

Religious Freedom Week 2019: "*Strength in Hope*" takes place from June 22 to 29. The Week begins with the Feast of Sts. John Fisher and Thomas More, ends with the Solemnity of Sts. Peter and Paul, and includes the Feast of the Nativity of St. John the Baptist. This year's Religious Freedom Week is also notable in that it includes the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi)

and the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

The theme for this year is Strength in Hope. It is taken from the Second Vatican Council's Decree on the Apostolate of the Laity:

In the pilgrimage of this life, hidden with Christ in God and free from enslavement to wealth, they aspire to those riches which remain forever and generously dedicate themselves wholly to the advancement of the kingdom of God and to the reform and improvement of the temporal order in a Christian spirit. Among the trials of this life they find <u>strength in hope</u>, convinced that "the sufferings of the present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory to come that will be revealed in us" (Rom. 8:18).

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


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
Sts. Thomas More and John Fisher

Pray that like Sts. Thomas More and John Fisher, we might have the wisdom and the courage to be good servants of our country, though always servants of God first.

Reflect: Religious Freedom Week is a fitting time to reflect not only on religious liberty, but on what it means to be both American and Catholic. Perhaps somewhat ironically, two English saints point us in the right direction. We remember the martyrs Sts. Thomas More and John Fisher, in part, because they were steadfast in the truth, and thus exemplify courage in the exercise of conscience. They also show us what patriotism means for Christians. They loved and

served their country. Thomas More carried out his lay vocation as a civil servant, while John Fisher lived out the clerical vocation as a most faithful bishop. At the same time, when forced to choose between the king of England and Christ the King of the Universe, they adhered to Jesus and His Church. We need the fortitude and wisdom to animate the Church today, as we navigate these tumultuous times. Sts. John Fisher and Thomas More, pray for us!

Persecution of Christians and Religious Minorities in the Middle East

Pray that our Christian sisters and brothers in the Middle East, and all religious minorities, who are suffering from attacks by extremists and interminable conflicts may be freed from violent persecution.

Reflect: In January 2018, Pope Francis warned that Christians "face challenges today that demean human dignity: they flee from situations of conflict and poverty; are victims of the trafficking of human beings...; they suffer hardships and hunger, in a world ever richer in means and poorer in love, where inequalities continue to increase." This is especially true in the Middle East, where wars have caused thousands, including Chris-

tians, to flee from Syria and Iraq into Lebanon, Jordan, Turkey and beyond, where their presence in solidarity with Christians in the Middle East. taxes meager resources. Will they be able to return and if so, will they find the security needed to rebuild their lives and livelihoods? With the number of Christians declining there, will the Middle East lose the unique contributions that Christians have made over the centuries?

Act: The Church in the United States stands Consider joining efforts to support Middle Eastern Christians with a donation to the Knights of Columbus, Aid to the Church in Need, Catholic Relief Services, and Catholic Near East Welfare Association.





Faithful Public Servants

Pray for Catholics, and all people of faith, who seek to serve our country in government as elected officials, judges, administrators, and staff.

Reflect: In recent years, Catholic nominees to the federal judiciary have faced questions about their faith. In one exchange, a nominee was told, "The dogma lives loudly within you, and that's of concern." Other nominees have endured questions about their membership in the Knights of Columbus, the largest Catholic fraternal organization in the country. These religious tests are unjust and unconstitutional. At a time when our country

is highly polarized, our leaders in the Senate should be working to foster tolerance, not fueling divisions. Lay Catholics exercise their apostolate by building up the common good as civil servants. Let us pray and act for our sisters and brothers who, like St. Thomas More, seek to faithfully serve both God and country.

Act: It is time for discriminatory, anti-Catholic questions to stop. Contact your senators today and urge them to reject religious tests for nominees for public office!





Religious Persecution in Myanmar

Pray that the Rohingya-our Muslim brothers and sisters from the Rakhine region, whose rights and very identity are not recognized by the Myanmar government-may find the respect that recognizes the dignity of all human beings.

