The Pope said his main hopes for the results of the cannel, to be known as the Second Ecumenical Council, are "that the Church, Spouse of Christ, may strengthen still more her divine energies and extend her beneficial influence in still greater measure to the minds of men."

"In this way there is further reason to hope that all ecople—especially those whom we so sorrowfully see suf-ering because of misfortime, discords and mourful con-hicts—turning their eyes more trustfully toward Christ usy finally achieve true peace in respect for mutual rights and duties."

POPE JOHN announced the date for the council on

February 2, the feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin—three years and eight days after he first revealed his intention to summon all the Catholic bishops of the world for a 21st ecumenical council.

world for a 21st ocumenical council.

He made the date known in a "motu proprio," a document drawn up and issued on his own initiative and personally signed by him. The document is not an actual summons to the council. That was issued in the bull of convocation which the Pope published on Christmas Day of 1961. In the bull Pope John specified that titular bishops, who do not have a strict right under Canon Law to attend councils, are invited to the Second Vatican Council. The Pope has not stated in either document what topics are to be discussed at the council.

The motu proprio recalls that Pope John issued a statement last Christmas Day announcing that the council would take place in 1952, and states that the date for the opening is being announced now so that the participants can plan their schedules accordingly.

The Pope again appealed for prayers for the success of the council. "We can do no less," he said, "than exhort once more all Our sons, together with all the clergy and the Christian people who await it with great anticipation.

THE TIME LAG between Pope John's initial appro-THE TIME LAG between Pope John's initial announce-ment of the council—oil January 25, 1899—and the date for the opening is well under the five years which elapsed for the last council—the Vatican Council of 1898-70. Pope Pius IX first revealed his intention to convoke a council on December 6, 1894. It did not open until December 8, 1869.

That council lasted 316 days. It was adjourned suddenly on October 20, 1870, after Rome had been taken by Piedmontese troops, thus ending the Papal States.

Pope John in June of 1960 set up a dozen preparatory commissions and three secretariats to lay the groundwork or the present Vatican Council, and he has personally attended their meetings to spur on their work.

Longest of the ecumenical councils was the 19th, the Council of Trent. It dragged on from 1545 to 1563, during the reigns of three popes. In contrast, none of the first four councils lasted as long as four months. One of them, the fourth, at Chalcedon, lasted only three weeks. Shortly after becoming Pope in 569. St. Gregory the Great referred to the first four councils—Nicea in 325, Constantinople in

IN SETTING October 11 for the opening of the council, the Pontiff put major stress on the ancient doctrine that Mary is Mother of God rather than on more modern Marian definitions, which are viewed by some Christians as a stumbling block to unity.

"We have especially chosen this date," the Pope said,
"because it links us with the memory of the great Council
or Ephesus, which was of extreme importance in the
history of the Church."

Actually, the Council of Ephesus—held in the early Christian center which had been visited by St. Paul, and whose rulis are located about 30 miles southeast of the western Turkish city of Izmir—opened on June 22, 431, and concluded that September 1.

Three other ecumenical councils—Chalcedon in 451. Constantinople in 899 and Vienna in 1311—opened within a week before or after October 11.

Top jurisdiction held by Ecumenical Council

The 21st such meeting will be the Second Vatican Council, whose opening date has been an nounced by His Holiness Pope John XXIII for October 11, 1962.

THE MEETINGS of an ecu-menical council are presided over by the pope or his legate and deal with matters of faith, morals, wor-ship and Church discipline. Its decrees, if approved by the pope, are infallible and binding on all Catholies.

Father Hesburgh

Time magazine has a familiar face on its cover this week. For the few who might not recognize him, three short lines of type proclaim: "Notre Dame's President Hesburgh."

The article inside is a flattering tribute to Father Hes-burgh's strenuous and successful efforts to place Notre Dame among the prestige universities of the United States.

We are happy for Father Hesburgh. This recognition will soften the sting of critics who have accused him of harming Catholic education by daring to air publicly the failure of Catholic colleges and universities to produce their share of scholars and scientists.

The exuberant president of Notre Dame is putting into practice, at last, advice that appeared in Orestes A. Brownson's "Review" a hundred years ago. Father William J. Barry, an early critic of Catholic education, wrote in the January, 1881, issue of the "Review": "Let us have one model school, one model female academy, one model college, and we shall soon have twenty. Excellence multiplies and diffuses itself."

