



Justice, Peace unit has two-fold mission

ROME — The Vatican's new Commission for Justice and Peace has both short and long term objectives in its task of combating power among the peoples of the world, it was said here (April 24).



Fear hike in abortions

CINCINNATI — Easier abor-tion laws will lead to "sky-rocketing abortion rate" and will be followed by a campaign in favor of mercy-killing, a psychiatrist warned here.

Dr. Frank J. Ayd, Jr., of Bal-timore, who also is a writer, teacher, and medical research-er, told the Cincinnati Medievalists at a meeting in the Shera-ton Gibson hotel:

"Decisions in such matters cannot be left exclusively to scientists and the medical pro-fession, but must be made by society at large."

DR. AYD emphasized the importance of forming public opin-ion in favor of moral solutions to problems involving human life and dignity. He declared that "much experimentation is going on which violates human rights."

On the subject of abortion, Dr. Ayd pointed out that courts throughout the nation consistent-ly protect the rights of unborn bables.

Moreover, he said, to give a woman the right to decide whether or not another innocent human being's existence is to be continued or ended is to give her a right which no person should