Reflect: Since 2017, over 700,000 Rohingya fled Myanmar as their villages were burned, women raped, and men killed in what a United Nations official has termed "genocide." Many refugees are crowded into camps in Bangladesh, while others have boarded flimsy boats going to Thailand, Malaysia, and Indonesia, where their fate is uncertain. They are being pressured to return but what guarantees are there that they will be treated

with dignity and as equal members of society by a government that has declared them to be "stateless"? The Catholic Church in Myanmar has worked actively to mediate between the Buddhist majority and the Rohingya. Pope Francis visited Myanmar and Bangladesh in late 2017. At an interreligious and ecumenical meeting in Dhaka, he said, "We all are images of God, including the Rohingya," and he went on to say, "your tragedy is very difficult, but it has a place in our hearts."

Act: Reach out to Muslim neighbors and members in your community to express solidarity with their efforts to build a culture that recognizes and respects the rights of all people. Support Catholic Relief Services and other Catholic organizations that seek to build bridges of understanding between different faith communities and to counter intolerance and extremism.





Adoption And Foster Care

Pray for children awaiting adoption, for parents seeking to adopt, for children receiving foster care, for foster parents providing care to children, and that Catholic and other faith-based organizations may have the freedom to serve all those seeking adoption and foster care services in accordance with their faith.

Reflect: The Epistle of St. James teaches that true religion is to care for the orphan and the widow. Today, the Church puts that teaching into practice through her child welfare service organizations. Catholic and other faith-based institutions play an absolutely vital role in serving the many children who find themselves in some of the most difficult circumstances. Recently, the

opioid crisis has put a strain on the foster care system. Yet, at a time when we need more care providers, particularly ones that are effective at recruiting prospective foster and adoptive parents, some state and local governments have shut people of faith out, because faith-based providers seek to serve in accordance with their convictions about the nature of the family and what is best for children. Several agencies have already had to end their child welfare services. If sincerely held religious beliefs or moral conthis trend continues, more children and families victions. Contact your U.S. senators and repwill be affected.

Act: The Child Welfare Provider Inclusion Act (CWPIA) prevents faith-based child welfare service providers from being targeted by government discrimination. The Act would prohibit the federal government and any state that receives certain federal funding from discriminating against child welfare service providers on the basis that they decline to provide a child welfare service that conflicts with their resentatives today and ask them to co-sponsor and support the federal Child Welfare Provider Inclusion Act!





Economic Disputes Lead to Religious Tensions in Nigeria

Pray that herders and farmers in Nigeria, whose conflict over access to land and resources has fueled religious tensions, may find the means to compromise and work out their differences in a non-violent manner.

Reflect: The most populous country in Africa, Nigeria has the "resource curse"—having abundant resources which different groups vie to control, leading to violent conflicts, over 2 million people internally displaced, and grinding poverty for the have-nots. Many small ethnic groups feel oppressed and fight for recognition. Violence can stem from economic, political, and social reasons but because the population is almost evenly

divided between Christians (in the south) and Muslims (in the north), such violence is interpreted as religious. Boko Haram, an extremist group whose name means "Western education is forbidden," has fomented Muslim-Christian discord but in fact has attacked and killed more Muslims than Christians. Current fighting between Fulani herdsmen (Muslim) and farmers (Christian) has exacerbated religious tension. Archbishop Ignatius Kaigama of Jos called for transcending religious divides and promoting inter-ethnic and inter-religious harmony.

Act: Support Aid to the Church in Need, Catholic Relief Services, USCCB's Solidarity Fund for Aid to the Church in Africa, and other organizations that are helping the internally displaced, providing livelihood training and healthcare, and offering peacebuilding between those of different faiths.





Religion, A Public Good

Pray that the religious dimension of the common good will receive due recognition in our political culture, and for the conversion of the hearts of those seeking to remove religious symbols from public life.

Reflect: This year, the Supreme Court is set to decide on a case involving a cross in Bladensburg, Maryland, that was erected to memorialize soldiers who died in World War I. The land on which the cross stands is now maintained by the government, and activist groups object that this arrangement amounts to a violation of the First Amendment's Establishment Clause. Of course, nobody believes this is an instance of Congress establishing a state church. These

efforts are part of a larger effort to ban religious symbols from public spaces. This is an affront to American pluralism, a pluralism in which the religious impulse of all people is respected and reflected in our public spaces. As Catholics, we seek to inspire a culture in which the human spirit can flourish. Public religious symbols are a part of that culture.

Act: Public display of religious symbols makes America beautiful. Learn about the monuments and religious displays in your area, and visit one if possible. Write a letter to the editor defending these treasures if they are attacked.





Incarcerated Persons

Pray that the dignity and right to religious freedom of incarcerated persons would be respected.