That advice was premature in 1861. Ours is perhaps the first generation of Catholics that could profit by it. Why this is so is graphically sketched by the Jewish soci-ologist, Will Herberg, in this week's issue of the Protestant journal, "Christianity and Crisis." Dr. Herberg writes of the changing American picture:

the changing American picture:

"There was a time when Protestants met Catholics nowhere in the important areas of community life; not in the civic organizations, not in the service clubs, not in the medical societies, not in the bar associations—nowhere. There were, of course, many Catholics around, but they were marginal to the society—the laborer, the servent girl, the hewer of wood and drawer of water. It was good to have them around, but they did not amount to much. Now, within little more than one generation, American Catholics have moved up from the margin of society to its very center. They are no longer a marginal, foreign, lower-class group but a nuclear, middle-class, American group."

Time, margine concedes that "if money drive and

Time magazine concedes that "iff money, drive and ambition can create great universities, Catholics will sooner or later have them," but points out that it remains to be seen "whether the peculiarly American heritage of Catholic anti-intellectualism will so hobble scholarship that greatness is out of reach."

Perhaps Dr. Herberg has put his finger on the cause of American Catholic anti-intellectualism. In that case, we can look forward to many imitators of Father Hesburgh of Notre Dame.

Another question about conservatism

A. There seems to be growing disagreement etween Catholics on the subject of conservatism vs. liberalism; or at least they are using more bitterness in their arguments these days.



I answered a question similar to this just a few weeks ago, and I hope my repetition does not become monotonous. I do not know the reason for this increased agitation and bitterness, but I suspect it is a number of things combined.

We have a Catholic President who wears a lacquered liberal label, and has shown signs of pushing new frontiers a few inches forward.

2. The general wave of conservatism which has spread from office and factory to campus and farm has influenced a number of Catholics, arousing their latent, ingrained attitudes. And this, in turn, has produced an equal and opposite reaction in those of more liberal convictions.

3. Some Catholies — far too many, it would seem — have been grievously infected by the virus of extremism, which has become epidemic in some areas. The threat of this fanatic fringe naturally stirs up forceful reaction in those who see its dan-gerous, subversive irrationality.

4. Pope John XXIII issued an encyclical which some pompous righitist treated with contempt, thereby stirring up doubts and questions in the minds of many Catholics who have possibly never read the original — or have read it with predictions and the contempt of the property of the pr

I am personally quite resigned to the fact that conservative and liberal Catholies are going to have to live together for a long time in the same Mystical Body. They are never going to agree; maybe it is not desirable that they should agree entirely. But it is imperative that they learn to live together in the spirit of Christ: In tolerance and charity — and certainly in truth and justice.

Naturally I wish that all my fellow Catholics could see things as clearly and correctly as I do. Don't you? It would be a happy situation if they could all be right, instead of merely on the right —

One thing which will help us is the avoidance of mechanical, sharply categorized, push-button minds. Too many of us have found the easy solution to all the world's intricate problems in simple formulas. And we have put all political and social thought into categories, which are linked to each other in series. The mention of United Nations. Supreme Court or Social Security sets up a chain reaction which carries through emotion-tinged eatergories, until it comes out either John Birch or Comsymp — depending on the book-up.

We must do some honest sane thinking instead of sticking labels on vague ideas, which are mostly made up of prejudices. Labels and slogans will not solve the complicated problems of our divided, bomb-threatened world.

And if we Catholies are going to think correctly we must have proper respect for the teaching authority of the Church of Christ. I will leave it to include the following the measure in which the Holy Spirit lends his protection of infallibility to the teaching authority, and the following the follow

And if theologians may not dispute the encycle cal teachings of the Pope, surely you or I — or so two-bit journalist — should not presume to do so.

Don't you worry about the old Church getting too liberal; centuries of conservatism have permeated very fiber of her. But also the Church has centuries of experience in adapting herself to the social and political demands of a changing world, Sometimes her adaptation has been slow and difficult, but she has never stood still, like a block of granite, defying man's progress to affect her.

If you find yourself more conservative than some of your fellow Catholics, O.K. You have a right to your own ideas. But you should not interfere with their rights either, breaking up their study clubs and the like!

