## Liturgy draft approval heads council action

VATICAN CITY—The Pathers of the ecumenical council in a momentous week completely approved a charter of sweeping litturgical reform and saw Pope Paul VI announce enlargement of the council commissions.

Meantime they witnessed the Pathers of the English-speaking world present a solid front in avor of the document seeking to righten the thes that bind all Chris-ians together.

The finalization of the whole The finalization of the whole lurgy schema provides for major reforms designed to lead the people to full participation inwardly and ontwardly in the Mass and other services of the Church. The schema was passed Nivember 22-only hours before the council Fathers were plunged into grief by the slaying in Dallas of President Kennedy.

ST. MEINRAD, Ind.—"Involvement in Civil Rights" will be the theme of a one-day seminar for seminarians at St. Meinrad Col-

lege here December 3, featuring speakers and discussion leaders from a tri-state area.

The event, sponsored by the college's division of history and so-cial seiences, is being coordinated by the student arts committee, Faculty director is Father Camil-his Ellspermann, O.S.B., assistant professor of sociology.

The day before the approval of the worship document, the Fa-thers received word that Pope Paul had arranged for colarge-ment of the existing council com-nissions from the normal 23 to 30 members. The council Fathers were to choose the majority-crial election on November 28. The Pope was then to appoint one new member apiece to each commis-sion. The commissions themselves were to elect vice-presidents to succeed those appointed by the in-dividual presidents 14 months ago.

It is a family of heroes,"

## Cardinal officiates at President's rites

WASHINGTON—Requiem Mass for John Fitzgerald Kennedy, 35th President of the United States and the first Catholic to occupy the Presidency, was offered while the nation and world mourned. Hundreds of dignitaries of Church and State filled St. Matthew's Cathedral here to pray for and honor the 46-year-old Chief Executive who was slain by an assassin's bullet in Dallas, Tex.

Twenty-seven chiefs of state or heads of government were among the 1,200 persons at the low Mass. Other delegates brought the number of countries represented to 53.

### Pope Paul cables his condolences

VATICAN CITY-Pope Paul VI expressed his brief at the "tragic and sad news" of President Ken-nedy's assassination in a formal statement and in separate mes-sages to his widow; his parents; his brother: President Lyndon B, Johnson and Cardinal Richard Cushing of Boston, who cele-brated Mass at the President's

The Pontiff again spoke of his sorrow when he received dele-gates attending a Rome meeting of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization.

Pope Paul said in his statement:

"We have been greatly stricken by the tragic and sad news of the killing of the President of the United States, John Fitzgerald Kennedy, and of the serious wounding of Gov. [John] Connally [of Texas].

"We are deeply grieved by this execrable crime, for the grief which has struck the great and civilized country and for the suf-fering which Mrs. Kennedy, her children and her relations suffer.

### President Johnson asks God's help

WASHINGTON — President Lyndon B. Johnson's first public statement after assuming the presidency included a prayer for God's help.

Mr. Johnson, arriving at An-drews Air Buse aboard the same plane that carried the body of President Kennedy, made the fol-lowing statement:

"For me, it is a deep personal tragedy. I know that the world shares the sorrow that Mrs. Ken-nedy and her family bear.

"I will do my best. That is all I can do. I ask for your help and God's."

The Requiem Mass followed a weekend of mourning. For the preceding 21 hours the President's body lay in state in the rotunda of the Capitol Building. Thou-

sands of men, women and chil-dren of every race, color and creed filed past the bier to pay their last respects.

MANY PERSONS, some of whom waited as long as 10 hours to get much be Capitol, sadly made the sign of the cross as they fifted past the body. Groups of Sisters and priests were among those passing the bire even as midnight approached.

Before being taken to the Capitol, the body lay in the East Room of the White House. The casket was draped with an American flag and the catafalque was covered in black.

A large crucifix bearing an ivory figure of Christ was at the foot of the casket, which was flanked by four candles and decorated with a bouquet of white lilies and carnations.