Reflect: Pope Francis has spoken of the throwaway culture, a culture in which people are treated like objects to be discarded when they are not "useful." That culture can manifest itself in how our society treats people in the criminal justice system. In Arkansas, a Muslim man had to fight in court to grow a half-inch beard. Similarly, Jewish prisoners in some states have struggled to be permitted to receive kosher meals. Recently,

a Muslim man in Alabama could not have his imam present with him when he was executed. Catholic teaching on religious liberty is rooted in the dignity of the human person. That dignity is not lost when a person commits a crime. And traditionally, Catholics have understood ministry to prisoners as a work of mercy. Indeed, Catholics hope that incarcerated persons find strength in their faith. For American culture to be one of life, not a throwaway culture, our criminal justice system needs to recognize the dignity of all people.

Act: Find out how you can support Catholic prison ministry. In many dioceses, Catholic Charities coordinates prison ministry. Contact your diocese to see what you can do to participate in this ministry of care for incarcerated persons.







2019 Religious Freedom Week Talking Points

- Religious Freedom Week takes place from June 22 29 each year. It begins with the feast day of Sts. Thomas More and John Fisher, includes the Nativity of St. John the Baptist, and ends with the feast of Sts. Peter and Paul. This year, the week also includes the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi) and the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus.
- The theme for this year is **Strength in Hope**. It is taken from the Second Vatican Council's Decree on the Apostolate of the Laity:

They who have this faith live in the hope of the revelation of the sons of God and keep in mind the cross and resurrection of the Lord. In the pilgrimage of this life, hidden with Christ in God and free from enslavement to wealth, they aspire to those riches which remain forever and generously dedicate themselves wholly to the advancement of the kingdom of God and to the reform and improvement of the temporal order in a Christian spirit. Among the trials of this life they find strength in hope, convinced that "the sufferings of the present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory to come that will be revealed in us" (Rom. 8:18). (Apostolicam actuositatem, 4).

Catholics face challenges both in our current political climate of polarization and within the Church. We want to encourage Catholics to persist in the struggle to participate in the advancement of the kingdom of God by finding hope in Jesus Christ.

- The USCCB provides "Pray Reflect Act" documents—one for each day on different religious liberty topics. These materials help people learn about religious liberty from a Catholic perspective, pray about particular issues, and act on what they learn, whether by finding ways for their parish to serve their community or perhaps even by calling their Members of Congress to promote legislation supporting religious liberty.
- This year's Pray-Reflect-Act gives a sense for the breadth of religious liberty issues of particular concern for the bishops at the present time. For international concerns, the Office of Religious Liberty has collaborated with the Office of International Justice and Peace to highlight three regions in the world where persecution of religious minorities is severe, the Middle East, Myanmar, and Nigeria. We need to be in solidarity with people throughout the world who suffer for their faith.

- Domestically, a major area of concern continues to be freedom for child welfare service providers. The opioid crisis is putting a strain on the foster care system. The number of children in need is going up. The number of families willing to take the children into their homes is going down. And in places like Illinois, Massachusetts, California, and D.C., service providers like Catholic Charities who have a track record of excellence in recruiting and assisting foster families have been shut down.
- The federal Child Welfare Provider Inclusion Act (H.R. 897 / S. 274) would protect the religious liberty of child welfare providers, including adoption and foster care agencies. Similar legislation has been introduced and passed in several states. All are encouraged to check out the <u>USCCB Action Center</u> and their state Catholic conference websites for legislative updates on this and other important policy issues!
- Another area that has become of particular concern is the imposition of religious tests on Catholic nominees to the federal judiciary. In 2017, during U.S. Senate confirmation hearings, a nominee was asked intrusive questions about her Catholic faith in an exchange which included a senator saying, "The dogma lives loudly within you, and that's of concern." More recently, several nominees have been interrogated about their membership in the Knights of Columbus. These kinds of questions amount to a religious test, which is both unjust and unconstitutional. We are urging Catholics to contact their senators to say that religious tests are unacceptable.
- Religious Freedom Week succeeded the Fortnight for Freedom last year for a few reasons:
 - A "Week" is simpler than a "Fortnight." Many public awareness campaigns take
 place over the course of a week—such as Catholic Schools Week, National
 Migration Week, and National Marriage Week. A week provides a focused period
 of time to concentrate our attention on the issue of religious freedom.
 - 2. Although the Fortnight sought to raise awareness of several religious freedom issues, it was associated heavily in many people's minds with the HHS contraceptive mandate. While the HHS mandate remains a live issue and is still being challenged in several courts, awareness needs to be raised concerning other important religious freedom issues as well.
 - 3. Over the last few years, the Fortnight has shifted to more of a prayer and education campaign. Religious freedom encompasses a number of areas—affecting the entire Church—and not just our Church, but all people of faith who seek to live out their faith in daily life, in the public square.
- Through prayer, education, and public action during Religious Freedom Week, we will
 promote the essential right of religious freedom for Catholics and for those of *all*faiths.





