High Court told to bar public school prayers

can public schools are whol-ly secular institutions from which efforts "to inculcate into the children a love for God" must be banned, the U.S. Supreme Court was told

Attorney William J. Butler of New York made this claim in a challenge to the constitutionality of prayer recitation in the public schools of New York State.

Butler appeared before the court (April 3) on behalf of five parents of nine children in the parents of nine children in the Whyle Park, N.Y., public schools, the maintained that rectation of a prayer in their schools violates the provisions of the Federal Constitution which han an establishment of religion and guarantee religious freedom.

But attorneys for the local school board and for 16 intervenor parents of 41 public school chil-dren told the high court that ex-cluding prayer from the schools would contradict an American tradition that extends back to the earliest days of the nation.

They said that to bar prayer from schools would be inconsistent with the practices as the recitation of prayer in Congress and in the Supreme Court itself, whose sessions open with the invocation: "God save the United States and this honorable court."

ATTORNEY Bertram B. Daiker of Port Washington, N.Y., represented the school board before the high court, while Porter R. Chandler of New York represented the untervenor parents.

Following the oral arguments, the court took the case under advisement. A written opinion is expected before the court's current term ends in June.

The 22-word prayer, whose recitation is non-compulsory, reads: "Almighty God, we acknowledge our dependence upon Thee and we beg Thy blessings upon us, our parents, our teachers and our country."

The challenge to the prayer has aroused unusual interest. One sign of this has been the filing of free separate amieus curiae (friend of the court) briefs.

BRIEFS IN support of the prayer have been submitted by the attorneys general of 19 states and the New York Beard of Regents. Briefs against the prevalence been filed by the American Jewish Committee and the Brata Brith Anti-Defamation League; the Synagogue Council of America: the National Community Relations Advisory Council; and the American Ethical Union.

Recitation of the prayer in the New York public schools was first recommended in 1951 by the State Board of Regents. It was left to local school boards whether they would implement the recommendation.

In July, 1958, the Board of Education of the Union Free School District, New Hyde Park, voted to have the prayer recited in its (Continued on page 9)

Word From The Archbishop

TO THE CLERGY, RELIGIOUS AND LAITY OF THE ARCHDIOCESE OF INDIANAPOLIS Greetings:

The sincere and thoughtful Catholic cannot but have a tremendous respect and appreciation for the Priesthood, for he recognizes in the priest the role of "ponifies," the one who bridges for him the chasm between the earth and heaven.

"Scarcely is he born." wrote Pope Plus XI. of blessed memory. "when the priest, baptizing him, brings him a new birth to a more noble and precious life, a supernatural life, and makes him a son of God and of the Church of Jesus Christ. To strengthen him to fight bravely m spiritual combats, a priest invested with special dignity makes him a solder of Jesus Christ by holy chrism. Then, as soon as he is able to recognize and value the Bread of Angels, the priest gives it to him, the living and life-giving food come down from heaven."

"Thus the priest accompanies the Christian throughout the pilgrimage of this life to the gates of heaven. He accompanies the body to its resting place in the grave with rites and prayers of immortal hope. And even beyond the threshold of eternity, he follows the soul to aid it with Christian suffrages, if it need further purification and alleviation. From the creadle to the grave the priest is ever beside the faithful, a guide, a solace, a minister of salvation and dispenser of grace and blessing." Thus Pope Pius XI describes the ministry of the priest.

It is with this thought that we open our Easter message to you, and it is most fitting that: we should do so. For not only does the Resurrection which we celebrate on Easter give us God's own pledge and assurance of the redemptive fruits of Christ's passion and death dispensed through the ministry of His priests, but the institution of the priesthood itself was one of the momentous events crowded into the acts of Christ during the days of His Passion and Resurrection.

Sometimes we wonder if a sense of overwhelment did not seize the Apostles as there dawned upon them the full import of the words "Do this in commemoration of me" uttered by Christ at the Last Supper. Jesus had just declared that what He held in His hands was no longer bread and wine, but His own body and blood for their food and drink. Father Coogan....

To the Editor:

I am sorry my defense of voluntary unionism has so irritated Fr. Rice; the life of a champion of compul-sory unionism must be a burden at best. Fr. Rice says compulsory unionism saves the unions from dissolution and turnoil.

Is it not an indictment of unionism to charge that a union cannot live and prosper in free America unless it forces workers into its control? Can't unionism sell itself to the enlightened American workman on its merits? Does not the workman know what is best for him? Is it not the hated old paternalism to say that "the union bosses know what is best" for him?

