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
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## Lack of organization is crippling our American bishops at council

The bishops of the United States are very much aware of the criticism aimed against them for not offering greater leadership in the council. As representatives of the most powerful and influential nation in the world, they know they are on the spot, and they are extremely uncomfortable about it.

In many ways the U.S. bishops are unprepared for what the council demands of them. They are not theorizers; they are doers. Few are theologians. Most of them with degrees are specialists in Church law. Practical men they are, for the most part.

are, for the most part.

They are pastoral bishops—the very type that Vatican Council II is trying to produce more of. They would proudly and willingly show their fellow bishops from other nations around their dioceses to demonstrate for them practical examples of pastoral institutions and organizations, but they are not prepared to theorize about them.

are not prepared to theorize about them.

The truth of the matter is that the bishops of the United States have not yet been forced to re-examine and criticize their institutions and organizations as have the bishops of Europe, South America and the mission territories, where the Church has suffered serious losses or failed to make progress. The Church has continued to grow and become an ever greater influence in the United States, and it has been all that the bishops could do to keep up with it.

Our bishops, however, have not been idle in this second session of the council. A number of them have spoken and

There are many reasons for this failure to organize: the vastness of our country, the large number of bishops, the division of the nation into states. And not to be ignored, the American spirit of independence. For years now the U.S. bishops have preferred to deal directly with Rome rather than through a national organization that might regulate individual bishops. The National Catholic Welfare Conference has never had any authority over individual bishops.

Perhaps the greatest obstacle to the organization of the U.S. bishops is the conviction of many of them that to form blocks is a political maneuver totally out of place in anything so sacred as an ecumenical council. This, in spite of the fact that the bishops were encouraged at the opening of the council to form national groups to expedite the work of the council.

It is a great pity that the U.S. bishops, of all national groups, have failed in organization. The principal task of this council is to develop new forms of government within the Church. No group is better fitted for this than the U.S. bishops.

Every age leaves its mark upon the Church. It is easy—and now frequently embarrassing—to see what effects the Roman Empire, feudalism and monarchy have had upon it. So far the modern democratic form of government and living have failed to make an impression.

If the Church is to be brought up-to-date, then somehow it must embrace the values and customs of modern democracy. Not that the Church is to become democratic in the way authority is determined and exercised—though the early Church did practice demonstrates on the day of the control of the c

It is not correct to speak of the Church as democratic or monarchial. The Church is not like any other institution on earth. It is not a political institution. Therefore, it can be neither an empire nor a monarchy.

If it takes on the aspects and appearances of an empire or a monarchy or of feudalism, it does so for the same reason that Christ was Jewish in his thinking and living. God became man in Christ Jesus. This we call the Incar-

Even a few weeks ago, one might have reasonably assumed that the weighty tomes compiled by theologians through the centuries, basing themselves on Serupture, the Fathers and other approved sources, tomes, digested into lands summaries for generations of seminarians, loft surresolved at most a few details of this basic question.

basic question.

The current solemn discussions of the council Fatters, as transmitted through the press to the entire world in official daily communiques and expanded in the briefings and conferences of the world's top theologians (men present at the council meetings) show that such is far from being so. While more precision might always have been desirable, it is only tolay that the evolution of mankind has made essential the determination of many points which in recent centuries have been considered academic or secondary.

The council is consequently seeking to clarify the relations, within the body of the visible Church on earth, between the pope, the hierarchy and the gen-eral membership.

It is trying to determine what are the limits of the Church on earth; how and to what extent our separated Eastern brothers (frequently labeled schizamites) are members of the Church; how and to what extent members of the hodies deriving from the 16th-entity separation in the West (Andlean, Protestant, heretical, however they are called) belong to the Church by virtue of an incorporation "in some manner" into the Mystical Body of Christ by hantism.

In all of this, I have avoided the word define, for it would seem that Vatiean II will be less a defin-ing council than a peace-making now. While the con-cepts are not logically contradictory or mutually ex-clusive, the defining spirit is more proper to the victor proclaiming terms of capitalation.

The mood of the Church in council today is any

The mood of the Church in council today is any-thing but that of a conqueror demanding total sur-render. Rather is if ready, as Pope Paul said in his opening address, fo accept blame if blame seems due, to forgive offense if offense was given, to start afresh in low. Canossa, it proclaims, is not the only road to Rome.

nation—God taking flesh and dwelling amongst us. The Church is Christ's prolonged dwelling amongst men. The Church is incarnational in the sense that God becomes man in Christ living amongst men of overy generation and nation.