Married Love and the Gift of Life







This bulletin insert is excerpted from Married Love and the Gift of Life, a statement of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) that was approved at its November 2006 General Meeting.

en and women considering marriage yearn for certain things. They want to be accepted unconditionally by each other. They want their marriage to be filled with love and happiness. They want a family. In short, they want their marriage to be a source of joy and fulfillment their whole life long.

God's plan for marriage, from the time he first created human beings as male and female, has always included all this and more.

WHAT DOES THE CHURCH TEACH ABOUT MARRIED LOVE?

Marriage is more than a civil contract; it is a lifelong covenant of love between a man and a woman. It is an intimate partnership in which husbands and wives learn to give and receive love unselfishly, and then teach their children to do so as well. Christian marriage in particular is a "great mystery," a sign of the love between Christ and his Church (Eph 5:32).

Married love is powerfully embodied in the spouses' sexual relationship, when they most fully express what it means to become "one body" (Gn 2:24) or "one flesh" (Mk 10:8, Mt 19:6). The Church teaches that the sexual union of husband and wife is meant to express the full meaning of love, its power to bind a couple together and its openness to new life.

WHAT DOES THIS HAVE TO DO WITH CONTRACEPTION?

A husband and wife express their committed love not only with words, but with the language of their bodies.

Married love differs from any other love in the world. By its nature, the love of husband and wife is so complete, so ordered to a lifetime of communion with God and each other, that it is open to creating a new human being they will love and care for together. Part of God's gift to husband and wife is this ability in and through their love to cooperate with God's creative power. Therefore, the mutual gift of fertility is an integral part of the bonding power of marital intercourse. That power to create a new life with God is at the heart of what spouses share with each other.

Suppressing fertility by using contraception denies part of the inherent meaning of married sexuality and does harm to the couple's unity. The total giving of oneself, body and soul, to one's beloved is no time to say: "I give you everything I am—except. . . ." The Church's teaching is not only about observing a rule, but about preserving that total, mutual gift of two persons in its integrity.

ARE COUPLES EXPECTED TO LEAVE THEIR FAMILY SIZE ENTIRELY TO CHANCE?

Certainly not. The Church teaches that a couple may generously decide to have a large family, or may for serious reasons choose not

to have more children for the time being or even for an indefinite period (*Humanae Vitae*, no. 10).

WHAT SHOULD A COUPLE DO IF THEY HAVE A GOOD REASON TO AVOID HAVING A CHILD?

A married couple can engage in marital intimacy during the naturally infertile times in a woman's cycle, or after child-bearing years, without violating the meaning of marital intercourse in any way.

This is the principle behind natural family planning (NFP). Natural methods of family planning involve fertility education that enables couples to cooperate with the body as God designed it.

WHAT IS NATURAL FAMILY PLANNING?

Natural family planning is a general name for the methods of family planning that are based on a woman's menstrual cycle. A man is fertile throughout his life, while a woman is fertile for only a few days each cycle during the child-bearing years. Some believe that NFP involves using a calendar to predict the fertile time. That is not what NFP is today. A woman experiences clear, observable signs indicating when she is fertile and when she is infertile. Learning to observe and understand these signs is at the heart of education in natural family planning.

When a couple decides to postpone pregnancy, NFP can be very effective. NFP can also be very helpful for couples who desire to have a child because it identifies the time of ovulation. It is used by many fertility specialists for this purpose. Thus a couple can have marital relations at a time when they know that conception is most likely to take place.

IS THERE REALLY A DIFFERENCE BETWEEN USING CONTRACEPTION AND PRACTICING NATURAL FAMILY PLANNING?