When the body was brought to the White House at 4:25 a.m. from the Naval medical center in Bethesda, Md., a prayer was of-fered by a priest waiting there. Two priests remained throughout the night to pray for the Presi-dent.

A time study of the full and partime parsh staff (that is, priests, Sisters, lay teachers, clerks, custodinus, and caleterin swinkers todinus, and caleterin swinkers of time spent with the grade school children compared with adults is more overwhelming than the financial outlay, which conceals the contribution of the Sisters.

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

### Last profile

Courage, courage, courage.

It ran like a major theme this week through the culogies of John F. Kennedy. And rightly, for it was the key to his greatness and ultimately the cause of his martyrdom.

Without courage, his other assets, his youth, his charm, his talents, his wisdom, his energy and all his advantages would never have lifted him so high.



John F. Kennedy wrote of courage and he spoke of cour-age, but more importantly, he consistently demonstrated it.

He had the physical kind courage that made him a r hero.

He had the even rarer spiritual courage that made sume the staggering responsibilities of the Presidency. He had the courage, moreover, while leading, to lead where many were unwilling to follow.

Part of the enormous grief his death evoked here and abroad was the realization that a truly brave and steady leader had been lost to the world.

Ours is not-whatever else it is-the Age of Courage. Tranquitizers and sedatives, liquor and drugs—these are our refuge in troubles great and small. Even the vogue philosophy of our age—the existentialism of the beaturks—is a philosophy of hopelessness and meaningless absurdity. It does not breed courage.

But people need courage. They need it in their ders and they need it in their own lives. And the

Perhaps the greatest legacy of John Fitzgerald Kennedy is his example of indomitable courage.

### Seeds of hate

"The crime of assassination was so abhorrent to the genius of Angle-Saxon civilization, so foreign to the spirit and practice of our republican institutions, that little danger was apprehended."

Thus commented a friend of Abraham Lincoln shortly after John Wilkes Booth had fired the fatal shot in Washing after is Ford Theatre that has echoed through the ages. It was a comment that bespoke the skeptical mood of 1865.

Against the often dark history of the Presidency, and of r very own days, this was probably the complacent feeling all of us in the early afternoon of November 22, 1963.

As a moment, the murder of John F. Kennedy was hor-rifying. Yet, as terrible as it was, his death suddenly be-comes a piece in a pattern, a pattern cast before and soon renewed.

That pattern is blood and death, the ultimate expression of hate. It is hate: on a busy street for a President (and a governor); on a quiet street for a policeman; and in a crowded corridor for an accused assassin. It is hate, as a bullet in the night for another man and a bomb by day for children... or a degrading assault on a government official.

It is hate: two bodies on the torn ground of a college campus. It is hate: in bombed homes and burning churches in a splatter of paint and a shower of stones, . in the quiet drop of a letter in a mail box and the hum of a press spewing out pamphlets.

It is hate for color, for creed . . . for ideas.

Now, as our house and our hearts cry for peace and order, it is time to ask ourselves some hard questions about love and hate and about the conscience of a people and a nation.

How long is it going to take before we realize that the twisted, bitter world of the sniper and the bomber and the poison writer is not quite as remote, not quite as solitary as we would like to think? How long it is going to take us to realize that our silence and our apathy help build the stage upon which they will act?

When are we going to realize that we are our heritage and our institutions, that the American Way of Life is the life of every one of us, and that the good or evil of it is what every one of us thinks, says, and does?

It is surely time for each of us to weigh the elements of tolerance and brotherhood in this life and decide if we really believe in them deeply enough and mean them as strongly as we sholl. as we should.

It is surely time for us to realize finally that brotherhood—reflected in a respect for another man's color, creed, or ideas—is seldoun clean and easy and confortable. More often it is hard, sweaty, and agonizing. It is time to realize that building any form of brotherhood may demand a painful tearing down of ourselves.

These are by no means all but, hopefully, some of the things we can do for our country.

With her display of dignity and devotion to duty under terrible emotional stress, Jacqueline Kennedy proved her-self a worthy partner of the martyred President. Few would have blamed her had she collapsed in a paroxysm of grief and excused herself from the harrowing experience of the ceremonial funeral of the President.