Fr. Rice would give the impression that the American hierarchy had gone in for compulsory unionism. Not one bishop in ten has given public approval to the proposition even in its most tenuous form.

The Obio bishops to whom he refers mildly said that the RTW law proposed for Obio "might do more harm than good." On the other hand, Arethishop Noll reported that upon polling some 20 fellow bishops at a Washington convention he found the majority of them in favor of RTW.

I am reminded by Fr. Rice that various members of my own Jesuit Order favor compulsory unionism. Among our thousands of American members that is no doubt true. But from my own experience I know there are many indeed who wonder why labor unions alone among non-governmental agencies must be permitted to dragoon their membership.

One Jesuit editor recently asked how it has hap pened that whereas a generation ago there were map so-called "labor priests," today there are almost none. Is it not the reason that most of them have come to be embarrassed at such partisan identification, seeing that unions are today both powerful and notably irre-sponsible?

Many priests are becoming aware of what Cardinal Mooney wanted us to remember, that "all too many of us are laboring under a serious confusion when we talk about Catholicism and unionism.

The trouble is that we in the United States are talk-g about a different kind of union than the Popes had mind when they laid down the rules."

The only labor unions ever positively approved by Rome are religiously based unions. Such unions may well not be practicable in-our country, but if does not follow that we priests should make ourselves champions of unions of which as splendid an apostle as Fr. James Gillis, C.S.P. was forced to say. "Labor leaders have become quite as tyramical as the capitalists of years ago, and the people at large bave come to condone the sins and crimes of Labor. ... Stranger still, ..., professional Labor, which has quite generally come to violate justice and right, does so in the name of philanthropy, humanity and religion."

It is enough that one favor the right of workmen to determine union membership for themselves. They have their own lives to live, their own souls to save. THE UNION SHOP is the common arrangement in mills and factories. Without it, companies could develop non-union enclaves which would be a constant threat to the union; even when this did not happen, there would be friction and turmoil from the constant union campaigns to round up stragglers. Slow downs and scuffles would be inevitable, to the burt of all involved. So it is, that even management prefers a union shop—if they have to have a union let it be stable.

By this time Pastor Lackmann and his companions had become known by the name Die Samulung (the Gathering). Under this tifle they have become one of the most talked-about religious unity movements in Europe.

IN JULY, 1959. Pastor Lack-mann was deposed from his post as a pastor and teacher of relig-ion by his superiors in the Evan-gelical Church because of his "too positive views" concerning the Catholic Church.

In reply he wrote a long book of 600 pages, "Credo Ecclesiam Catholicism" ("I Believe in the Catholic Church"). In this work he stated;

can the original aim of the
Reformation be achieved, to ise

"An Evangelical ecclesiastical community within the Catholic Church, with its own catechism, its own litturg, its own forms of piety, its own priesthood as befits our history and as it has the right to exist within the boson of one Catholic and Apostolic Church."

Elaborating here on the purposes of the league, Pastor Lackmann said it "does not exist to bring about or to encourage individual conversions to the Catholic Church, but it certainly does not discourage it. 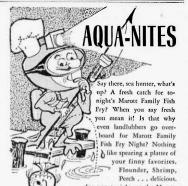

The 'Pieta'

Many voices have been raised in anxiety about the decision to send the Michelangelo "Pieta" from St. Peter's in Rome for exhibition at the 1964 World's Fair in New York. Anyone who has ever seen the statuary and remembers the deep surge of emotion it invariably arouses will share in the anxiety.

The "Picta" is one of the supreme jewels of our civilization, a work of art that is unique, inimitable and unsurpassable. It is a perfection; in the harmonious relationship between concept and achievement, between form and content; in the technical skill whereby the qualities of hard stone are mastered to express the subtleties of the deepest tragedy in the history of mankind, when the heart of the Mother of God was finally broken.

No matter how carefully the "Pieta" is handled, the bare thought of its transhipment is terrifying, but the decision of the Holy Father to accede to Cardinal Spellman's request is completely right. The finest achievements of man are not to be admired and treasured for their own sakes. They are to be treasured for the help and inspiration they bring to man as he travels toward his eternal destiny.

The exhibition of the "Pieta" at the World's Fair will be—to quote a Vatican source—"a duel between the past and the future, the humanities and love versus pure science." It will remind us that, with all our "progress" in the last five centuries, the human qualities of mind and heart have not been notably improved, nor the fine skill of human hands; they have been merely directed into other, new channels, and not always for our betterment.