On the surface, there may seem to be little difference. But the end result is not the only thing that matters, and the *way* we get to that result may make an enormous moral difference. Some ways respect God's gifts to us while others do not. Couples who have practiced natural family planning after using contraception have experienced a profound difference in the meaning of their sexual intimacy.

When couples use contraception, either physical or chemical, they suppress their fertility, asserting that they alone have ultimate control over this power to create a new human life. With NFP, spouses respect God's design for life and love. They may choose to refrain from sexual union during the woman's fertile time, doing nothing to destroy the love-giving or life-giving meaning that is present. This is the difference between choosing to falsify the full marital language of the body and choosing at certain times not to speak that language.

IS IT TRUE, AS SOME CLAIM, THAT SOME METHODS OF BIRTH CONTROL CAN CAUSE AN ABORTION?

Some methods of birth control are aimed at preventing the union of sperm and egg and therefore act only as contraceptives. These would include barriers such as condoms and diaphragms.

By contrast, hormonal methods such as the Pill may work in several ways. They can suppress ovulation or alter cervical mucus to prevent fertilization, and thus act contraceptively. But they may at times have other effects, such as changes to the lining of the uterus. If the contraceptive action fails and fertilization takes place, these hormonal methods may make it impossible for a newly conceived life to implant and survive. That would be a very early abortion. Medical opinions differ on whether or how often this may occur. Currently there is no way to know precisely how these drugs work at any given time in an individual woman.

Concern about the risk of causing an early abortion is stronger in the case of pills taken after intercourse to prevent pregnancy ("emergency contraception" or "morning-after pills"). In some cases these pills are taken when sperm and egg have already joined to create a new life, in which case the drug could not have any effect except to cause an early abortion.

WHAT HAS BEEN THE IMPACT OF CONTRACEPTION ON SOCIETY? ON MARRIED COUPLES?

Many would likely be surprised at how long all Christian churches agreed on this teaching against contraception. It was only in 1930 that some Protestant denominations began to reject this long-held position. Those opposed to this trend predicted an increase in premarital sex, adultery, acceptance of divorce, and abortion. Later, in 1968, Pope Paul VI warned that the use of contraception would allow one spouse to treat the other more like an object than a person, and that in time governments would be tempted to impose laws limiting family size. Pope John Paul II called attention to the close association between contraception and abortion, noting that "the negative values inherent in the 'contraceptive mentality' . . . are such that they in fact strengthen this temptation [to abortion] when an unwanted life is conceived" (Evangelium Vitae, no. 13).

These predictions have come true. Today we see a pandemic of sexually transmitted diseases, an enormous rise in cohabitation, one in three children born outside of marriage, and abortion used by many when contraception fails. A failure to respect married love's power to help create new life has eroded respect for life and for the sanctity of marriage.

CONCLUSION

By using contraception, couples may think that they are avoiding problems or easing tensions, that they are exerting control over their lives. But the gift of being able to help create another person, a new human being with his or her own life, involves profound relationships. It affects our relationship with God, who created us complete with this powerful gift. It involves whether spouses will truly love and accept each other as they are, including their gift of fertility. Finally, it involves the way spouses will spontaneously accept their child as a gift from God and the fruit of their mutual love. Like all important relationships with other persons, it is not subject solely to our individual control. In the end, this gift is far richer and more rewarding than that.

The Church's teaching on marital sexuality is an invitation for men and women—an invitation to let God be God, to receive the gift of God's love and care, and to let this gift inform and transform us, so we may share that love with each other and with the world.

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Amor Matrimonial y el Don de la Vida







Este anuncio del boletín contiene una selección de lo expuesto sobre *El Amor Matrimonial y el Don de la Vida*, que fue aprobado por la Conferencia de Obispos Católicos de los Estados Unidos en la Reunión General de noviembre de 2006.

¿QUÉ ENSEÑA LA IGLESIA ACERCA DEL AMOR MATRIMONIAL?

El matrimonio es más que un contrato civil; es una alianza de toda la vida entre un hombre y una mujer. Es una unión íntima en la que los esposos y las esposas aprenden a dar y recibir amor generosamente, y luego enseñan a sus hijos e hijas a hacer lo mismo. El matrimonio cristiano, en particular, es un "gran misterio", un símbolo del amor entre Cristo y su Iglesia (Ef 5:32). La Iglesia enseña que la unión sexual del esposo y la esposa tiene el propósito de expresar el significado pleno del amor, su poder de unir a la pareja y su apertura a una vida nueva.