Instead she saw to it that nothing was left andone which could add to the solemnity and somber pageantry of the President's rites. And she played her anguished role in all of it with incredible courage and control.

## It's hard to decide just where the council is going

It is much more difficult to comment on this session of the council than it was on the first.

Last year information was scarce. The daily releases handed out by the council press office were woefally inadequate and usually gave the impression that the bishops were cheerfully engaged in exchanging platitudes. A weekly commentator then were not provided to be inside St. Peter's basilica for the council sessions, was in a rare position to secon the rest of the press, and he could be fairly certain that whatever he wrote would be something that had not already been read.

Not so this year. The press receives a daily release that gives accurate summaries of what each speaker said in the council hall. Moreover, the press gets excellent outlines of the material being discussed by the Fathers of the council and sometimes even the full text of the explanation of the schema under discussion given by the commission that composed it. At the daily briefing in the language of their choice, the press can ask for and obtain more complete explanations of what any particular speaker may have said.

May Catholic join

the Birch Society?

Q. Can you give me some guidance in the relationship between Cathalicism and membership in such societies as the John Birch Society. Here is a clipping about a priest who beasted from the pulpit of his membership in this society, and urged his parishioners to sign a petition, circulated at the church door, calling for the impeachment of Chief Justice Warren. It is difficult for me to understand how a Catholic—layman or priest—can promote such a society and reconcile his own Catholicism with the aims and public statements of the John Birch Society.

Any Cathalie, lay or clerical, who consorts with the John Birch Society is either toally ignorant of the social principles of his religion, or is carried away by blind preject. And any priest who urges his parishmers sign a pelition asking for the impeachment of Chief Justice should be sent to a psychiatrist, is mad—even as the mad racists.

We may not like some of the decisions in which

We may not like some of the decisions in which the Chief Justice has participated, along with a majority of the court. But indiges are not appointed to please all the people, but rather to interpret the law and apply the principles of our Constitution to modern problems. By and large the Warren court has done this job admirably. And even if you disagree violently with this statement, you must, fly on have plain common sense, admit that there are no legal grounds on which impeachered proceedings could even be instituted against any member of the court. Fortunately our Constitution has made them immune from the rabul rantings of public opinion. Only thus can justice be done.

Q. I have heard that Christ's Church is in principle opposed to the philosophy that "the end justifies the means." That is, it is considered a sin to violate God's law in accomplishing a goal, no matrophysical and the consideration of the church has never condemned the people of any nation for righting and skilling in order to protect their freedom and independence. Are we then to conclude that Christ was taking idle nonsense when He said (in the Gospel according to Matthew), "But I say to you not resist the evil deer. . .; If someone strike thee on the right cheek, turn to him the other also"?

A. Jesus did not say that we should stand by idly while someone atrikes our father and mother on both cheeks and beats our children over their heads.

Indiced, while the Church would never say, or intimate, that Clirist was talking after moisenes, she has always asserted the right of self defense against an unjust aggressor. This same principle applies to a nation, which has the right and duty to defend its citizens against unjust attack or de-

In olden days (up to World War II) theologians used to talk about the principles of a just war. Now many of them have given up such idle prattle: a basic principle of a just war was that the good to be attained must exceed the harm to be done or permitted. Nuclear bombs seem to have made that principle obsolete.

In the theorizing about a just war, your principle of the ends and the means remained very much in force. You were never permitted to use much means—but you were allowed some gruesome, unintended results—to attain your goal. Now the gruesome results have become too ghastly.

If I understand Secretary McNamara's reasoning rightly he would make a great scholastic moralist. He is trying to re-establish the principles of a just war. However, it looks like he might lose his sealp—and NATO too—in the process.

Q. Can a marriage take place in a Catholic church with a nuptial Mass between a practicing Catholic and a fallen-away Catholic?

The press could not ask for more. There simply are no secrets. Even information on the significant developments back stage can be had for the price of a cup of coffee. Every enterprising newsman knew about the disagreement between the twelve Cardinal presidents and the four Cardinal moderators which delayed the voting on the propositions concerning the place of bishops in the Church. And it was a lazy reporter who did not know that the fifth chapter of the schema on ecumenism, namely, on religious liberty, was held back by the Theological Commission.