It will remind us, too, that suffering and even disaster are no more than a means to our real success, which is our conformation with the will of God; that death is but the prelude to resurrection and eternal happiness. It will remind us that whether we walk upon this earth or explore the magnetic oceans of the universe, our personal destiny and our means of achieving it are still unchanged.

Millions of people will see the "Pieta" at the World's Millions of people will see the "Pieta" at the Worlds' Fair who would not otherwise have an opportunity of seeing it. We are sure that many will receive from it a more accurate perspective on materialism in relation to humanity. We are sure that everyone will appreciate the privilege so courageously extended by the Holy Father to this country and to the world.

Conservation

The freedom of public debate as a means of clarifying and deciding public issues is the most important characteristic of our democratic society. Every intelligent citizen having useful information or opinions on a public issue has not only the right but the civic duty to speak his mind.

Traditionally, and quite rightly, people tend to alig themselves roughly on one of two sides in debating a public issue; the conservative side, so called because it lends to emphasize the importance of what is known already; the liberal side, so called because it tends to emphasize the importance of new and as yet unexplored possibilities.

Both groups are essential, the one to the other. The conservative side can err by a too rigid adherence to "tradition." The liberal side can err through too little regard for tradition. It is only by a resolution of the two forces that our society attains that delicate balance between stability and mobility which makes for healthy progress.

In recent times, this essential balance is being damaged by extremist groups of self-styled "conservatives." Although the leaders of these extremist groups have discredited themselves with every thinking man by their reckless disregard for the truth and their irresponsible charges of bad faith against those who disagree with them, they have made an impression on our political life by the simple force of their hysteria. After all, any madman can prevail temporarily over a sane man by that excess of violence which comes with insanity.

The wildly extremist groups do damage by confusing the public mind about what is truly conservative in political life and what is not. The Dr. Billy Hargis pamphlet, "The National Council of Churches Alds and Abets Communism," is no contribution to conservative thought or action, no more than the National Review editorial which characterized Mater et Magistra as a "triviality."

The ultra-ultra-conservatives who bombed the Protestant pastors, homes in Los Anglees last February no more defend the country from subversiveness than Dr. Free Schwartz, who, with excellent financial results, preaches alarm and despondency; "America will concede victory to Communism by 1973."

The confusion is compounded by leaders of truly con-strative opinion who act "with prudent circumspection" and do not disavow these groups as quickly or as openly as they might, thereby allowing by inference that there is some merit in what the groups say and do.

Many people see that the brunt of the extremist attack is borne by the "liberal" side, generally accepted in politics as represented by the Democratic Party, but those who fish for votes in this situation are fishing in very muddy waters indeed.

Unless clear and unequivocal things are said very soon to clarify conser attive politics in relation to the hysterical proceedings of the extremists, the value of conservatism as a force in our political life might be very seriously compromised.

We commend these thoughts to the leaders of the Republican Party, knowing that they, no less than the leaders of the Democratic Party, have the country's best interests at heart.

we should like to see conservatism as severely assailed as liberalism by the self-appointed super-patriots. Then we could be sure the equilibrium of our political life was being restored, that the destructive forces of extremism were being pushed out where they belong, into a political vacuum where they can go on bombinating without harm to anyone but themselves.

Social study

Next month, it will be a year since the Holy Father nublished his great encyclical, "Christianity and Social 'rogress' (Mater et Magistra). It is by now a good question to ask what Catholics have done to study the document and evaluate its implications.

and evaluate its implications.

That there is an obligation to study the encyclical is made very clear by the Holy Father. In paragraph 222, he affirms "that the social teaching by the Catholic Church cannot be separated from her traditional teaching regarding man's life." In paragraph 223, he urges "that attention given to such studies in Catholic schools on all levels . . . that social study of this sort be included among the religious materials used to instruct and inspire the lay apostolate, either in parishes or associations . . . that the

laity have much to contribute by their work and effort . . . not merely by learning it themselves and governing their actions accordingly, but also by taking special care that others also come to know its relevance."

others also come to know its relevance."

It is good to know that measures are being taken to have the encyclical studied by groups in all the high schools of the archdiocese during the 1828-38 school year. We hope that discussions of the salient points of this great document may be set up even among seventh and eighth grade chidren, too. There is an excellently designed special report, with "Teacher's Study-Guide" section, by Rev. John F. Cronin, S.S., in this week's Young Catholic Messenger which shows this to be a practical possibility also.