¿QUÉ TIENE QUE VER ESTO CON LA ANTICONCEPCIÓN?

El esposo y la esposa expresan el compromiso de su amor no solo mediante palabras, sino también mediante el lenguaje de sus cuerpos.

Por naturaleza, el amor del esposo y la esposa es tan completo, tan ordenado a una vida entera de comunión con Dios y del uno con el otro, que está abierto a la creación de un nuevo ser humano, al que amarán y cuidarán juntos. Parte del don de Dios al esposo y a la esposa es esta capacidad de cooperar con el poder creador de Dios en este amor y mediante este amor. Por lo tanto, el don mutuo de la fecundidad es parte integral del poder unitivo del acto sexual marital. Este poder de crear una vida nueva con Dios es la esencia de lo que los cónyuges comparten el uno con el otro.

Suprimir la fertilidad al utilizar anticonceptivos niega parte del significado inherente de la sexualidad matrimonial y perjudica la unión de la pareja. La enseñanza de la Iglesia no solo supone observar una regla, sino preservar también ese don mutuo y total de dos personas en su integridad.

¿SE ESPERA QUE LAS PAREJAS DEJEN EL TAMAÑO DE SU FAMILIA SUJETO TOTALMENTE AL AZAR?

Ciertamente no. La Iglesia enseña que una pareja puede decidir, generosamente, tener una familia numerosa o, por motivos serios, puede optar por no tener más hijos e hijas por el momento o incluso indefinidamente (*Humanae Vitae*, no. 10).

¿QUÉ DEBE HACER UNA PAREJA SI TIENE UNA RAZÓN VÁLIDA PARA EVITAR TENER HIJOS E HIJAS?

Una pareja casada puede tener intimidad marital durante el período naturalmente estéril del ciclo de la mujer o después de los años de procreación, sin violar el significado del acto sexual marital en forma alguna.

Este es el principio que gobierna la planificación familiar natural (PFN). Los métodos naturales de planificación familiar

constan de una educación sobre la fecundidad, que permite que las parejas cooperen con el cuerpo tal como Dios lo creó.

¿QUÉ ES LA PLANIFICACIÓN FAMILIAR NATURAL?

La planificación familiar natural es un término general para los métodos de planificación familiar que se basan en el ciclo menstrual de la mujer. El hombre es fecundo durante toda su vida, mientras que la mujer lo es solamente durante unos pocos días en cada ciclo menstrual durante sus años de procreación. La mujer tiene señales claras y observables que indican cuándo está fértil y cuándo está estéril. Aprender a observar y comprender esas señales es la esencia de la educación para la planificación familiar natural.

Cuando una pareja decide postergar un embarazo, la PFN puede ser muy eficaz. La PFN también es muy útil para las parejas que desean tener un hijo o hija, porque identifica el momento de la ovulación. De este modo, una pareja puede tener relaciones maritales en el momento en que es más probable que la concepción se lleve a cabo.

¿EXISTE REALMENTE ALGUNA DIFERENCIA ENTRE UTILIZAR ANTICONCEPTIVOS Y PRACTICAR LA PLANIFICACIÓN FAMILIAR NATURAL?

A simple vista, puede parecer que la diferencia es pequeña. Pero el resultado final no es lo único que importa, y *la manera* en que logramos ese resultado puede implicar una enorme diferencia moral. Algunos métodos respetan los dones que Dios nos ha dado y otros no. Las parejas que han practicado la planificación familiar natural después de utilizar anticonceptivos han experimentado una profunda diferencia en el significado de su intimidad sexual.

Cuando las parejas utilizan anticonceptivos, sean estos físicos o químicos, suprimen su fecundidad, afirmando que solamente ellos tienen el máximo control sobre este poder de crear una vida humana nueva. Con la PFN, los cónyuges respetan el designio de Dios de vida y amor. Pueden optar por abstenerse de la unión sexual durante el período fértil de la mujer, sin hacer nada que destruya el significado de brindar amor y vida, que está presente. Esa es la diferencia entre optar por falsificar el lenguaje marital pleno del cuerpo u optar, en ciertos momentos, por no hablar ese lenguaje.

¿ES CIERTO, COMO DICEN ALGUNOS, QUE ALGUNOS MÉTODOS DE CONTROL DE LA NATALIDAD PUEDEN CAUSAR UN ABORTO?