If your daily newspapers and diocesan weekly do not give full coverage of the council, the fault is not in Rome but at home.

The problem this year is what to do with all the informa-tion available. A reporter for a daily paper can file a good story each day by spucing up the press release summaries of three or four of the more interesting speeches—particu-larly when they express opposite views. A reporter for a weekly can select from the best speeches of the week, being careful to balance the different points of view and present what appears to be a good objective news story.

But what does all the speech making mean? Where is the council going? Has anything at all been accomplished?

Will anything be accomplished? These are questions a commentator must answer.

mentator must answer.

The press has properly reported these developments:

(1) The vast majority of the bishops want the council to describe the Church as modern theologians and Scripture scholars have been depicting her and not in the juridical language of Scholastic text books. (2) The same majority want the council to proclaim that by Christ's design the bishops of the world form a body or college that is the successor to the college of Apostles and that therefore the bishops join with the Pope, the head of the college, in governing the universal Church. (3) As a practical application of this, the bishops want some sort of senate or permanent commission of representative bishops who would meet regularly with the Pope to advise and assist him in the direction of the Roman Curia.

And now as they discuss the schema on ecumenism the same majority of bishops appear to be supporting the ecumenical movement and the ideas of the Secretariate for Church Unity.

But none of this has been voted on. The schemata must be amended according to the desires of the council Fathers. (Continued on page 9)

### Lay auditors seen too 'clericalized'

Instead, they must often find a dedicated layama, whose income comes from some clerical source as teacher or administrative, to accept the added choice of president or honorary secretary; or perhaps content themselves with a big mane, even though the bidder is otherwise fully engaged. Dedicated, yes; but not necessarily involved at all in the lay apostular as the council is now focusing it, the presence of the Christian in the world. And even if involved, perhaps not free to votice views unwelcome to those on whom his career depends.

These comments apply neither to all organiza-tions nor to all leading figures in largely "paper" organizations. But the repeated off-the-record criti-cism is that wheever made the selection (and his or their identity is a deep mystery in the imost folds of the velvet curtain) assembled a highly clericalized group of laymen. This observer concurs.

We have here a specific instance of a wider council problem. When discussing the laity's role, the Fathers called for revival of active lay participation in the Church's work from which lay people were excluded in the eleventh century. While they have long shown their desire to resume their proper function, powerful clerical elements apparently still seek to change appearances and not realities.

### Answers lay participation critic

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





Every Christian should be an apostle. The apostle is not himself the light. If he believes in his own light and trusts in it, he deceives himself, and his action is useless—indeed, often harmful, list role is to be a witness, to efface himself before lim Whom he announces, like the Precursor St. John the Baptist, who "decreased" and disappeared when he had given his testimony concerning Him Who is the Light.

### When preparing to deal with souls

The altitude of the apostle must be one of profound respect for, and great delicacy towards, the souls with whom he is to come into contact: respect for their person, for the mystery that is in each one of them, for their liberty. He must prepare himself for such meeting, by a generous effort a self-officement. The lawing aside of his own self and his own selfishness will protect him against two conflicting errors:

conflicting errors:

On the one hand, an excessive confidence in his own personal worth and in the effectiveness of his means of action. This is a clear midication that he has not prayed; that he has no the appreciation of his own powerlessness; that he does not yet know that the grace of God is alone capable of touching the conscience, enlightening the minds and moving the wills of men.

minds and moving the wills of men.

He is excessively assured of himself and of his own ideas, and imagines that he can meet from his own spiritual and moral resources all the needs of those with whom he has to deal, and answer

imagines that he can meet from his own spirious and monor sources all the needs of those with whom he has to deal, and answer all their questions.

He makes rash pronouncements about highly complex subjects and about difficult problems which cail for enlightened knowledge and balanced judgments.

