File suit in school aid fight

DAYTON, Ohio-A \$5 million DAYTON, Onto—A \$5 million suit has been filed in federal court here against expenditure of \$14,606.02 out of \$100.03 in federal funds, made available for distribution by officials of the Dayton school system, for textbooks and other library materials for normalities feel of the dayton computible school obil.

Protestants and Other Ameri-cans United for Separation of Church and State (POAU), and 22 individuals, including 13 from Dayton, filed the suit protesting the federal Elementary and Sec-ondary Education Act of 1965.

The act provides that educa-tional benefits made be equally available to all eligible children regardless of which school they attend. Under Title II of the act, some \$14,000 was spent here to ungrade library materials used by children in parochial and private institutions. The POAU calls this unconstitu-tional.

NAMED A5 defendants were the United States; John D. Her-byth, treasurer of the States of Ohio; R. A. Horn, Ohio director of the division of federal assist-ance; Jack E. Brown, Ohio co-ordinator of Title It; and Robert B. French, superintendent of Dayton city schools.

The \$5 million is asked "for the necessity of instituting action for relief for eneroachment by Congress" on the plaintiff's rights and consequent invasion of their privacy.