Algunos métodos de control de la natalidad tienen como fin impedir la unión del espermatozoide con el óvulo y, por lo tanto, actúan como anticonceptivos. Entre ellos se encuentran aquellos que actúan como barreras, como los condones y los diafragmas.

En cambio, los métodos hormonales como la píldora pueden funcionar de diversas maneras. Pueden suprimir la ovulación o alterar las secreciones cervicales para impedir la fecundación y actuar, por lo tanto, como anticonceptivos. Pero muchas veces tienen otros efectos, como por ejemplo los cambios en las paredes del útero. Si la acción anticonceptiva falla y la fecundación tiene lugar, estos métodos hormonales pueden impedir que esa vida recién concebida se implante y sobreviva. Eso constituiría un aborto muy temprano. Las opiniones médicas difieren sobre si esto ocurre o con qué frecuencia. En la actualidad, no hay manera de saber con exactitud cómo funcionan estas drogas en un momento determinado en una mujer en particular.

La preocupación sobre el riesgo de causar un aborto es mayor en el caso de las píldoras que se toman después del acto sexual para impedir el embarazo ("anticoncepción de emergencia" o "píldoras del día siguiente"). En algunos casos, estas píldoras se toman cuando el esperma y el óvulo ya se han unido para crear una vida nueva, en cuyo caso la droga no podría tener efecto alguno, excepto el de causar un aborto temprano.

¿CUÁL HA SIDO EL IMPACTO DE LOS ANTICONCEPTIVOS EN LA SOCIEDAD? ¿EN LAS PAREJAS CASADAS?

Es probable que muchos se sorprendan al enterarse del largo tiempo en el que todas las iglesias cristianas coincidieron en esta enseñanza contra la anticoncepción. Fue en 1930 que algunos credos protestantes comenzaron a rechazar esta posición sostenida durante tanto tiempo. Los que se opusieron a esa tendencia predijeron un aumento en las relaciones sexuales prematrimoniales, el adulterio, la aceptación del divorcio y el aborto. Más tarde, en 1968, el Papa Pablo VI advirtió que la utilización de los anticonceptivos daría lugar a que un cónyuge tratara al otro como objeto más que como persona y que, con el tiempo, los gobiernos se verían tentados a imponer leyes que limitaran el tamaño de la familia. El Papa Juan Pablo II destacó la estrecha conexión entre los anticonceptivos y el aborto, señalando que "los contravalores inherentes a la 'mentalidad anticonceptiva' [...] son tales que hacen precisamente más fuerte esta tentación [del aborto] ante la eventual concepción de una vida no deseada" (Evangelium Vitae, no. 13).

Esas predicciones se han cumplido. Hoy en día, vemos una epidemia de enfermedades transmitidas sexualmente, un enorme incremento en la cohabitación, el nacimiento de uno de cada tres niños fuera del matrimonio y el aborto utilizado por muchos cuando los anticonceptivos fallan. No respetar ese poder del amor matrimonial para ayudar a crear nuevas vidas ha erosionado el respeto por la vida y por la santidad del matrimonio.

CONCLUSIÓN

Al usar anticonceptivos, las parejas podrían pensar que están evitando problemas o calmando tensiones, que están ejerciendo control sobre sus vidas. Pero el don de poder ayudar a crear otra persona, un ser humano nuevo con su propia vida, entraña relaciones profundas. Afecta nuestra relación con Dios que nos creó completos con este don poderoso. Es una demostración del verdadero amor y de la aceptación mutua de los cónyuges, tal como son, incluyendo el don de la fecundidad. Finalmente, implica la manera en que los cónyuges aceptarán espontánea-

mente a su hijo o hija como un don de Dios y fruto de su amor mutuo. Como todas las relaciones importantes con otras personas, no está sujeto únicamente a nuestro control individual. Al final, este don es mucho más rico y más gratificante.

La doctrina de la Iglesia sobre la sexualidad marital es una invitación a los hombres y a las mujeres — una invitación a permitir que Dios sea Dios, a recibir el don del amor y el cuidado de Dios, y a permitir que este don nos informe y nos transforme, para que podamos compartir ese amor el uno con el otro y con el mundo.