Because he has never studied, he is unaware of his own ignorance, so that he is in a permanent state of mental and moral presumption—of "conceit sublimed by ignorance"—whose consequences can be very serious when it comes to bearing witness to a doctrinal truth.

On the other hand, self-oblivion will protect the apostle against the error of on interiority complex schief paralyzes his action. He cannot free himself from a feeling of his powerlessness and personal incaparity, to an extent which will enable him to rely only on the proc of chiral truth to the state of the self-oblivion with the soft and a heef of self-detachment, which are all the more dangerous for being subtle and conceiled. Because a person is timely, he magnines he is humble; hecause he shirts his responsibilities and evades a task which demands considerable effort, he debutes and evades a task which demands considerable effort, he debutes the solid has been solid by the solid himself that he is modest; because he is overwhelmed by his own incapacity, he imagines that there is not a hint of proud self-sufficiency in his soul.

The apostle who relies only on Christ, conquers his shortconnings. No longer surprised at them or disturbed by them, he detaches himself from them, so that he may he an obedient instrument in His hands Who leads and inspires him.

### When dealing with souls

When dealing with souls

This is indeed the moment when the apostle should "empty" himself. When a person, seeking God, asks the apostle to reveal God to him, and finds in that apostle simply another self-centered person, he will merely be irritated. Why should he exercise self-oblition at the instance of another who is but his equal—and often his inferior—in human qualities? On the other hand, how powerfully such a person will be attracted by the mysterious presence of the living-god, which he senses in the soul of an apostle whom he sees as representative of Christ.

He that seeks to be truly the precursor, does not stoop to human ways of winning the esteem and the praise of others. He avoids over-eagerness, because it is so easy to be swept away with one's own activity and to pin one's faith on it. Very rarely indeed is there a really disinterested action, in which there is no admixture of the self. The signs of such admixture are readily seen. 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

They will not be ready for voting until the next session. In the meantime anything could happen.

Said a certain Roman cardinal to an ambassador who ked him how the Roman Curia was reacting to the trend the council; "Let the bishops talk; we'll write the text."

This is precisely what the council majority fears. To obviate it, the leaders of the majority have been working on two plans: (1) have the Pope set up immediately the type of senate or commission of bishops he wants, and (2) change the make-up of the council commissions, at least the presi-dents and secretaries, who are all members of the Curia.

As a matter of fact, petitions from the bishops to change the members of the commissions have lain on the Pope's desk for several weeks. Recently a petition was circulated among the bishops for signatures, requesting the Holy Fa-ther to intervene in the council by declaring clearly what sort of help he wanted from the bishops and what kind of organization he thought would furnish him the closer operation from the bishops he had asked for in his opening

The petition was presented to the Pope by Cardinal Silva Henriguez of Santiago, Chile, with hundreds of signatures of other cardinals and bishops. It was felt by those who backed the petition that this was what the Holy Father himself wanted. There was optimism among the council majority. The council was going to get somewhere at last.

But nothing happened. Finally word came down that the Pope had said, "No, this is not the time." Then a rather substantial rumor began to circulate that the Pope had capitulated to the small minority determined to stop the forward trend of the council.

Certain Curial cardinals and a number of conservative Italian and Spanish bishops, and even an American cardinal, had approached the Holy Father one after another, warning him that the council was moving too fast; the laity were confused by all the changes in liturgy and theology; respect for authority was endangered by the criticisms of the Roman Curia; this is not the time, therefore, to reform the Curia; wait.

The bull sessions, where bishops and experts relax after the work of the day, become wakes where the council is buried. A few days later someone has lunch with Cardinal Suenens and reports that the Belgian Cardinal, who is the leader of the council majority, is still very optimistic. He says there will be an encouraging announcement in a day or two. Spirits rise.

The announcement turns out to be the decision to enlarge the commissions. This is obviously a compromise. The election of additional members will undoubtedly give the council majority better representation in the commissions, but the Curia members will still have the controlling positions of authority in those commissions. It is hard to decide where the council is going.

See how difficult it is to comment on the council from week to week? You might dispatch a pessimistic commentary and two days later wish you could somehow retract it as the picture changes.