But what of the grown-ups who, after all, are more im-ediately concerned? Are there plans to study the ency-ical in the parishes, at confraternity meetings, at discus-

sion group meetings and so on, as the Holy Father has recommended so specifically? We shall certainly hope so.

Group meetings under the guidance of a qualified moderator would seem to be more or less essential. We cannot all be completely equipped to read the document as its great quality requires. Interpretations of its close-grained, carefully-phrased thinking might so easily be over-simplified by superficial readings.

But, however we do it, whether by individual or group efforts, we must not fail to heed the pressing request of the Holy Father that we study this social teaching of the Church and apply what we learn to our daily lives. With the world's affairs as they are, we cannot afford to ignore the wise guidance so clearly put before us. To do so would indeed be a piece of childish irresponsibility, a certain invitation to critical and maybe totally disastrous errors in the development of our society.

The law also permits you to take your evening lunch at midday, if you profer, and have your recular meal in the evening. But it is quite evident that it permits no other food during the day. However, it makes no mention of drink: so by implication you may have anything you want or drink during the day—as often as you want—without breaking your fast.

But what is food? And what is drink? Interpretations of the law which are ancient, reliable and cairly uniform, tell us that food is something which is primarily nourishing, whether it be solid or liquid. Drink is something which quenches your thirst, and is used primarily for that purpose, even though it may have some nourishing calories in it.

Local custom plays a part in determining the distinction between food and drink. Coffee, tea, lemonade, wine and beer are accepted as drinks everywhere, and do not break your Lenten fast. In many countries which have stricter customs milk and fruit judices would be considered food; but in the United States they are classed as drinks, and are entirely acceptable during Lent. But they represent the border-line.

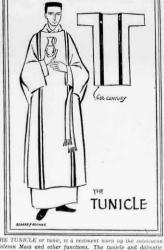

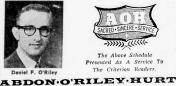

In any event, many observers will agree with the Committee for Economic Development that, regardless of when and how it is acquired, economic literacy is a necessity in a democracy where "all of us, to a large extent, must be our own economists."

Economic literacy is subject, however, to a variety of definitions. Does it mean a detailed knowledge of economic thereis and slatistical data or does it mean, simply, a gentleman's acconcepts and a general awareness of major economic trends. Given the unhurried complexity of economics—the so called "dismat" science—there is reason to believe that we shall have to selte, by and large, for the latter definition.

Speaking in the huge white basilica of Sacre Coeur on Montmartre in Paris recently, Jean Danielout, the internationally famous Jesuit theologian declared that Protestant-Catolic theological differences were much less serious at the time of the Reformation than they seemed just a few years ago.

"They have been exaggerated by polemics on both sides," Pather Danielou declared, "but many of our differences are not so serious as they may seem at first glance."

Commenting on the fact that Protestant dependence on Sacred Scripture is often opposed to Catholic recourse to tradition, Pather Danielon reminded his listeners that "Protestants recognize the importance of tradition, and Catholics try to remain faithful to Scripture."

Finally, Father Danielou insisted that the Protestant doctrine of salvation by faith alone is not necessarily in opposition to the Catholic insistence on salvation through good works, since Protestants also attach great importance to good works and Catholics likewise accept faith as the principle of salvation.

However, a group of parents of school children, backed by the children, backed by the filed suit in an effort to block the prayer. The parents' group includes two members of the Jewish faith, one Unitarian, one member of the Society for Elhical Culture, and one non-believer. Lower courts ruled in favor of

Lower courst ruled in favor of the prayer and were upheld last July by a 5-2 decision of the New York Court of Appeals. The par-ents then carried their case to the Supreme Court, which agreed last December 4 to consider their anneal.

BUTLER, in his arguments, contended that the prayer constitutes "teaching of religion in a public institution" and as such is unconstitutional,

The justices questioned him closely about what forms of religious observance would be permissible in the public schools.

Associate Justice Potter Stewart noted that the disputed prayer comes at the start of the school day immediately after the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag, which contains the words "one nation under God."

Butler said he does not think recitation of the Pledge of Alle-giance in public schools is ren-dered unconstitutional by this phrase.

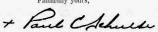

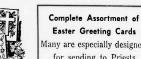
