

Welfare...

The present stance of Congress as the economy-minded, budget-trimming friend of the taxpayer is as phony as a Vietcong communique. Pork barrel appropriations continue to flow unimpeded while the House piously allows as how it cannot give a profligate war President a tax increase until he obliges with domestic spending cuts. spending cuts.

The cuts will come out of the hides of the poor, not out of fatback legislation cornfed as Christmas goodies to friends and patrons.

There have been glaring failures in the administra-tion's war on poverty—and enemies of the poor are making the most of them. But there also has been a large measure of imagination and innovation new to the American scene-this despite funding too sparse to be

We think first of the Head Start programs which acknowledge the cyclical nature of poverty and a consequence of generation-after-generation "reliefers." Other outstanding Office of Economic Opportunity projects include free legal services, adult basic education and vocational training.

A segment of official Washington has come to recognize the true nature of poverty, and this is heartening. But anti-poverty measures are not popular with Congress or, indeed, the electorate.

Resentment is spurred by the spiralling cost of reresentment is spurred by the spirating cost of re-lief. Despite a booming economy with a record high employment level, relief rolls are increasing at an un-precedented rate. Since 1957, federal-state welfare costs have tripled.

Reasons are clear. Hard-core unemployment among Negroes is higher than before World War II. Mechanization in the rural South has thrown countless thousands out of jobs. Wholesale migration to the urban North has made welfare available to persons who would have been left to starve in their home states.

Welfare more and more has come to mean Negro relief. This has bred new resentments among lower middle-class whites. In short, welfare has become a major factor in social disunity and racial antagonisms.

Riots won't be prevented by Father Doran's proper but quite limited prescription of punishment for lawbreakers. And they certainly won't be prevented by the likes of the Birchers and HUAC.

They can be prevented only by massive public and private programs that relieve urban misery. This rejection of the Idea that bishops must necessarily be theologians is not only a gesture of confidence in the Holy Spirit, but a deliberate reversal of the situation which has been taken for granted. has been taken for granted almost from the beginnings of institutionalized Christianity and which has now been radi-cally altered by a changed cul-tural and social context.