There is no reason why the Church cannot take to itself modern democracy as it took to itself the Roman Empire and the feudalistic and monarchial way of living. The Pope and bishops must know the people of God who make up the Church, must know their wants and needs, must know also their ideas and suggestions, for the Holy Spirit is at work in all the people of God. The modern systems of government have devised various means of granting representation to the people. And modern education has prepared people for more responsibility who will not longer be satisfied with a system of Church government designed for a feudal or monarchial age. It is this contribution to human understanding that should leave its mark upon the Church.

Here is where the U.S. bishops could be expected to make their principal contribution to the council. They better than others should know that representative government cannot be organized from the top down, but must spring from the grass roots and that without organization there can be no successful representation.

In civil society the people do not make their wants felt as isolated individuals but as units agreeing to support the stand arrived at by majority vote. This is what the bishops of France, Germany, Holland, Africa and many South American countries are doing in the council. When a bishop announces that he speaks for the bishops of Germany, Austria and Scandinavia, everyone listens with more attention—even though he knows that surely not all the bishops named could agree to everything said.

The U.S. bishops, as I have said, have not done this, to the great puriferment of the bishops of other nations, who expected that the bishops of the most successful modern representative nation would take the lead.

It is absolutely essential for the success of the council that the bishops of the world learn now how to work together and come to agreements. For the decentralization of the Church they all desire will be but a temporary affair unless the national and territorial conterences of bishops organize with authority to oblige the individual bishops to abide by rules and practices agreed upon by majority vote. If every bishop were to make his own regulations regarding fasting, vernacular in the Mass, mixed marriage, etc., there would be chaos. And little by little, one by one, the bishops would plead with Rome to take over and straighten out the mess.

So it is to be hoped that the bishops of the world do organize themselves for proper local self-government and above all for proper representation at the Roman Curia. It is also to be hoped that this will help the bishops realize the need of some organization within the diocese and even the parish for a proper representation of the laymen in the Church.

Dr. Fred C. Schwarz is coming to town Monday to save from Communism again. He and his road show will in Indianapolis just in time to compete with the goblins making Halloween interesting.

Schwarz is the slickest of the far-rightlists who have fatted themselves on the deep concern among Americans about Communism. It is no mean trick for an Australian citizen to spend 10 prosperous years in this country teach-ing Americans how to be Americans.

The insulting implication is, of course, that American churches, schools, parents, communications media, and governmental agencies are not equal to this task; it takes an Australian super-patriot.

Schwarz has been adept in keeping his so-called Christian Anti-Communist Crusade from being directly tied in with other segments of the radical right.

But he still acts as though he had just swallowed a chicken bone if you ask him what he thinks about the John Birch Society. Now, you would think a great anti-Com-munist educator would have some opinion about the Birch-

ers, wouldn't you.

Neither Schwarz nor his associate schoolmasters are bashful, though, about denouncing groups and individuals slightly more progressive than Millard Fillmore.

Some of the standby speakers, in fact, get uninhibitedly abusive about things American. Schwarz himself prefers a perch a trifle lower than the angels. He is tiresomely skilled at using a lot of words and a bit of religion to say Communism is a bod thing.

He also is skilled at peddling his book and a variety of other literature, tape recordings, and carnival souvenirs at his costly school, as well as at raising substantial "donations."

Schwarz has a knack for scaring ribbon clerks and old ladies fresh from a \$20 blue rinse at the beauty parlor. He does this by bailing his lectures with offnad "inside" information — such as that Khrushchev will be ruling the world within a decade from San Francisco's Mark Hopkins Hotel.

America's government and private institu-tions and tells its clitzens how dumb they are its that he offers no solutions. 

"Most hopeful of all," Christian lay leaders are acquiring influence within political parties and labor movements.

"We see then that the reforms jointly promoted by the 20 partner nations of the Allianee for Progress receive of a sudden vigorous and unexpected support from the Church of Latin America, until now dismissed as conservative and status quo," Msgr. Gremillion said.

WASHINGTON — One hundred and thirty-seven U.S. diocesan priests from 40 dioceses are cur-rently serving in foreign missions, according to a new survey.

The survey shows that 23 Canadian dioceses have 81 priests serving overseas.



"The liturgy can never be restored to its full value and life... if it is to go on living in surroundings that do not help but hinder it."

"We must efface from our minds the eternal picture of a hasilica and the Romanesque, Gothic, or Renaissance fashion and their general pattern without paying attention to the liturgy."

He cited as an example of sur-roundings that hinder the liturgy a "Gothie cathedral where the celebrant is hardly visible far away from the congregation, and the liturgy goes on as it were at the bottom of an ocean of colored glass."