But if you find yourself more conservative than the Church, then you had better wake up, examine your conscience, and find out what is happening in the Twentieth Century. As I said in my previous article, no Catholic who had carefully studied Rerum Nowarum 70 years ago should be surprised at any-thing he finds in Mater et Magistra. And his preparation for the social doctrines of John XXIII would be complete if he had digested Quadragesima Anno 30 years ago, and had kept up with the teaching of Pius XII in more recent years. Of course you are too conservative for the Church if your newest idea is 70 years old.

Would vernacular change the Chant?

By MICHAEL BOWLES

A decision to use the languages of different countries instead of the now universal Latin would have its effect on the official music of the Church, among other things. Closely integrated with the Latin language, the chant melodies have been un-changed in form and substance for

Any changes have been those Any changes have been those minor ones natural to music which survive as part of a living tradition. Indeed, this traditional aspect brings out the point that the melodies are not attributable to any one composer or any group of composers. Their composer is "The Church" because they owe their continued existence to the folk-memories, the titual and aesthetic insights, the scholarly labor many successive generations, all refined in experience of daily use in the Mass and the Di Office.

As they stand at present, the Church's officially As they stand at present, the Church's officiary recognized molotiles are the musical counterpart of vestments, altar furnishings, ceremonial movements and gestures, set prayers, all of which have been stylized, in the passage of time, and made part of the different forms of official worship. Extensive alterations in the chant melodies might very well be at radical as alterations in, aay, the basic style and cut of Mass vestments.

Any vocal music, rightly conceived, is conditioned by the language of the verbal text. This idea is not so obvious when we think singly of translations of songs or operas from one language to another: it makes some but very little musical difference whether the songs of Hugo Wolf are sung in English or German.

makes some but very fittle masket discussions whether the songs of Hugo Wolf are sung in English or German.

The idea becomes obvious if we imagine all the vocal music of the world being composed for several centuries to Italian texts exclusively. Such music would have a different character than if the language was, say, English exclusively. The official melodies of the Church have been evolved on a basic of the Laint text, and a change of language cannot leave the melodies exactly as before.

A change to the vernacular would not mean so much in countries whose languages are closely related to Latin. In Italian, Spanish, French, the syllable stresses are—more or less—the same as in Latin. There is no doubt that the influence of language could not fail to make itself felt on the Church's liturgical melodies sooner or later, and accepted alterations would be the result of past factour recognitions rather than ante factour decisions. Carried on for long enough, there would inevitably be a difference in style at least between the Nordic and the Latin group of languages.

Weald the division be good or bad in its effect on the Church as a whole? Would the effect of a division, of a certain loss of unity in melodic style make up for the suzgested disadvantage of holding on to Latin exclusively throughout the Universal Church? These are questions which you and I are not qualified to determine, certainly not now. But it is well to think about them.

Leaving music aside, there is the matter of the use of the vernacular in the set prayers, the selections from the Old and New Testaments which make up the text of the Mass. Any vernacular text used in the Mass would have to carry afficial approval. In this respect, it is interesting to observe differences of opinion already appearing about new versions of the Gospels being brought out in England and in this country. Apart from the disputes of scholars, there is the element of increasing differences in the usage and implications of English or Kondon, the Church had to adopt an English that officially, which influence would it follow, English or American? Would this make for some sort of unnecessary divisivences?

Q. Are children under the age of 21 years, or adults over 59, allowed meat only once a day on days of fast? I know they must abstain on days of complete or partial abstinence.

A. Children under 21 and adults over 59 may have meat as often as they wish on fast days. They are not obliged to fast. 

Lutheran leader hits bitterness over school aid

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J.—A na-omal Lutheran leader has ap-momhers of his tional Lutheran leader has ap-pealed to fellow members of his faith not to let debate over Fed-eral aid to parochial schools arouse religious bitterness.

The not of caution came from the Rev. Robert E. Van Deuseu, Washington representative of the National Lutheran Council which held its annual meeting here.

The council is the cooperative agency of six Lutheran church bodies whose members make up about two-thirds of the eight million U.S. Lutherans.

The Rev. Mr. Van Deusen pre-dicted that public discussion of Federal aid to parochial schols will continue. Noting that the council opposed such proposals in the last Congress, he warned against religious bitterness.

"Christian brotherhood, if it is to be genuine, does not depend on uniformity in viewpoint on public issues," he commented.
