

Moreover, we yield to no nose-counting politician, to no over-ambitious career militarist, and to no struting safe-at-home flag-waver in honoring the fine young Americans doing the fighting and dying in Vietnam. Never has any nation put a more gallant force of men at arms into the field of combat. We all should remember them in our daily prayers.

All of that said, our reservations about the war continue undiminished. Many of those reservations have their sources in the person of President Johnson. We assume we are among the critics whom Mr. Johnson asked God to forgive. "for they know not what they do," in a remarkable speech at Omaha after the Hanoi-Haiphong bombings got under way.

The most remarkable part of Mr. Johnson's speech, however, was not his thoughtful intercession with God on behalf of those who disagree with him in some things. The truly extraordinary part was where he recalled that 20 months ago he had been elected by 44 states and that this, in turn, meant "there is only one that has been chosen by the American people to decide."

Walter Lippmann has pointed out in Newsweek that, taken at face value, this statement means Mr. Johnson believes he "has unlimited and arbitrary power in the making of war and page." making of war and peace.






