'SHOCKS' COUNCIL FATHERS

What is behind leftist press attack on Pope?

VATICAN CITY-The first session of the Second Vati-can Council is drawing rapidly to its close on December 8 and the final days will be given over to the crucial problem of the Church and its organization.

Observers question whether any real progress will be made on this particular draft, or schema, before the council recoverens next September. For some reason, this document was not distributed to the conneil Fathers until a week before it was to be discussed. There has, therefore, been no time to give it sections study.

This schema is in many ways a key doctrinal project facing the entire council, for it involves a study of the relationships among the Pope, the Roman administration, and bishops,

It is at this point, commenta-tors say, that the Council Fathers are called upon to carry on the unfinished work of the First Vati-can Council which defined the powers of the Pope without being able to define the powers of bish-ops as successors of the Apostles.

A VISITOR to Rome had a chance, meanwhile, during a relatively calm interfule—while the noncontroversial schema on mass communications was dehated—to study what the Italian press is saying about the ceumenical council.

Reactions are, of course, condi-tioned by the political orientation

For example, the Communist press has gleefully exploited the failure of Cardinal Alfredo Otta-viani, president of the Council's Theological Commission, to get his schema on the sources of revelation accepted, using this

"Ottaviani Humiliated!" was ene of the more moderate head-lines in a recent issue of Paese Sera. The Communists thus demonstrate their readings to use any stick, including the council, with which to beat their adversary.

Conveyed to the council through Cardinal Amleto Cicognani, Vati-can Secretary of State, the an-nouncement said the commission will be composed of several car-dinals and members of the coun-cil's Theological Commission and of the Vatican Secretarial for Promoting Christian Unity.

emphasis on the general principles of Catholic dictrine already treated by the Council of
Trent and the First Vatican

IN REGARD TO the proposals on communications media, the council press bulletin reported that all the Fathers without ex-ception expressed a Javorable opinion and sometimes great praise of the project in general, which is considered good, useful, timely and rich in pastoral sub-stance."

The press builtin said that "marginal observations" sug-pested that better emphasis could be put on the right of the Church to concern itself with all instruments of social communication because of their influence on man and society.

It noted that the "pagan concept of life which is so wide-spread in our times . . . has its origin in great parl in entertain-ment. Hence the need for the clergy and Catholic latly to insti-tute schools for the Christian formation of directors and actors."

Catholic interracial leaders hail law to bar Federal housing bias

Catholic reaction to President Kennedy's order barring discrim-ination in Federally aided hous-ing mingled praise for the order with cautions that it does not solve the problem of segregated housing.

They also stressed that Catholies have a duty to work for integrated housing, both by educational programs underlining the immorality of segregation and by practical action aimed at creating integrated neighborhoods.

THESE REACTIONS followed the President's announcement that he bad signed the long-awaited executive order barring discrimination in housing built or purchased with Federal as-sistance.

Single-family and apartment housing with mortgages insured by the Federal Housing Adminis-tration or guaranteed by the Vet-erans Administration.

Low-rent public housing sub-sidized by the Federal govern-ment

Housing in urban renewal projects subsidized by Federal money.

 Housing built with Federal loans, including homes for the aged, college dormitories and community facilities. Indications were that the order does not apply to individual sales by home-owners nor to existing



U.S. Catholic papers being 'short-changed' on council coverage?

What's forbidden is forbidden. That's all there is to it. And if something is declared secret, then it's secret. Period.

So, when what happens in a council is supposed to be "sub secreto" or secret matter, bishops and theologians of the Anglo-Saxon tradition keep all they know under their

Is it really a sin

to cheat in class?

By MSGR. J. D. CONWAY Q. Recently am Junior religion class we were discussing the morality of cheating and copying in school work and examinations. Is cheating in school tests sinful? If not, would certain conditions make it sinful?

A. Why do we call it cheating. As an intrative verb, to cheat means to practice Iraud.

Iraud means decent or trickery deliberately practiced in order to
gain some advantage unfairly, dishonestly, or bot the prejudice,

It is often rather hard to pin down. But the very fact that we use such a nasty word for it shows that we hold !! definitely wrong, and a bi-shows that we hold !! definitely wrong, and a bi-shameful. In what way is it wrong? Merely be-cause it isn't socially acceptable? No there is something, definitely wrong with it marally.

First of all, it is contrary to truth—the equivalent lying. We seek to convince our teacher that we First of all, it is contrary to truth—the equivalent of Ising. We seek to convince our teacher that we know answers we do not know, that we have studied a lesson we have not studied, that writing is original when it is actually copied, that thoughts are our own when we have stolen them from someone

So it violates the virtue of veracity, and is thus sin.

In the measure that you deceive yourself, neg-lect your work, give yourself credit for knowledge you do not have, develop in yourself a streak of dishonesty, make yourself untrustworthy, you are guilty of sins against charity; against the love of God and the love of yourself.

