparation for the day when they intended to offer the whole world a choice between a Communist peace or a capitalist quietus!

And now, to cap it all, Mr. Khrushchev has announced that the comrades may criticize openly what he says or does. "I can makes mistakes, too!" he is reported to have said. This introduces a note of political humanity unprecedented in the history of Russian communism. It is scarcely possible to imagine what more he can do to show he intends to be as democratic as the next man.

Clearly, Mr. Khrushchev wants to show a more peace-ful attitude to us all. This attitude should be welcomed by all thoughtful citizens, not in the spirit of one grasping at straws but in the spirit of magnanimity which should inform the relationships of civilized men.

But, with the very best will in the world, on his part as well as anyone else's, there is a grievous obstacle before the realization of Mr. Khrushchev's good intentions. It is a matter of long-conditioned reflexes which, in the most rational human beings, tend to be stronger than reason.

The Russian government for forty years has worked hard and consistently to prove its word is not to be relied on in any particular; whether given after long or short discussions, solemnly or not-so-solemnly, orally or in writing. It has even produced a system of semantics which permits "Culture" to be described as a "weapon of diplomacy," and the pursuit of "peace" to be described as an "offensive." It has set out to prove that everything, even kindliness and good will, may be used to further Communist objectives.

The reverse process may not take another forty years. We sincerely hope not. But it will be hard work, human nature being what it is. If Mr. Khrushchev is sheere in putting his hand to the ploughshare instead of the sword, we must certainly wish him well and hope he will not turn

And, if we live long enough without needing fall-out shelters, we might come to restore to the Russian people the good name they have destroyed.

Until our recent revisions of the liturgical cal-dar, Epiphany was a feast of higher rank than ristmas. Now that seems reversed, since Christ-as has an octave of increased importance and the

Back in the Middle Alex least days were very numerous. Generally each hishop was able to establish feasts for his own diocess; so there was lack of uniformity. In some areas there were more than a hundred holy days of obligation: no service work, no court sessions, nor circus games or theaters allowed; and everyone must attend Mass. In some places the octaves of Easter and Pentecost—the whole week after each feast—were kept as holidays.

Then late in the Seventeenth Century reductions began: encouraged by more uniform laws in the Church, and sometimes precipitated by revolutions. At the end of the Eighteenth Century the French Perletic; and when it was restored in Jobo France had only four holy days, and All Saints.







Teachers urged to update their notions of history

WASHINGTON—History teachers must bring their definition of history in line with the realities of the mid-20th century, the American Cathohe Historical Association was told here.

sociation was told here.

Robert F. Byrnes, retiring president of the asociation, and chairman of the history department at Indiana University, said teachers can no longer cancentrate on the history of the western world but must cover non-western areas, too.

"We have been and still are educating our young men and women to live in 1910 or 1930, instead of 1989, or perhaps even in 1984," he said.

Noting "the conservatism and even the resistance," of those who believe schools should teach only American, English and a little continental European his-tory, he declared:

"All of us interested in history and in education must usure that our definition of history is one which fits well the second half of the 20th century."

BYRNES spoke on the "new responsibilities" of U.S. higher chication at the presidential luncheon during the America Catholic Historical Association's Annual annual meeting. The Catholic group met simultaneously with the convention of the American Historical Association.

Byrnes accused history teachers of being "neglectful" of the history of science and technology,

"We can certainly not pretend to be effective teachers and scholars so long as we produce illiterate youngsters so far as science and technology are con-cerned," he said.

He called on U.S. higher edu-cation to breach the "sheepskin curtain" separating it from high school education. He called for improved training for future high school teachers and for increased professional contacts between college and high school teachers.

college and high school teachers, BYRNES URGED greater co-operation among U.S. colleges and universities. He said schools should "work logether in revising and expanding our curricula, in allocating scarce resources, in arranging overseas programs for both students and faculty, and in benefiting from each other's ideas."

He cited the growing influence of the Federal government on higher education, exerted through its grants for research, and warned against the possible loss of the schools' traditional inde-nordence.

He called on schools to "band together to defend their freedom and integrity," saying, "We must ally with, not merge with, the government."

THE INDIANA University his-orian deplored the general fail-ne of U.S. education to make use of modern technology to tolve some of its problems.

"While we putter around in our contented way," he commented, we have failed to notice that most Americans are now learning their history, not in colleges and universities, not even in high schools, but from rival authorities, or would-he authorities, the radio, television, and the press.