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NATURAL FAMILY PLANNING

At the first stage of life, centers for natural methods of regulating fertility should be promoted as a valuable help to responsible parenthood, in which all individuals, and in the first place the child, are recognized and respected in their own right and where every decision is guided by the ideal of the sincere gift of self. (EV, #88)

From the scientific point of view, these methods are becoming more and more accurate and make it possible in practice to make choices in harmony with moral values. An honest appraisal of their effectiveness should dispel certain prejudices which are still widely held, and should convince married couples, as well as health-care and social workers, of the importance of proper training in this area. (*EV*, #97)

The Church is grateful to those who, with personal sacrifice and often unacknowledged dedication, devote themselves to the study and spread of these methods, as well to the promotion of education in the moral values which they presuppose. (EV, #97)

It is therefore morally unacceptable to encourage, let alone impose, the use of methods such as contraception, sterilization, and abortion in order to regulate births. (EV, #90)

In fact, as experience bears witness, not every conjugal act is followed by a new life. God has wisely disposed natural laws and rhythms of fecundity which, of themselves, cause a separation in the succession of births. (HV, #11)

If, then, there are serious motives to space out births, which derive from the physical or psychological conditions of husband and wife, or from external conditions, the Church teaches that it is then licit to take into account the natural rhythms immanent in the generative functions, for the use of marriage in the in fecund periods only, and in this way to regulate birth without offending the moral principles which have been recalled earlier. (HV, #16)

The Church is coherent with herself when she considers recourse to the infecund periods to be licit, while at the same time condemning, as being always illicit, the use of means directly contrary to fecundation, even if such use is inspired by reasons which may appear honest and serious. In reality, there are essential differences between the two cases; in the former, the married couple make legitimate use of a natural disposition; in the latter, they impede the development of natural processes. (HV, #16)

The choice of the natural rhythms involves accepting the cycle of the person that is the woman and thereby accepting dialogue, reciprocal respect, shared responsibility and self-control. To accept the cycle and to enter into dialogue means to recognize both spiritual

and corporal character of conjugal communion, and to live personal love with its requirement of fidelity. In this context the couple comes to experience how conjugal communion is enriched with those values of tenderness and affection which constitute the inner soul of human sexuality in its physical dimension also. In this way, sexuality is respected and promoted in its truly and fully human dimension, and is never "used" as an "object" that by breaking the personal unity of soul and body, strikes at God's creation itself at the level of the deepest interaction of nature and person. (*FC*, #32)

In the light of the experience of many couples and of the data provided by the different human sciences, theological reflection is able to perceive and is called to study further the difference, both anthropological and moral, between contraception and recourse to the rhythm of the cycle: it is a difference which is much wider and deeper than is usually thought, one which involves in the final analysis two irreconcilable concepts of the human person and of human sexuality. (FC, #32)

Periodic continence, that is, the methods of birth regulation based on self-observation and the use of infertile periods, is in conformity with the objective criteria of morality. These methods respect the bodies of the spouses, encourage tenderness between them and favor the education of an authentic freedom. In contrast, "every action which, whether in anticipation of the conjugal act, or in its accomplishment, or in the development of its natural consequences, proposes, whether as an end or as a means, to render procreation impossible" is intrinsically evil:

Thus the innate language that expresses the total reciprocal self-giving of husband and wife is overlaid, through contraception, by an objectively contradictory language, namely, that of not giving oneself totally to the other. This leads not only to a positive refusal to be open to life but also to a falsification of the inner truth of conjugal love, which is called upon to give itself in personal totality....The difference, both anthropological and moral, between contraception and recourse to the rhythm of the cycle...involves in the final analysis two irreconcilable concepts of the human person and of human sexuality. (*CCC*, #2370)

Taking advantage of the temporary natural sterility in the Ogino-Knaus method does not violate the natural order...since conjugal relations respond to the will of the Creator. (Pius XII, *Allocution to the Members of the Seventh Congress on Hematology*, September 12, 1958)

Free to choose the number of children they desire, the couple most be equally free to use natural methods for the responsible regulation of their fertility, for serious reasons and in conformity with the teaching of the church. These various methods deserve to be known and spread widely. Couples must be offered the means to freely exercise their responsible motherhood and fatherhood. The artificial methods of birth control as well as sterilization do not respect the human person of a woman and man because they eliminate or impede fertility, which is an integral part of the person. (PCF, *The Ethical and Pastoral Dimensions of Population Trends*, March 25, 1994, #76)