Got and the love of yourself.

Hard as it may be to pin it down, there is usually a measure of injustice in this cheating. It is unjust to steal a man's ideas. It is unjust for you to get to steal a man's ideas. It is unjust for you to get the same grade for copying that someone clee gets by hard work. It is unjust to the other students in the class for your cheating to set a high curve which will lower their grades by comparison. It may be unjust to your teacher who gives precious time to help you to learn. It may be unjust to your parents, who pay the expenses of the education you should be aething, but are only faking. And it may be more seriously unjust, later on, to someone who may pay you wages for skill and training you only pretend to have, or to elients whe rely on you for professional knowledge you never acquired.

I am not prepared to say how serious these ains as he in a particular case. But I am sure they e ains because they the direct opposite of virtues.

Q. Many years ago a Catholic girl (in good faith) married a diverced man. He was a Lutheran and his first wife was never battleted. Communion. She has brought one soul closer to God . . , and in the end, what about her? A. I will not argue about the good faith of this Catholic girl. Let us merely say that if she was in good faith she was badly confused. But let us forget the past. What is to be done about the problem

Hence, it happens that some of the Fathers of the Coun-cil talk rather freely about what is said in the council and what goes on behind the scenes, for the benefit and satis-faction of the journalists who write for both the Catholic and secular press of Europe.

Some of the more enterprising correspondents of U.S. papers and magazines are profiting by what they read in the European press and thus are giving the readers of Time magazine and other leading secular publications some insight into what goes on in Rome.

But not our Catholic news service. Our NCWC news eau here in Rome is taking no chances. It sends you e more than what is issued in the official communiques he council's news office.

These releases are so brief that they give no indication of what is really being discussed by the Fathers of the council and never any idea of what is behind the discussions. On several occasions they have been misleading.

In reporting, for example, one day's discussion of the use of the vernacular in the liturgy, in which an overwhelming number of bishops spoke for the use of more vernacular, the official communique announced that some of the Fathers spoke for more use of the vernacular in the Mass and

some spoke against it. And then the release reported four reasons given against the use of the vernacular and only one in favor of it.

Our NC news service, as it is called, is in a difficult silion, especially since the head of it in Rome is also rying as the director of the English language division of e official press office of the council.

I have instructed the editors of The Criterion in Indian-apolis to rely less on the NC service and more on Religious News Service, which is reporting for America some of the information contained in the European press.

To give you an idea of how much more the Europeans can read about the council, here is a translation of part of an article that appeared in the French secular daily. Le Monde, just before the council began the discussion of the doctrinal schema on the fonts of revelation.

The headlines: "On The Eve Of The First Great Battle Vatican Council II/The Adoption By The Council Of The sts Doctrinal Schema Would Be a Severe Blow To Rela-ns With The Churches Of The Reform."

"ROME, November 12—The Second Vatican Council is on the eve of engaging in its first great battle. The occa-sion is offered by the first doctrinal schema on the sources of revelation.

This little activity of placing cards labeling a store a seller of Communist slave labor imports consists of "the players carefully and methodically placing their cards throughout an entire store, between cannot goods, under tiems, inside flashlights and plastic squeeze bottles, in boxes of lard, in shirt pockets, in hoxes of stationery, behind boxes of soap, cereals, etc."

A well-executed eard party, says the memo-randum, will result in such a state of chaos in a store "as to bring pride and pleasure to the heart of any conservative."

Q. What are the special indulgences received at

A. The faithful who take part in the exercises of a retreat in common with others are granted a plenary indulgence under the usual conditions.

Do you remember what those usual conditions are?

Confession, within the eight days preceding the close of the retreat. (If you go regularly to con-fession at least twice a month, or if you are a daily communicant, no special confession is necessary.)

Communion, either during the retreat, or witheight days after the retreat is over.

3. Visit to a church.

4. Prayer for the intentions of the Supreme Pon-tiff. One Our Father, Hail Mary, and Glory be to the Father is sufficient for this requirement, but you may choose some other prayer, if you wish.

Very often the retreat master is authorized to give the Apostolic Blessing at the end of the retreat, with another plenary indulgence, under the same conditions.

"Until the beginning of the council, John XXIII had been rather evasive.

"'Are you a theologian?' he asked a well-known non-Catholic visitor a short time ago.

" 'No."

"Well, Deo gratias! I am not either, although I must perfetent that I am. You see yourself how much misfortune professional theologians inflict on the Church by their sub-lleties, by their self-love, by their narrowness and stub-bornness."

"Without a doubt we should not take this remark too literally. Better than anyone, John XXIII knows that we can not escape theology in a religion that believes in the value of reason and which a good theology alone can deliver from the damage of a bad one. But this demonstrates the style of a pontificate that before all else places the accent on spirituality and the needs of the ministry.