There is one thing I can be sure I shall not want to re-tract and that is a tribute I want to pay to the American bishops for what they have done to get the issue of religious liberty before the council.

The Secretariate for Church Unity had prepared a statement proclaiming the Church's support of the right to religious liberty. It was to be a chapter in the schema on ecumenism or Church unity. As the rules require, it was submitted to the Theological Commission for a check on its doctrinal content. There it got "lost." The Curia members of the Theological Commission, meaning the Holy Office, were said to be against any consideration of religious liberty.

As the second session got under way, it began to look as though nothing would be done about the religious liberty issue. The Secretariate for Church Unity could not even get the statement printed. It was rumored that even the Office of the Secretary of State, surprisingly enough, did not want the issue discussed.

But the American bishops were determined that the council issue a strong statement in favor of the right to religious liberty. The American hierarchy was unanimous here. They got behind the Secretariate for "hurch Unity. They petitioned the Pope, the Secretary of State, the President of the Theological Commission. They applied pressure everywhere. And they prevailed.

The Theological Commission agreed at last to consider the statement on religious liberty. Bishop John Wright of Pittsburgh and Auxiliary Bishop James Griffiths of New York, members of the commission, had much to do with pushing it along. Then came the memorable day when the Theological Commission met for the fatal decision and by a vote of 18 to 5 decided to release the statement on religious liberty for printing and presentation to the council.

There was one man who was thrilled by this more perhaps than anyone else and that was Father John Courtney Murray, the American Jesuit theologian.

Murray, the American Jesuit theologian.

Father Murray gained worldwide renown for his writings on religious liberty wton he was forbidden by the Holy Office to write any more on the subject. He was overlooked when experts were appointed to the preparatory commissions of the council. He was not appointed an expert of the council, and though he enjoys the reputation of being one of the most important theologians in the world, no bishop brought him to Rome last year.

Cardinal Spellman rectified the mistake this year by hacing Father Murray named an expert. No sconer had he arrived in Rome than he was appointed to several commissions, one of which is the Secretariate for Church Unity.

At the request of Bishop Wright, Father Murray assisted the Theological Commission when it met to discuss the statement on religious liberty. He spoke in favor of it at that meeting.

As a member of the Secretariate for Church Unity, Father Murray was largely responsible for writing the bril-liant "relatio," or explanation of the chapter in religious liberty that was read in the council hall by Bishop de Smedt.

It must have given Father Murray great personal satisfaction to have presented to the council what he had previously been censored for writing.

This is but one of many human interest stories of the council that ought to be told.

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

Father J. H. Crehan, S.J., a leading British Scripture scholar, found fault with the study's scien-tific method.

Both he and another priest,

in charge of London's Chapel of
St. Peter and St. Edward and is

the Pontificial Riblical Commission, said that St. Paul probably
dictated his letters to secretaries,
which would account for differences in style.

MR. MORTON said that his dis-covery "has cut the ground from under any notion of absolute reli-gious authority," and he con-cluded that "the authority of the Church as the interpreter of the Bible must go,"

He made his study with the late G.H.C. MacGregor, a former pro-fessor of theology and Biblheal criticism at Glasgow University. With the help of a computer, they tested the original Greek of the epistles by examining sentence length, word pattern and the fre-quency of common Greek words.

They concluded that St. Paul wrote only Romans, First and Second Corinthians, Galatians and Philemon. The other nine, they said, were the work of at least five others.

Father Crehan said that a Swedish scholar recently used a computer to settle the problem of who wrote "Letters of Junius," political diatribes by the 18th-century author whose identity was tanknown, by comparing "Junius" with other works of the suspected author for quirks of style.

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PATHER CREHAN said that in the study of the epistes, "seven to the property of the property o

"St. Paul," he added, "wrote his letters in what was not his native language and wrote them over the space of 20 years, probably by dictation to a scribe or secretary."

Msgr. Barton said it has long been accepted that St. Paul used stenographers and that there is no reason why "ghost" writers should not have put his ideas into their own words. He said that this would explain changes in style.