"So, here is the council, by the express desire of the Pope, facing a specifically doctrinal text. What does it deal with precisely? It's a schema marked by a school of theology which is rather narrow, superficial and retrograde. It revolves around two capital problems.

"The first concerns the relation between Tradition and Scripture. This document considers them as two distinct sources of Revelation. This distinction highlights in a manner judged blundering and inopportune an old quarrel between Catholicism and Protestantism at the very time when the works of the best theologians of both sides are in the process of rendering the conflict less acute.

"After all, why must we speak today of two sources when the Council of Trent, to our knowledge not suspect of progressivism, affirmed that the Gospel (My note: meaning the revelation of Jesus Christ made manifest in His words and deeds and life as God made man) was the unique source of Revelation, transmitted by two means, Scripture and Tradition.

"A subtle distinction? Certainly not for the initiated who know the importance of what is at stake in its ecumenical implications. (My note again: ecumenical is used here in the sense of that which promotes church unity.)

"If the council were to accept the schema in its actual form, it would deliver a severe blow to the inter-faith relations that have been so difficult to begin. It would seem, in fact, to affirm that Tradition has added to the Gospel, which is denied by certain Catholic theologians, and which is one of the fundamental reproaches made by the Protestants.

"The second point is even more important. The schema nullifies implicitly, and this by omission, all the Scriptural advances that have been made in the Roman Catholic Church during the past thirty years. And this is an effort that has been followed with the greatest interest and admiration by the churches that have sprung from the Reformation.

"The Holy Office, the Sacred Congregation of Studies and Seminaries and the Lateran University for some time have been waging a battle of extreme violence against the Pontifical Biblical Institute which is in the hands of the Jesuits, who for the most part are German, French and Anglo-Saxon. Cardinal Bea was its director until 1949.

"Prepared without the assistance of any scholar from the Biblical Commission, the schema pays no heed to their work. If the council would approve the schema, it would cancel dozens of years of progress in the study of the New Testament and would lose for the council all the prestige it has gained in the eyes of the Protestant observers who have been disturbed by what they have read in the docu-

"Fortunately it does not seem possible that the bish-ops will let this be done. We are going to see right from the first interventions a severe artillery shelling. Argu-ments are not lacking to reject this unfortunate schema.

"'L'aggiornamento' (the bringing up to date) of the Church proposed by the Pope as the primary purpose of the council is incompatible with the tone of the schema. Fair from opening any wider the doors that were beginning to be ajar, it would close them again. Housing law

Laws can't change people's hearts. Laws can't make people quit thinking unkindly about others. The Presiden-tial order barring discrimination in Federally-aided hous-ing will not by any means end segregation in housing.

But it is a start. It does give support and encouragement to those who want to act fairly in this matter. It does put the prestige and moral influence of the Federal government on the side of integrated housing.

It is hard to see how much progress in this matter could be achieved without some positive governmental action. One could hardly expect a private developer to declare his sub-division non-segregated and risk the eco-nomic loss that would almost certainly follow.

But if all FHA and VA financed housing (about one fourth of 1961 housing starts) is necessarily non-segregated, people will doubtless accept the fact and learn to live with it.

with it.

Integration is a funny thing, in that a lot is easier to accept than a little. None of the whites want to be the only ones integrated. There's a little insecurity and a lot of pride involved here. But if most neighborhoods are integrated, everyone could accept it more gracefully.


This is a compelling argument against "gradualism"—the snail-like, undetectable progress in interractal justice advocated by some whites. Gradualism is not only too slow for Negroes who perceive that they only live one relatively short life—it is also, in matters like housing, the exact contrary of what is needed.

One other comment is called for: How can anyone argue against the idea that the federal government ought to practice justice in the distribution of common benefits to its citizens? When taxes are collected from everybody—regardless of color, it is manifestly unfair to let these names be used in benefits that are discriminatingly withheld from a portion of the citizenry.

We congratulate President Kennedy in signing this order and believe it is a significant step towards eradicating a real social evil in America.



FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT, One translation puts the refrain of today's entrance and offertory hymms this way: "Upon you I have seet my heart; in you, my God, I put my trust," And indeed this is the refrain of both Advent and Christmas: time. We have confidence in, we have set our hearts on, the God who loves so much that Ife has come and will

come again.

And the "coming" to which so many of the texts of our services of public worship refer these days may mean either His Incarnation -coming in history-or his coming to bring creation to fulfilment at the end of time. It is really only one coming, anyway, which persists even now in the Church-and in the Christian life as we attempt

to gather all things up in Christ Jesus.

The coming of the Word of God, a Word so much for man that it comes as Man, a Word so much of God that it is God, a person of the Holy Trinity. 


